Conference Security

Rules and Instructions for Delegates

Dear Delegate:

We look forward to a productive and professional Conference. Delegates can contribute to the productivity of the Conference in a number of ways. First and foremost, you can contribute only if you are on the floor. Be there! Participate! Second, Conference decorum will be strictly enforced. We are brothers and sisters of this great Order and though discussion is encouraged, discourtesy or rudeness will not be tolerated. Third, meetings will start promptly. We have a planned agenda to work through. Business sessions must begin as scheduled, so they can conclude as scheduled, allowing delegates to attend seminars.

The following are specific rules that the Chair will enforce:

- Speakers, once recognized, must identify themselves by name, lodge, and state.
- 2. Speakers will be allowed to speak only twice on the same motion on the same day. Further, speakers may not get to speak on issues a second time, as long as other members who have not spoken on the motion desire the floor.
- There will be no caucuses on or off the Conference floor while the Conference is in session! If delegates need to meet, time should be scheduled before or after the business sessions.
- 4. Trading of pins or any other items must be done outside the meeting room.
- 5. There will be no lunch breaks. The Chair will try to conclude business by 1:00p.m. each day to accommodate those delegates who wish to attend seminars.
- 6. Only Conference delegates and their alternates, when wearing appropriate badges, will be allowed on the Conference floor. Other FOP members and approved guests will sit in the area designated by the Sergeant at Arms. Once again, delegates must wear their badges issued by the Secretary to gain admission to the Conference floor.
- 7. National Trustees and State Presidents have a number of important duties. Each is charged with the responsibility to assist in maintaining order and to ensure that their delegates are on time, and on the floor.
- 8. Robert's Rules of Order, 12th Edition, and the general rules of parliamentary procedure will be strictly enforced.
- 9. It is the Chair's intent to follow the agenda that you have been provided.

10. Quorum for National Conference:

In accordance with Roberts Rules of Order (cited as RONR) (12th ED.)

"A quorum is described as the majority of delegates who have been registered at the convention as in attendance, irrespective of whether some may have departed. The word majority for the purposes of determining a majority vote of a quorum means simply, more than half".

At the beginning of each day a report will be provided on the number of registered delegates who have been credentialed and a quorum will be the majority of that number.

In the event of a quorum call, the President will determine if a quorum is present in accordance with the RONR.

- II. A reminder that the Memorial Service is to honor those who have made the ultimate sacrifice and that they should be honored accordingly with respect and dignity. Please refrain from any unnecessary talking and disturbance during this time.
- 12. Conference Rules on Nominations
 - All Nominations for National Executive Board members will be made at the appointed time in the meeting with a time certain published in the agenda.
 - All nominators will seek recognition from the Chair in order to make a nomination, which shall be done from the floor of the conference excluding the podium, which will not be used to make a nomination.
 - All nominations shall be accepted when the chair calls the respective office and the nomination speeches will be limited to three minutes.
- Please be aware that there are several time certains on our agenda. If we approach a time certain while in the middle of a report or discussion, we will continue with the business at hand. Once that concludes, we will proceed to the scheduled time certain. Please note that a time certain will not begin before its designated time, but it may begin later depending on the flow of the meeting.

I expect that we will have a productive and business like Conference. We all look forward to the exchange of ideas, the re-establishment of old acquaintances, and the making of new friends. We are the largest and most respected Labor Organization of law enforcement professionals in the world. We join together to serve our communities, our countries, and the good of our Order.

Past National Auxiliary President Karen Lippe

The Fraternal Order of Police Auxiliary is the only national support organization of its kind, created to unite the families of our members, promote their welfare, and encourage them in all pursuits of the good.

Karen's involvement in the Auxiliary spanned over five decades, during which she held numerous leadership positions, including National President. She received countless accolades, including the Oklahoma State FOP Auxiliary Lifetime Achievement Award and her induction into the Oklahoma Law Enforcement Hall of Fame.

Bob Krone, NFOP Staff

Bob Krone served the National Fraternal Order of Police with distinction for more than eight years as a valued member of our national staff. When he first proposed offering tax services to help our lodges navigate complex IRS requirements, none of us could have anticipated how indispensable his work would become. His commitment to the mission of the FOP was evident in every interaction, and he approached each challenge with professionalism, patience, and a sincere desire to help others succeed.

Equally important, James brings a thoughtful perspective and deep understanding of police labor challenges, frequently representing the FOP with distinction in key national partnerships and working groups. His credibility and professionalism have strengthened our relationships and expanded our influence.

Second Vice President John Hoyt draws upon decades of experience as a labor leader and as a respected voice within the Philadelphia Lodge. His insight into the evolving landscape of collective bargaining and officer representation ensures our members' interests are protected and advanced. John's steady guidance and passion for this work are evident in every initiative he undertakes.

Sergeant at Arms Steve James contributes a keen business sense and a clear-eyed understanding of the complex organizational challenges we face. His ability to analyze issues, identify solutions, and champion initiatives has propelled many of our priorities forward. Steve's thoughtful perspective and sound judgment are assets to our Executive Board and to the broader membership.

Chairman of Trustees Rob Pride brings years of dedicated advocacy, unshakable integrity, and a talent for building consensus, even on the most delicate and consequential issues. His commitment to fostering unity, respect, and collaboration among our diverse trustees has strengthened the foundation of our governance and advanced the mission of this Order.

I am truly blessed to work alongside each of these exceptional leaders. Their diverse backgrounds, deep experience, and representation of lodges of every size bring unparalleled insight to our deliberations. Together, this Executive Board embodies the highest ideals of service, stewardship, and solidarity.

Their unwavering commitment to the Fraternal Order of Police has created a continuity of leadership that is both powerfully positive and resolutely forward-thinking. It is because of their efforts that the FOP remains not only the largest but also the most trusted and effective voice for law enforcement officers across this nation.



Enough is Enough: A Call to End Violence Against Law Enforcement Officers

As we closed out 2O24, the alarming reality of increased violence against law enforcement officers continued to demand urgent attention and decisive action from every level of government and society. Although the number of officers shot in the line of duty decreased by 9% from last year's record high, the profession remains under siege.

Police officers are enduring levels of violence that nearly matched the second most dangerous period for law enforcement since the National Fraternal Order of Police began collecting this data. The numbers tell a stark and sobering story:

- In 2023, 378 officers were shot in the line of duty, making it the most violent year on record.
- Ambush-style attacks reached II5 incidents, resulting in I38 officers shot and 20 fatalities.
- Despite advancements in medical trauma care and anti-ballistic technology reducing fatalities, 46 officers were killed.

At the close of 2O24, we regret to report that:

- 342 officers were shot in the line of duty (-9% from 2O23 YTD and +3% from 2O22 YTD).
- 50 officers were killed (+8% from 2023 YTD, -19% from 2022 YTD).
- There were 61 ambush-style attacks, resulting in 79 officers shot, 18 of whom were killed.

These are not just numbers on a page, they are fathers, mothers, sons, daughters, husbands, and wives who made the ultimate sacrifice to protect their communities. This violence is unacceptable. It threatens the safety and stability of every neighborhood in America and is a stain on our society that demands a unified response.

I call on communities across the country to join us in declaring, "**Enough is Enough.**" Violence against those who protect and serve must never be tolerated or normalized. It is time for elected officials and community leaders to take a clear stand, to boldly support our heroes, to unequivocally condemn violence directed at law enforcement officers, and to foster environments where those who serve are respected, valued, and protected.

I also renew our call to Congress to act swiftly and pass the **Protect and Serve Act**. This legislation, designed to address the unprovoked violence that specifically targets law enforcement officers, has languished for years without substantial movement, despite the data and the urgency of the crisis. Lawmakers must recognize that every day they fail to act, the risk to officers grows, and the consequences become more profound.

Let us stand together, united as a nation, to reject this senseless violence. It is time to support the brave men and women who risk their lives every day to keep our communities safe.





We Did It! We Repealed the Steal

The Social Security Fairness Act is now law—a historic victory for public servants nationwide. The passage of this legislation marks a monumental achievement in our fight for justice and fairness for public employees. As your National President, I am deeply proud of the Fraternal Order of Police and every member who played a role in securing this victory.

Since our founding in 1915, the FOP has been at the forefront of every major legislative advancement for law enforcement and public employees. The repeal of the Windfall Elimination Provision and the Government Pension Offset stands among the most significant accomplishments in our IIO-year history. This success underscores the power of FOP unity and leadership and solidifies our reputation as a determined advocate for those who dedicate their lives to public service.





Red and Blue Rallies – Advocating for Fairness in Retirement

The Fraternal Order of Police joined in a powerful partnership with the International Association of Fire Fighters (IAFF) to lead a united effort addressing the injustices of the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) and the Government Pension Offset (GPO). These provisions continue to penalize thousands of dedicated public servants by unfairly reducing their earned retirement benefits, despite a lifetime of honorable service to their communities.


Two major events were held at the United States Capitol to bring national attention to this issue, one in March ahead of the House vote and another in December ahead of the Senate vote. Each rally drew more than I,OOO participants, including rank-and-file law enforcement officers, firefighters, retirees, and supporters. Members of Congress from both parties took part in these gatherings, offering their voices and pledging their support for long-overdue reforms. The Red and Blue Rally stood as a testament to the strength and solidarity of our professions when we stand shoulder to shoulder to demand fairness and justice.

I am proud of the commitment demonstrated by our members, our leadership, and our partners at the IAFF.



The FOP Impact


The journey to victory spanned more than four decades, marked by numerous challenges, legislative setbacks, and the need to build bipartisan support in an increasingly polarized environment. Policymakers and the public often misunderstood the devastating impact these provisions had on public employees. Educating Congress required relentless engagement. Our state and local lodge leaders mobilized thousands of members to write letters, make phone calls, and meet with lawmakers. This sustained pressure created an undeniable force that kept the issue alive and visible.



Standing beside President Biden at the bill's signing in the White House, alongside representatives from other organizations, it was clear that this victory was certainly a collective effort, but make no mistake—the FOP's engagement and influence were not only a driving force behind the outcome, we were pivotal at the critical moments necessary for passage.

The only chance for success depended on our ability to keep the effort nonpartisan. Our strategy deliberately maintained Democratic engagement while focusing considerable effort on securing key Republican support. And influence, we did. Our national grassroots efforts made clear to every Senator that we were watching how they voted, and after years of hearing pledges of support, their words were about to be tested.

During the decisive weeks leading up to the Senate vote, NFOP Executive Director Jim Pasco and I traveled to Mar-a-Lago to secure the endorsement of President-elect Trump. His public pledge to the FOP proved decisive, unlocking the final Republican votes needed to bring the bill to the floor. With President Trump's endorsement, momentum shifted in our favor. We achieved a true bipartisan moment, with the House Speaker, House Minority Leader, and Senate Majority Leader all as cosponsors of the Social Security Fairness Act, and support from both President Biden and President-elect Trump. There is no question: while success has many fathers, the FOP delivered the decisive leverage at precisely the right time to ensure victory.



Despite paying into Social Security at the full rate, officers were penalized simply because they served their communities. This injustice also created serious recruitment challenges. Candidates from the private sector faced the reality that choosing public service could cost them earned benefits, making it harder for agencies to attract

and retain qualified officers—especially during staffing crises.

Our members and retirees have expressed profound gratitude and relief. For many, this victory means the difference between financial security and uncertainty in retirement.

I want to personally thank President Biden for his unwavering support and President Trump, whose endorsement provided the final boost we needed. I am also grateful to Representatives Garret Graves and Abigail Spanberger, whose work in the House was instrumental; to Senator Chuck Schumer for his strategic leadership; and to Senators Sherrod Brown, Susan Collins, Bill Cassidy, Amy Klobuchar, and Kyrsten Sinema for their dedication and support.

I extend my deepest appreciation to the FOP's legislative team in Washington, D.C., led by Jim Pasco and Tim Richardson, whose relentless focus and skill made this victory possible.

This success shows what we can achieve when we are united, strategic, and committed. Let us build on this momentum as we take on the challenges ahead.



The Fraternal Order of Police Presidential Endorsement

The endorsement process of the Fraternal Order of Police is governed by our National Constitution and Bylaws. With over 377,000 members nationwide, it is a thorough, inclusive, and transparent process designed to give every state's membership a voice. Executive Board members do not vote outside of their own states, ensuring that the outcome reflects the concerns and priorities of rank-and-file law enforcement officers who grapple daily with the long-term impacts of the border and fentanyl crises, progressive prosecutors, and bail reform policies.

Prior to the endorsement vote, both campaigns were invited to complete detailed questionnaires on critical law enforcement and labor issues. President Trump responded to the questionnaire and participated in an interview. In the days leading up to President Biden's decision to withdraw from the race, we were in frequent contact with his campaign, and at that time, were very close to receiving his responses to both the questionnaire and the interview request. Despite multiple deadline extensions, the Harris campaign only submitted a letter and declined to grant an interview. All materials received were made available to our membership for review in advance of the vote.

On September 6, 2024, at the NFOP Fall Board Meeting in Charlotte, North Carolina, each state's National Trustee cast their vote, representing the collective will of their members. At the conclusion of this process, former President Donald Trump received overwhelming support, with only two states voting for "no endorsement." Under our Constitution, an endorsement requires a two-thirds majority; former President Trump received 95.7% of the vote.

The FOP's endorsement is not just a symbol of our support, but a powerful statement about the values and priorities we hold dear as the largest law enforcement rank-and-file organization in the nation. Equally important, it is likely the only national group that allows its members to be part of the selection process.



On September II, 2O24, former President Trump attended the Fall Board of Trustees Meeting in Charlotte to personally accept the endorsement of the Fraternal Order of Police. The event was broadcast live by media outlets across the globe. During his remarks, he spoke for more than an hour, praising the men and women of law enforcement and pledging that the FOP would have direct access to his administration as we work together to make our communities safer and protect those who serve.

Nation's Oldest and Largest Police Labor Organization Will Support Trump on Election Day

Washington, DC - Patrick Yoes, National President of the Fraternal Order of Police, announced today that the members of the FOP voted to endorse Donald J. Trump for President of the United States.

"Public safety and border security will be important issues in the last months of this campaign," Yoes said. "Our members carefully considered the positions of the candidates on the issues and there was no doubt—zero doubt—as to who they want as our President for the next four years: Donald J. Trump."

The FOP's endorsement process is unique in that every member has the opportunity, through our 46 State Lodges, to make their choice known to the National Trustee. Once informed by the membership as to their choice, the National Trustee casts his or her vote at our National Board meeting. In order to secure our endorsement, the candidate needs the support of two-thirds of the State Lodges, a benchmark former President Trump easily cleared.

"During his first term, President Trump made it clear he supported law enforcement and border security," Yoes said. "In the summer of 2020, he stood with us when very few would. With his help, we defeated the 'defund the police' movement and, finally, we are seeing crime rates decrease. If we want to maintain these lower crime rates, we must re-elect Donald Trump."

Though this election was highly unusual, the FOP considered the two 2O24 presidential candidates' records—including President Trump's responses to the FOP's questionnaire, as well as a letter from the Harris-Walz campaign describing some of their positions on criminal justice and police labor issues. An FOP committee met personally with former President Trump, but no similar meeting was granted by the Harris-Walz campaign. This information was provided to the more than 377,000 members of the FOP so they could make their own decision in this election.

"As the nation's oldest and largest law enforcement labor organization, the FOP's presidential endorsement is one of the most sought-after endorsements by candidates running for the presidency," Yoes said. "The FOP is the number one voice of America's law enforcement. We have a responsibility to our members, to the 700,000 sworn law enforcement officers in the United States, and to the communities they serve to do our part in determining the direction in which our country will head."

In every election cycle, the FOP pays close attention to which presidential campaign highlights the issues most vital to the men and women of the FOP, including the challenges faced by the rank-and-file law enforcement officers, the real issues in public safety, and the problems in our criminal justice system. The FOP has endorsed candidates—from both parties—that our members believe have made the men and women of law enforcement a priority: George H. W. Bush (1992); William J. Clinton (1996); George W. Bush (2000, 2004); John S. McCain III (2008); Donald J. Trump (2016, 2020). In 2012, the FOP voted not to endorse a candidate.

"The National FOP endorsed Donald Trump in 2016 and 2020. He led our nation through some very tough times," Yoes said. "He provided our nation with strong, effective leadership during his first term, and now that he is seeking election to a second term, we intend to help him win it."



Realigning Top Legislative Priorities

For nearly two decades, the passage of the Social Security Fairness Act stood as the top priority of the National Fraternal Order of Police's legislative agenda. With this historic victory now secured, we are turning our focus to new objectives that will define the next era of our advocacy.

At the forefront is the Protect and Serve Act, the most critical pending legislation to address the escalation of targeted violence against law enforcement officers. This bill would create federal penalties for individuals who deliberately assault or attempt to kill officers simply because they wear the badge. Our members deserve the same federal protections already afforded to other professions facing similar threats. In the II8th Congress, we worked diligently to advance this bill through the Judiciary Committee. As we prepare for the II9th Congress, we will leverage the same proven grassroots strategy—mobilizing state and local lodges to engage their elected officials—that was essential to repealing WEP and GPO.

Another enduring priority is the Law Enforcement Equity Act (H.R. 1322). This legislation would provide federal law enforcement officers, including those at the Department of Defense and Department of Veterans Affairs, with the same retirement benefits available to other 6(c) law enforcement positions. For years, our members in these agencies have faced inequities that undermine basic fairness, morale, recruitment, and retention.

In addition to the focused work of our legislative staff in Washington, I have personally hosted multiple meetings with the Department of Defense union leadership and other stakeholders to explore viable pathways to build support for this legislation. As many of you know, significant institutional resistance and political skepticism persists regarding its prospects. I reject the notion that this legislation can "never pass." However, I recognize that our previous approaches have not generated the traction needed to advance the bill.

To address this, we are actively pursuing a renewed strategy that includes:

 Engaging key federal agencies in substantive dialogue to identify actionable solutions to longstanding objections.

- Developing a comprehensive quantitative analysis documenting the impact of current policy on recruitment and, importantly, retention across affected agencies.
- Framing the legislation as a workforce sustainability and cost-savings measure, rather than solely as an equity initiative, to broaden bipartisan appeal.

At present, much of the debate has been driven by anecdotal evidence and unquantified concerns. Our objective is to change the conversation by presenting a compelling, data-driven case that underscores the long-term risks of inaction and the fiscal and operational benefits of reform.

Other priorities include:

The Collective Bargaining Rights Act and The LEOSA Reform Act

These initiatives reflect our continued commitment to improving working conditions, protecting the rights of officers, and ensuring the profession remains sustainable and respected.

As we embark on these efforts, we remain focused on building upon our successes, engaging with lawmakers, and ensuring our members' voices are heard and their interests protected. The credibility and momentum we built through our success with the Social Security Fairness Act have positioned the FOP to lead on these and other critical issues. Together, we will continue to demonstrate that when we are united, strategic, and relentless, there is no challenge we cannot overcome.

Navigating New Challenges and Opportunities

With the start of a new administration and a new Congress, the legislative and policy landscape has presented both significant challenges and unique opportunities for the Fraternal Order of Police. As the nation's oldest and largest law enforcement labor organization, representing more than 378,000 members, the FOP remains at the forefront of national discussions on policing, labor rights, officer safety, and the long-term stability of our profession.

The contrasts between the Biden and Trump administrations are stark. Over four years, the Biden administration implemented policies that many of our members felt undermined stability and morale. In contrast, the Trump administration has moved rapidly to enact policies viewed by many as supportive and restorative of law enforcement's role and image in the community.

While these changes have created optimism among large segments of our membership, they have also brought new challenges, including the need to recalibrate our relationships with federal agencies and key congressional committees. The FOP has remained engaged with administration officials, congressional leaders, and policymakers to ensure our members' voices and concerns remain central to all policy discussions.

As Congress began filing and re-filing legislation—bills affecting qualified immunity, collective bargaining rights, funding for officer safety initiatives, and police reform proposals—we have been proactive in educating lawmakers, offering technical expertise, and advocating for balanced approaches that support public safety while protecting the rights of our members.

Navigating these dynamics has required constant vigilance, adaptability, and collaboration. As the legislative and regulatory environment continues to evolve, the FOP remains steadfast in protecting the interests of frontline officers and reinforcing our role as the nation's preeminent voice for law enforcement.



Urban Policing Committee Meeting and Law Enforcement Roundtable

In early June 2025, the FOP created an opportunity to participate in two significant engagements focused on the future of policing in America's urban centers and the broader national dialogue around public safety.



The National FOP's Urban Policing Committee convened for a full-day session to examine the unique challenges and opportunities facing our major city agencies. The meeting brought together leaders from some of the nation's largest urban FOP lodges to share operational perspectives and develop coordinated strategies to improve officer safety, staffing, and community trust.

We concluded this meeting with a law enforcement roundtable hosted by President Trump and Attorney General Pam Bondi at the White House to discuss the evolving landscape of violent crime, federal enforcement priorities, and support for law enforcement professionals.

President Trump expressed his continued commitment to ensuring that officers have the tools, resources, and political support necessary to confront rising violent crime and keep communities safe. Attorney General Bondi underscored the Department of Justice's intention to prioritize prosecutions targeting violent criminal enterprises, illegal firearms trafficking, and fentanyl distribution networks that are devastating urban communities.

This roundtable served as a powerful reminder that the challenges we face are national in scope, and our advocacy must be equally determined and collaborative. I emphasized to both President Trump and Attorney General Bondi that the Fraternal Order of Police stands ready to partner in any initiative that reinforces officer safety and defends the integrity of our profession.

These engagements are essential to ensuring that the voices of our members—especially those serving in America's most demanding urban environments—remain central to the national conversation about public safety. As always, I am committed to making sure those voices are heard clearly and persistently at the highest levels of government.

Congressional Testimony on Policing, Public Safety and Employment Protections

When it comes to public safety, no one knows more about policing in America than police officers—and no one understands police officers better than the Fraternal Order of Police. The FOP is constantly engaged at the federal level to ensure that your voice is heard and that congressional actions reflect the perspectives of rank-and-file officers.

Over the past two years, I was privileged to share your insights and priorities in the halls of Congress, providing testimony on critical issues including policing practices, public safety policy, and employment protections for law enforcement professionals.

This report outlines those efforts and the impact they have had on shaping legislation and influencing public discourse.



Social Security Fairness Act

Testified at House of Representatives Committee on Ways and Means Field Hearing "Social Security's Disservice to Public Servants: How the Windfall Elimination Provision and Government Pension Offset Mistreat Government Workers."

The following is my oral testimony before the US House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee hearing on the Social Security Fairness Act held in Louisiana November 2024. Of the four-person panel offering testimony, the FOP was the only law Enforcement group. This hearing was the first hearing on this topic in more than 17 years and paved the way for advancing the bill for a floor vote.

"Good afternoon, Chairman Smith, Chairman Ferguson, Ranking Member Neal, and distinguished Members of the House Committee on Ways and Means. My name is Patrick Yoes, National President of the Fraternal Order of Police, and I represent more than 373,000 rank-and-file police officers. The FOP is the oldest and largest law enforcement labor organization in the United States.

Mr. Chairman, I am grateful that you are holding this hearing to examine the impact of THE Windfall Elimination Provision and Government Pension Offset on hard-working Americans who chose a career in public service. Approximately 1.9 million beneficiaries, or 4% of the eligible population, are impacted by the W.E.P. It is estimated that 60% of law enforcement officers in our country are affected by this provision.

Between 2000 and 2008, the House and Senate held a combined seven hearings on the W.E.P. and G.P.O. Apart from this Committees' mark-up last year, which was done to block a floor vote after we had reached 305 co-sponsors, there has been no action or consideration of the bill since that time.

So, while I welcome the opportunity to be here with you today to talk about how the W.E.P. and G.P.O. hurt our nation's retired law enforcement officers, I am also here to express the deep frustration of my members.

Simply put, law enforcement officers who served in an agency outside the Social Security system may lose up to sixty percent (60%) of the Social Security benefit to which we are entitled by virtue of secondary or post-retirement employment. We were required to pay the same amount into the Social Security system as every other American and yet we are not guaranteed the same benefit... all because we answered the calling of public service.

The FOP contends that this provision has a disproportionate impact on law enforcement officers. An earlier study

suggests 75% of those impacted were law enforcement or other public safety workers. Law enforcement officers are likely to retire earlier than other public employees because of the extreme physical and mental demands of the job.

After a full career in law enforcement, many officers who retire will begin second careers and pay into the Social Security system. This creates an unjust situation for many of our members—we are entitled to a pension because we paid into it for a full career, but we also worked jobs in which we fully paid into Social Security, which should entitle us to the same benefits paid to every other American.

While the G.P.O. impacts fewer people, its effect can sometimes be more profound. According to the Social Security Administration, of those directly affected by the G.P.O., 52% were spouses and 48% were widows or widowers. An astounding 70% of all those affected by the G.P.O. had their benefits fully eliminated. The money we paid into the system won't go to our eligible survivor as is the case with every other American but will remain in the Trust Fund to pay for someone else's benefit. Do you not see how outrageously unfair this is to public employees and their spouses?

Additionally, the profession of law enforcement is facing an existential crisis in recruiting the next generation of law enforcement officers, and the very existence of the W.E.P. and G.P.O. discourages anyone from choosing a career in public service. When a prospective candidate learns that any Social Security credits and benefits, they have or will earn in the private sector will be reduced, it makes a career in policing far less attractive.

For 4O years, Congress has avoided addressing the long-term viability of Social Security and used that as justification to NOT repeal W.E.P. and G.P.O. Instead, Congress has knowingly embraced these unfair provisions while ignoring the victimization of the very people in our society that work so hard for fairness. Public employees did not create the destabilization of the social security system, yet we are the only class of employees that Congress is forcing to give up our earned benefits. How is it fair to make public employees pay the same rate into social security as every other American, and then legislate away the same benefits afforded to others? We are not asking for special treatment, or anything more than we have fairly earned. We are simply asking for equal treatment!

The Windfall Elimination Provision and Government Pension Offset is wrong, unfair, and frankly dishonest. If this scheme was being run by a pension board or private money management group instead of the Social Security Administration, we would not call it an "elimination of a windfall" or an "offset"—it would be called embezzlement.

One entity enriching itself by denying a benefit earned by an individual is criminal and that is exactly what Congress is doing through W.E.P./G.P.O. Ultimately, this is about fairness to the men and women who have sworn to serve and protect America's communities.

Instead, we are treated as 2nd class citizens and are subject to arbitrary formulas that reduce benefits for which we have been fully taxed and to which we are entitled to. Both provisions should be repealed immediately, and I urge the Committee to get back to Washington and pass H.R. 82, the "Social Security Fairness Act."

Mr. Chairman, I want to thank you and the other Members of this distinguished Committee for the chance to appear before you today. I would be happy to answer any questions you have."



US Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs "Stopping the Flow of Fentanyl: Public Awareness and Legislative Solutions."

On January II, 2024, I had the honor of testifying before the United States Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs during a hearing titled "Stopping the Flow of Fentanyl: Public Awareness and Legislative Solutions." Joining me were Jason "Jelly Roll" DeFord, whose personal story of addiction and recovery is a testament to resilience and hope, and Christopher J. Urben, a respected voice in counter-narcotics efforts.

Engaging with Jason and hearing his powerful account of overcoming addiction was a highlight of this experience. His journey illustrates the critical importance of compassion, public education, and sound policy solutions in confronting this epidemic.

I want to extend my sincere thanks to Senator Sherrod Brown for his leadership in convening this hearing and for his commitment to addressing the fentanyl crisis through legislation and public awareness. His dedication to saving lives and supporting law enforcement resonates far beyond Capitol Hill.

Below is an excerpt from my oral testimony:

"In 2021 alone, more than 100,000 Americans died from drug overdoses, with fentanyl accounting for 65% of these deaths. The National Institute on Drug Abuse has reported that overdose death rates surged by nearly 750% between 2015 and 2021, driven primarily by fentanyl and its analogs. In 2022, the toll rose to almost 110,000, making synthetic opioids the leading cause of death for Americans aged 18–49.

Drug cartels exploit precursor chemicals sourced from China to manufacture counterfeit pills designed to look like prescription medications, deceiving countless Americans into unwittingly consuming lethal substances. The DEA estimates that 40–60% of these counterfeit pills contain a deadly dose of fentanyl. Taking even one can be fatal.

Despite unprecedented seizures—more than 379 million potentially deadly doses in one year alone—the death toll continues to rise. Our officers are on the front lines of this crisis every day. We are the first to respond to overdoses, to save lives with Narcan, and, far too often, to deliver the tragic news to grieving families.

The Fraternal Order of Police believes addressing this epidemic requires a comprehensive national strategy—one that disrupts trafficking networks, imposes sanctions on criminal organizations, prioritizes anti-money laundering enforcement, and expands resources to save lives.

The FOP was proud to work closely with Chairman Brown and Ranking Member Scott in developing S.1271, the FEND Off Fentanyl Act. This bipartisan legislation targets the fentanyl supply chain—from Chinese chemical suppliers to Mexican cartels—and directs critical resources to law enforcement to interdict shipments and prosecute traffickers.

We strongly support the bill's provisions to impose sanctions, increase accountability, and authorize the use of forfeited assets to strengthen enforcement. All these tools will help reduce the number of Americans who suffer and die from fentanyl and similar opioids—a goal that should unite us all.

We can and must act with urgency—through vigorous interdiction of the supply chain, relentless pursuit of traffickers, expanded Narcan availability, and swift passage of the FEND Off Fentanyl Act.

Finally, Mr. Chairman, I would be remiss if I did not thank you for your leadership on \$.1514, the HELPER Act. This legislation, modeled after the VA's successful home loan program, would create homeownership opportunities for first responders and educators and help address the recruitment and retention challenges facing our profession."

The fentanyl crisis continues to devastate communities in every part of the country. The Fraternal Order of Police remains committed to working with our federal partners and lawmakers to ensure that law enforcement officers have every resource and tool necessary to combat this epidemic and save lives.



House of Representatives Committee on Homeland Security Hearing: Assassination Attempt on Former President Donald J. Trump

In the aftermath of the attempted assassination of former President Donald J. Trump in Butler, Pennsylvania, I had the honor of testifying before the House Committee on Homeland Security on behalf of the more than 377,000 members of the Fraternal Order of Police.

My testimony underscored the extraordinary courage and professionalism demonstrated that day by the United States Secret Service and the state and local law enforcement officers who acted decisively to protect lives under fire.

I began by expressing deep admiration for the Secret Service agents whose selfless actions placed them between incoming gunfire and the former President. Their bravery, along with the commitment of state and local officers, exemplified the very best of our profession. I also offered condolences to the family of Corey Comperatore, who was tragically killed, and to all those injured during this horrific attack.

In my remarks, I emphasized the critical importance of the shared mission of law enforcement in this country. With more than 90% of public safety services delivered by over 18,000 state and local agencies, our decentralized system requires continuous cooperation, trust, and clarity of roles among all partners.

I highlighted that while the Secret Service bears full operational responsibility for protective missions—including site selection, security planning, and perimeter designation—state and local agencies provide indispensable support, personnel, and community insight that federal resources alone cannot replicate. To suggest otherwise is a fundamental misunderstanding of the collaborative model that has long safeguarded our leaders and the public.

Despite the extraordinary heroism displayed in Butler, there were undeniable failures in security planning and execution. It is essential that we learn from these failures to strengthen protective operations—especially as we approach an election season that will place unprecedented demands on all levels of law enforcement. I expressed confidence in the readiness of state and local agencies to continue supporting the Secret Service in meeting this challenge.

I also took the opportunity to address a persistent obstacle to effective joint operations: interoperable communications. Since 9/II, Congress has invested significantly through FirstNet to close critical gaps in voice and data communication. I urged both Congress and the FCC to prioritize continued development of FirstNet and promote its full adoption across all public safety agencies.

In the days following the hearing, public discourse shifted toward accountability. The Secret Service issued statements implying that local law enforcement bore responsibility for the attack. Then-Director Kimberly Cheatle repeated this claim in a televised interview—an assertion I publicly challenged. The Fraternal Order of Police released statements clarifying that the Secret Service held sole authority over planning, site designation, and operational decisions, and that attempts to deflect blame were both inaccurate and damaging to interagency trust.

After further dialogue, Director Cheatle personally called to acknowledge the critical contributions of state and local law enforcement and to accept that ultimate responsibility lies with the Secret Service. She subsequently made this acknowledgment public, followed by several senior resignations within the agency.

When Ronald Rowe was appointed Acting Director, he initially repeated the same inaccurate claims during congressional testimony. The FOP responded firmly to correct the record and reiterate the facts. This led to a productive meeting between our Executive Director and Acting Director Rowe. The following day, Mr. Rowe held a press conference in which he accepted full responsibility for the failures in Butler and praised the professionalism and heroism of Pennsylvania's state and local officers. He also emphasized the importance of partnership and clear communication at every level of law enforcement.

This series of events is a powerful reminder that transparency, accountability, and mutual respect are essential to maintaining public confidence and fulfilling our shared mission. The courage demonstrated in Butler must be matched by an equal commitment to learn from mistakes and strengthen the trust that underpins effective interagency cooperation.

We owe our deepest gratitude to all who responded that day and to every officer who continues to protect our communities and our democracy under the most challenging circumstances.

Our efforts to improve community and media relations over the past two years have firmly positioned the FOP as the leading and most respected voice of the law enforcement profession.



Leading the Way in Print Media Engagement


From 2019 through 2025, the Fraternal Order of Police maintained its position as the most frequently mentioned law enforcement organization among the nation's II major police groups.



She has established a consistent and compelling brand identity across all channels, introduced daily video content and timely, relevant graphics, and developed robust real-time news coverage that ensures our voice is heard in moments that matter most. Under her leadership, our Facebook audience alone has expanded by nearly 60,000 followers, and our engagement metrics are outperforming industry benchmarks across the board.

National FOP Executive Staff and Team Members



These two events brought together 37 FOP members in the first session and 26 for the second sessions, from across the country for in-depth engagement with AXON's leadership and development teams. The cost was covered by Axon.

Throughout the summit, participants had the opportunity to:

- Offer direct input and feedback on AXON's current and future technologies, ensuring the needs and perspectives of front-line officers are reflected in the design and improvement of core products.
- Engage in meaningful discussions on critical issues such as officer safety, crime-fighting strategies, and emerging

- Preview and experience AXON's latest technological solutions, including tools designed to increase transparency, improve situational awareness, and strengthen community trust.

One of the most compelling aspects of the summit was AXON's presentation of their ambitious Moonshot Goal—a commitment to reduce gun-related deaths between police and the public by 50% over the next decade. This vision aligns closely with the FOP's mission to promote the safety of our members and the communities we serve.

Our partnership with AXON ensures the FOP has a seat at the table as technology evolves and provides our members with access to cutting-edge resources, training opportunities, and solutions that improve outcomes in the field.

Law Enforcement Roundtable Sponsored by AT&T FirstNet

In March 2O24, the National Fraternal Order of Police hosted a landmark Law Enforcement Leadership Roundtable in Key West, Florida, bringing together some of the most respected thought leaders in American policing. This event was convened to examine the evolving challenges facing our profession, including recruitment and retention, workforce wellness, the drug and fentanyl epidemic, firearms crime, active shooter response, and the urgent need to strengthen trust between law enforcement and the communities we serve. Over the course of two days, participants engaged in candid discussions, shared their experiences, and offered innovative perspectives to help chart a path forward.

The roundtable assembled an extraordinary group of leaders, including Ray Kelly, Gil Kerlikowske, Eddie Garcia, Dave Mitchell, John Violanti, Jim Pasco, Terry Cunningham, James Smallwood, Darrel Stephens, and many others. In my opening remarks, I reminded attendees that we have more collective law enforcement experience in one room than anywhere else in the country, and that our profession has always risen to meet each era's defining challenges. From the crack wars of the 1990s to the post-9/II era and the nationwide unrest of 2020, law enforcement leaders have adapted and delivered for the communities we protect. The discussions in Key West reflected that same spirit of resolve and collaboration as we addressed today's most pressing issues.

This important initiative was generously underwritten by FirstNet Built by AT&T. I want to express my appreciation to Jim Bugel, Ryan Burchnell, and the entire FirstNet team for their steadfast partnership and their respect for our autonomy; they provided critical support for this event with no influence over the agenda or outcomes. As a result of these conversations, we emerged with a stronger shared understanding and a renewed commitment to advancing policies and practices that safeguard officers and the public alike. I am grateful to every participant for contributing their time, experience, and insight to this meaningful dialogue.



Continued Growth and Creation of Two New State Lodges

The Fraternal Order of Police continues to grow and strengthen its national footprint, expanding our representation and unifying our advocacy across every region. While we have maintained a local presence in all 50 states for decades, the establishment of new State Lodges marks a pivotal milestone in enhancing our structure and impact.

This year, I am proud to report that we formally welcomed two new State Lodges into the FOP family: the Montana State Lodge and the Vermont State Lodge.

Montana State Lodge

Please congratulate the eight local lodges in Montana for coming together to charter the newest State Lodge.

I had the distinct honor of installing the Montana State Lodge Executive Board in Bozeman, Montana—both in person and virtually—so that every member, regardless of location, could participate in this historic occasion.

With the formation of the Montana State Lodge, our members now have the organizational structure and resources to better advocate for their interests and address the unique challenges faced by law enforcement in their communities.

I want to extend special thanks to Brent Jex, whose tireless efforts to coordinate the chartering process were instrumental in bringing this vision to life. I am also grateful to former Montana Attorney General Timothy Fox for his steadfast advocacy and support of the FOP in Montana. Their combined leadership and dedication made this milestone possible.

Vermont State Lodge

Similarly, I am pleased to congratulate the nine local lodges in Vermont for coming together to form their new State Lodge, further strengthening our presence in the Northeast.

I had the privilege of installing the Vermont State Lodge Executive Board in Essex, Vermont, surrounded by members, supporters, and local leaders who have long worked to see this day arrive.

Like Montana, the Vermont State Lodge now provides our members with a cohesive, unified structure to:

- Advocate for legislation and policies specific to Vermont's law enforcement community
- Coordinate training and wellness initiatives
- Support officers and their families
- Promote professional excellence across the state

A special thank you goes to Massachusetts National Trustee Rich Shailor, whose leadership and guidance were critical in supporting the establishment of the Vermont State Lodge.

The addition of these two new State Lodges is a testament to the strength of our organization, the dedication of our members, and our commitment to expanding our ability to advocate effectively for law enforcement professionals across the nation.

Changes to the National Conference Starting in Miami Beach

In recent years, the Fraternal Order of Police has experienced exponential growth, both in membership and in the scope of our operations. However, the format and structure of our national conferences remained largely unchanged, creating mounting challenges in managing workload and ensuring that every priority could be addressed effectively within the limited timeframe.

To proactively address these concerns, the Executive Board established a National Committee to review and evaluate every aspect of the conference format, including:

- Agenda structure
- Session scheduling
- Event flow
- · Costs and funding mechanisms
- Member experience

Following this comprehensive assessment, the Committee—working in collaboration with the Executive Board—recommended several significant changes designed to modernize and strengthen our conferences.

Beginning here in Miami Beach, these updates include:

- A redesigned stage setup to improve visibility and create a more engaging environment for presentations and ceremonies.
- Increased use of electronic elements, such as enhanced audio-visual systems, digital voting capabilities, and dynamic displays to support content delivery and voting accuracy.
- Substantial adjustments to the agenda, rotating the order of days and start times to better accommodate critical functions, create more time for training, and increase opportunities for engagement with the Expo.
- Reconfigured Tuesday and Wednesday schedules, moving away from traditional early start times to allow members more time to attend training sessions and interact with exhibitors.

These changes are not cosmetic—they are part of a deliberate strategy to revitalize our conferences and ensure they remain relevant, efficient, and valuable for every attendee.

Finally, we are considering a constitutional provision change that would allow the National FOP itself to host future conferences, beginning as early as 2031. This potential shift could unlock opportunities for:

- Centralized planning and logistics
- Cost savings through a competitive Request for Proposal process
- Relieving State Lodges of the financial burden of hosting

These adjustments reflect our commitment to strengthening the conference experience and ensuring it remains a cornerstone of the Fraternal Order of Police's mission for years to come.

Financial Sustainability: A Proposal for Per Capita Adjustment

For IIO years, the Fraternal Order of Police has stood as the clear, undisputed voice of rank-and-file law enforcement officers. From early battles over fair pay and decent schedules to today's advocacy for officer wellness, legislative protections, and safer streets, the FOP has delivered results.

But delivering on this mission costs money—and the cost of running a modern, nationwide labor organization is rising at a pace not seen in more than 40 years.

Every state lodge understands this reality. Many of you have already taken steps to raise per-capita dues to keep pace with higher expenses—from insurance premiums to travel, technology upgrades, and compliance mandates.

At the national level, we delayed this conversation for over a decade. We did so by:

- Aggressive cost controls and reorganization, trimming expenses wherever possible
- **Expanding royalty programs** to bring in alternative revenue streams
- Redirecting millions of dollars into legislative advocacy, wellness initiatives, training, and media outreach

These strategies allowed us to grow from 325,000 members when I took office to nearly 379,000 today. They also helped us defeat hostile federal legislation, repeal the WEP/GPO penalties, and establish the FOP as the leading voice on officer wellness.

But no amount of cost-cutting can outrun economic reality forever. Inflation is eroding purchasing power. Cyber-insurance premiums have doubled. Health coverage for our staff is 28% more expensive. And roughly 12% of our budget comes from volatile royalties and grants that could vanish without notice.

In short: If we are serious about sustaining our momentum and planning for the next decade, we must strengthen the stable, dues-driven foundation that underpins everything we do.

The Proposal

After months of study and deliberation, the National Board of Trustees voted unanimously to recommend a phased national per-capita increase, to be presented to the delegates at this conference.

In plain terms, this proposal amounts to pennies per member—less than the price of a cup of coffee—phased in gradually over several years.

Even after full implementation by 2O29, the FOP would remain one of the least expensive national labor organizations in the United States, moving from 57th to only 54th in per-capita costs among 63 unions surveyed by Calibre CPA.

Why It Matters

- **Financial Stability:** Predictable dues revenue protects critical services if royalties decline, grants expire, or litigation arises.
- **Stronger Advocacy:** Growing past 400,000 members will require additional analysts, communications staff, and field resources to keep winning on Capitol Hill and in statehouses.
- **Member Programs:** Dues fund the National Peace Officers' Memorial Service, peer-support and wellness training, internal and external communications, and emergency responses during crises.
- **Future-Proofing:** With costs up 30% since our last increase in 2015, failing to adjust now would guarantee painful cuts later.

Ask yourself: How many times has your local or state lodge raised dues in the last two decades? Most will answer two, three, or more times—because it was the fiscally responsible choice. The National FOP is no different.

When delegates vote on this proposal, you will be deciding whether the FOP remains the dominant, unbreakable voice for America's police officers—or risks being out-spent and out-maneuvered by groups that do not share our mission.

Brothers and sisters, we have never been stronger. But strength must be maintained. I ask for your trust and your vote to invest a few cents per month so that, together, we can continue to shape the future of our profession.

National Fraternal Order of Police Foundation

The National Fraternal Order of Police Foundation stands as the charitable arm of our organization, reflecting compassion, generosity, and shared purpose that define the FOP. Through the combined support of membership dues, federal grants, and the contributions of corporate partners and civic-minded individuals, the Foundation advances a mission rooted in service to law enforcement officers, their families, and the communities they protect.

The Foundation's work is broad and impactful. It exists to honor our fallen heroes and ensure their sacrifices are never forgotten. It is dedicated to protecting the wellbeing of police officers through critical wellness initiatives and support programs. It empowers officers with training and resources that strengthen their ability to serve with professionalism and confidence. And when disaster strikes, the Foundation responds quickly to provide relief and assistance to first responders in need.

The following sections provide an update on the Foundation's efforts and highlight the ways this work continues to make a difference for our members and the public we are sworn to serve. Together, we remain committed to upholding the values of the Fraternal Order of Police and fulfilling our shared responsibility to care for those who stand watch over others.



43rd and 44th Annual National Peace Officers Memorial Service

On May 15, 2024, the Fraternal Order of Police and the FOP Auxiliary hosted the 43rd Annual National Peace Officers Memorial Service on the West Front of the United States Capitol. As the oldest annual national police memorial observance, this solemn tribute had become the cornerstone of National Police Week and the most powerful expression of our collective commitment to honor those who gave their lives protecting our communities. The 2024 service was marked by the presence of President Joe Biden, who delivered the keynote address. His remarks reflected the nation's gratitude and reminded all in attendance of the sacrifice and courage that define our profession.

The following year, on May 15, 2025, we gathered again on the Capitol grounds for the 44th Annual National Peace Officers Memorial Service. Vice President JD Vance served as the keynote speaker and shared a message of national appreciation and steadfast resolve. A video message from President Donald Trump, who was overseas at the time, was also presented. Together, these ceremonies drew more than 20,000 uniformed officers, survivors, and supporters from across the country to stand in solemn remembrance of our fallen heroes.

Each year's service honored officers whose names had been newly engraved on the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, D.C., including those who were lost in the prior year and others whose sacrifices were only recently recognized. The words shared from the podium served as a poignant reminder that law enforcement professionals embodied the highest ideals of public service and that our nation must never waver in its support for them.

I expressed my deepest gratitude to the dedicated army of volunteers, the soldiers of honor within the National Memorial Committee, our FOP staff, and the FOP Auxiliary, who devoted countless hours to ensure both ceremonies reflected the dignity and respect our fallen brothers and sisters deserved. As we moved forward, we renewed our solemn promise that their sacrifices would never be forgotten and that their legacy would live on in the service of those who continue to wear the badge with pride.

Officer Wellness Division

We are ordinary people who respond to a higher calling of public service, and at times, we are called upon to do extraordinary things. Police officers run toward danger when most people run away. Our agencies and our profession must be equally committed to running toward us with support, understanding, and care. We know that the work of policing takes a profound toll on our health, our relationships, and our lives. It is our obligation to look after one another and to ensure that no officer is left to struggle alone.

Since its inception, the National FOP Officer Wellness Division has become one of the foremost leaders in advancing officer wellness across the country. Under the outstanding leadership of Director Sherri Martin, the division has made tremendous strides in raising awareness, reducing stigma, and developing innovative programs to support our members. Director Martin's commitment and passion for this work have set a national example and earned widespread respect in the law enforcement community.

The FOP's Wellness Surveys are now widely recognized as the most comprehensive and credible reflection of the pulse of working officers' wellbeing and the challenges they face in today's environment. These surveys provide critical insight into the issues impacting our profession and help guide meaningful policy and practice.

Through a grant from the Bureau of Justice Assistance, the FOP has developed Power in Peers, a national wellness training program that is quickly becoming the standard for agencies seeking to establish or enhance their peer support initiatives. This program reinforces the principle that those who serve are often in the best position to help each other through shared understanding and trust.

Additionally, the FOP's Approved Service Provider Bulletin, supported by funding from the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services, offers clear standards and a nationwide directory of culturally competent resources for officers and their families. This tool helps agencies and individuals identify qualified providers who understand the unique demands of our profession.

I encourage all members to pay particular attention to Director Martin's report. The progress we have made—and the work still ahead—demands our collective commitment to ensuring that every officer has access to the support and care they deserve.



FOP Disaster Area Response Team (DART)

When disaster strikes, the true measure of an organization's character is revealed. This year, the Fraternal Order of Police Disaster Area Response Team (DART) once again demonstrated the unwavering commitment, compassion, and professionalism that define our mission of Cops Helping Cops. In the aftermath of Hurricane Helene, which brought devastating destruction to communities across Tennessee, North Carolina, and South Carolina, our DART volunteers mobilized without hesitation to deliver relief and hope to those most affected.

From the earliest hours of the response, DART teams established operations in Elizabethton, Tennessee, and Aiken, South Carolina, ensuring frontline law enforcement professionals could focus on their duties without worrying about their homes or families. Volunteers delivered hot meals and essential supplies, cleared debris from officers' properties, provided peer support and critical incident stress debriefings, and worked closely with local lodges and state leaders to identify urgent needs. In North Carolina, the State Lodge and Asheville Lodge created a comprehensive supply network that served first responders and residents alike. Special recognition goes to the National Chaplain Rick Snyder, whose compassionate leadership and spiritual guidance brought comfort to those struggling with loss and uncertainty.

I want to express my deepest appreciation to DART Chairman Jason Smith and every volunteer who deployed to assist. Their tireless dedication exemplifies the very best of our brotherhood and reinforces the truth that our support for one another is not just a slogan, it is a way of life.

I also want to extend high praise to our many corporate sponsors whose generous contributions make this initiative possible. Because of their support, the DART program remains fully self-funded, allowing us to respond swiftly and effectively whenever disaster strikes. To every individual, sponsor, and partner who answered the call, thank you. Your actions reflect the true heart of the Fraternal Order of Police and the extraordinary power of unity in times of crisis.

At the time of this report's submission, the Fraternal Order of Police Disaster Area Response Team (DART) is actively deploying to Kerrville, Texas, in response to catastrophic flash flooding following record-breaking rainfall over July 4th. Over 15 inches of rain fell across the Texas Hill Country, the Guadalupe River surged more than 3O feet in under four hours, and more than 100 lives have been lost, including dozens of children at Camp Mystic. The region experienced some of the deadliest flood conditions in decades, overwhelming responders and displacement hundreds of families.

In the wake of this tragedy, our DART Team is providing vital support to first responders in their time of greatest need. Beyond immediate physical aid—such as delivering hot meals, clearing debris, and restoring safe access to homes—we also offer peer support and critical incident debriefings to help officers manage trauma and burnout. Our volunteers are coordinating closely with state and local lodges to ensure efficient resource distribution and rapid assistance.

The DART Team stands ready to serve with professionalism, compassion, and unity. In the darkest hours, we remind officers and their communities they are not alone—and that when disaster strikes, the brotherhood and sisterhood of the FOP stands firmly beside them.



Tackling the High Cost of Healthcare

Affordable healthcare remains one of the most pressing concerns for law enforcement professionals, particularly as many officers retire earlier than those in other professions and face unique financial and medical challenges.

The National Fraternal Order of Police has undertaken multiple initiatives to address this critical need:

- Creation of the NFOP Healthcare Trust, which pools resources and leverages collective bargaining power to help FOP lodges negotiate cost-effective, comprehensive coverage.
- Partnerships with Aetna Medicare and Thin Blue Line Benefits to offer enhanced healthcare solutions for retired members—both pre-65 and post-65.

However, as you may be aware, in June I issued a memorandum to the National Board of Trustees concerning significant legal action filed against Thin Blue Line Benefits by the Ohio Attorney General. This lawsuit alleges failures to pay medical claims and other issues that directly impact members' coverage and peace of mind.

I have received numerous messages from members affected by delayed payments during Thin Blue Line's transition to a new third-party administrator, as well as messages of continued support for the product and appreciation for the services it has provided.

Our National General Counsel, Larry James, is in direct communication with the Ohio Attorney General's Office. He is actively evaluating the litigation's potential impact and advising the Executive Board on our next steps.

We have also met with Thin Blue Line leadership and are closely monitoring developments with the shared goal of addressing every member's concern thoroughly and transparently.

We understand how critical healthcare is to our members and their families. That is why the Executive Board, and I remain fully committed to addressing this matter with urgency, clarity, and a steadfast focus on protecting those who have placed their trust in these programs.

As more information becomes available, we will provide timely updates and guidance. The health and well-being of our members are—and will always remain—a top priority.

Closing Reflections: Moving Forward Together

As I conclude this report, I reflect on the remarkable journey we have undertaken together as guardians of justice. These past two years have been defining for the Fraternal Order of Police, marked by extraordinary triumphs, formidable challenges, and countless examples of resilience and unity.

Every obstacle we faced—every legislative battle, crisis, and moment of uncertainty—has served as a steppingstone for growth and a testament to the power of our shared purpose.

This year, our organization achieved a record-setting expansion, with membership surpassing 378,000 strong. That number is more than a milestone; it reflects the trust and confidence that law enforcement professionals across the country place in the FOP. It affirms our position as the dominant voice for law enforcement labor, a role we must continue to embrace with pride and responsibility.

We have made history, most notably through the repeal of the Windfall Elimination Provision and Government Pension Offset. This victory ended a four-decade injustice and demonstrated what is possible when we stand together with unwavering determination.

- Rising violence targeting officers in the line of duty
- Evolving demands on policing
- The need to advocate forcefully for fair treatment, adequate resources, and community trust

Brothers and Sisters,

Let me start by thanking the Florida State Lodge and every local lodge in the Miami Beach area for pulling off what will no doubt be an amazing conference for anyone attending. Your hard work, determination, and ability to overcome every challenge is appreciated by all. I would also like to thank the National Office Staff as they too put in a tremendous amount of work to make this conference a success. To everyone who had a hand, no matter how large or small, in making our conference a reality, a sincere thank you. Now make sure you all get some fun in the sun in Miami Beach!

Brothers and sisters, it has been an incredible honor representing every single member of this organization, and our noble profession, over the last 6 years. In that time, we have changed the way politicians, the media, and the general public react to law enforcement. For far too long our profession was silent while we became everyone's punching bag. Through our incredible work, everyone has been on notice that we punch back now! We will not remain silent as people attack police officers on streets, in the media, on social media and in the comments. The FOP is going to be right there fighting, standing up, and fulfilling our rightful place as the #I voice for law enforcement and frankly... the only voice!

If you had any doubts, we have absolutely crushed every other law enforcement group in this country in media mentions. Last year through our incredible work, we created over \$31.2 million dollars in free advertising for the FOP, all while pushing our message and defending our members. There wasn't another group in the same universe as us. We accomplished this through a relentless campaign of embracing every form of media, continuing our news appearances, growing our social media exponentially (more on that later), and destroying the false narratives through passionate, fact-based arguments.

When I stood before you in Vegas, I told you the goal was to continue to grow our organization and that long term, to unite everyone under one banner, the FOP banner. Happy to report we continue to grow by leaps and bounds. At the time of writing this report, we have over 380,000 members! We have never had anything close to this many members before! But it doesn't stop there, our legal services numbers have never been higher, our labor services have never been higher, and we just added two new state lodges in Vermont and Montana. That places a state lodge in 47 out of 50 states. By every metric you would measure the success of the Fraternal Order of Police, membership numbers, legal services numbers, labor numbers, chartering new lodges, we are absolutely killing it!

At this time, we spend next to nothing on recruitment, I am hopeful with increased funding we could take an even more robust recruiting posture, truly being aggressive in our efforts in areas that may not be FOP strong holds. We could assist local lodges with resources, to challenge other units who are not representing their members, even offering grant opportunities to them. Imagine conducting a national FOP recruiting campaign to bring in more members. The possibilities are endless and can fast track the goal of uniting every single law enforcement officer in this country under the FOP banner.

I would like to thank our legislative office for their tremendous work, so that we have the capability to track the media mentions and airtime of all national law enforcement groups. Thus, we can see where everyone stacks up and provide us the hard data of our success. I would also like to thank the FOP recruitment committee headed up by Rich Shailor, for their work in establishing new lodges across the country.

Social Media/National Media Coverage/Legislation

One of the most powerful levers we have to stay on top of the mountain and continue to show our dominance, is our social media presence. Over the past 6 years we have grown exponentially across a number of platforms, but

we have really taken off like a rocket in the last 9 months, after brining on our Social Media Administrator, and resident dynamo Savannah Nelson. Savannah has done an exceptional job mining content, creating original graphics and truly turning our platforms into essentially our own news/entertainment platforms for all things impacting law enforcement. Her work has been phenomenal and greatly appreciated by us all (I have included a report from her at the conclusion of mine).

As a result of the incredible work of our social media Director and the Social Media Committee, we have seen our Facebook page balloon to over 220,000 followers, with post engagements up 449%. Our Instagram page now boasts over 63,000 followers with our impressions up a staggering 305%. Our X page has nearly 79,000 followers now with retweets up 131% and likes 141%. What does all that mean, it means we are kicking ass and taking names on our social media platforms. Overall, our engagements rates across social media have increased by 400%.

It is not uncommon to have posts reaching millions of people and our Instagram routinely reaches in excess of 6 millions people a month. Our voice over the last 2 years has only grown stronger and louder than before. So how do we use this larger, more powerful voice? Well of course we use it to defend our profession, punch politicians in the mouth who bad mouth us, support politicians who support us, talk about the War on Cops raging in this country, and highlighting the violence against law enforcement. But we have also pivoted to becoming the #I source of positive stories and content about our profession.

We all know the national media rarely, if ever, cover positive police stories. So we decided that we would fill that role. We have spammed the social media world with all the positive law enforcement stories we can find. From fundraising and work in the community, to the incredible heroism exhibited on a daily basis by our members. We are pulling amazing body cam videos to show the public first hand, what we do. We are showing them how we save children, families, how we save each other, how we are willing to risk our very lives to protect the communities we love and serve. The best part is, the message is resonating. Don't take my word for it, just look at the incredible numbers above. Now the national media seed our posts about our members and they actually pick some of these stories and run them nationally, only increasing our reach.

A massive success of our social media strategy was also on display during the historic endorsement of President Trump. Of course, our endorsement reached millions on social media, two X (tweets) posts reached approx. 50 million people alone. But since we have positioned ourselves as the voice for law enforcement the attention paid to our endorsement was nothing like we have ever seen. President Trump traveled to our Fall Board Meeting to accept the endorsement. The entire endorsement became an event, must watch TV. We had every single national news outlet and some international outlets attend our meeting. They were live steaming it nationally on Fox, and other national networks. The follow up of the story lasted days, with them constantly running it, all with the FOP brand proudly displayed. I am not sure I have ever done as many interviews as I did that week. It was an incredible, historic moment for the FOP, but we were only in a position to be so prominent because we had laid the foundation prior, of being the ONLY real voice for law enforcement.

Another beneficial result of our huge following is the ability to not only mobilize our members, but the general public who supports us. None more successful than HR 82. Through President Yoes and Executive Director Jim Pasco's incredible, historic work, they were able to keep HR 82 alive and center stage at the close of the last legislative session. We were then able to mobilize thousands of people in the 11th hour to contact their Representatives/ Senators to push them to vote for this historic legislation. We had police officers, firefighters, teachers, friends, family, random supporters all rallying around the passage of the bill, simply because we were able to reach them with our social media platforms. We became so good at pushing out information that people who belonged to our organizations and other professions, were contacting the FOP to get the latest breaking news throughout all the twists and turns. I can think of no greater compliment than people coming to us as their trusted source of information, even over the very organizations they belong to! The passage of HR 82 will go down as one of the greatest legislative achievements in the history of the FOP and it was truly a life-changing event for so many of our members. Thank you to everyone who made a call, sent an email, and encouraged others to do the same. It is incredible what we can accomplish when we all row in the same direction and work towards a common goal.

We will continue to use our platforms to tackle the next legislative priority, the "Protect and Serve Act". It is no secret to anyone that there is a War on Cops in this country that has been raging for years. The last three years we have seen over IIOO police officers shot, and we average an abhorrent, one police officer shot every 24 hours in America. It is disgusting, it is a stain on our society and an embarrassment to our great nation. Thankfully, we have

seen a slight downward trend and as we have pointed out in the past, leadership in this country counts for something. We see President Trump and VP Vance, constantly talking about the violence, how it is not acceptable in America and how the dirtbags who perpetrate it should be held accountable to the fullest extent of the law. Leadership matters, and their strong support for law enforcement, is making a difference. But now the rest of the politicians need to step up and do their job.

We all know deterrence only works if the punishment is swift and severe. Right now these dirtbags who assault/ target police officers get neither. They are getting the velvet glove treatment from rogue prosecutors and activist judges, and their cases are sometimes delayed for years. So what happens when there are no consequences, these monsters run wild. We will continue to use our social media platforms to educate the people on why this violence is happening, while in conjunction with the Washington office, push for the passage of the "Protect and Serve Act". This bill would give federal prosecutors the ability to take the cases out of the local DA's hands and take them to federal court. Where instead we will see these dirtbags get their asses thrown in federal prison, exactly where they belong. When people start getting federal time for assaulting cops, the punishment will certainly be swift and severe.

As a result of our efforts to spread the FOP's message about law enforcement, whether it be the War on Cops, the heroism we show in the field, or the positive work in the community, I have appeared in hundreds of national interviews. I have made regular appearances on Fox and Friends, Fox and Friends First, America Reports, America's Newsroom, Laura Ingraham, Fox Nation (online platform), Dan Bongino Show (since retired), Lawrence Jones Coast to Coast, Sunday Night with Trey Gowdy, Your World with Neil Cavuto, Jesse Waters Primetime, Fox News at Night, Fox Live and several other fox news programs. In addition, I must thank Fox Business who has been gracious enough to have me on the Evening Edit, hosted by my good friend Elizabeth McDonald, on a regular basis. I also appear on Mornings with Maria and various other Fox Business programs.

I continue to accept interviews from outlets that may not be as law enforcement friendly. I participated in a 30 minute interview for MSNBC on recruitment and retention and of course they never even ran the interview. But I won't stop taking opportunities to talk about the issues impacting us. In addition, I make regular appearances (almost every week) on Newsmax across a wide array of their shows talking all issues impacting law enforcement.

Always with an eye in growing our reach and influence, Treasurer Smallwood and I continue to refine and change our Leadership Matters class. In our last class we taught FOP leaders how to prepare, conduct, and then spread interviews. The ability to share this knowledge ensures that every lodge leader has the tools to spread their message and give a great interview. We have also been able to refer national news outlets to local lodge leaders to increase the exposure of lodges and their issues on the national stage. This has developed into a very deep bench for the FOP when national news appearances are requested. We have developed a cast of strong, intelligent, charismatic leaders that can carry the message of the Fraternal Order of Police.

Thank you for reading this far!

Remaining the #1 trusted voice (and only) for law enforcement is not easy. It is a daily grind, against blood thirsty politicians, some in the media and the general denigration and demonization of our profession. But this is the job, if we don't stand up for the hard-working men and women of law enforcement, then who will! As the voice of law enforcement, we have a responsibility to this generation of police officers and the next, to make sure we have their back, and the public knows the heroism we display every day.

It has been an honor serving as your Vice President over the last 6 years. This position, and all the responsibility you have trusted me with, is sacred to me. Knowing that when I speak, I speak for over 380,000 heroes has been the honor of my life. I would be remiss if I didn't thank each and every one of you for the support. Without that incredible support and trust, I would not be here! I am so excited to see what the future holds for the Fraternal Order of Police as we continue to grow to historic numbers that most would have thought of as a dream. I want to thank President Yoes for his incredible leadership and the entire Executive Board for their outstanding work and emphasis on working together as a team.

Executive Summary

Before the Social Media Coordinator role was established in late 2O24, the National Fraternal Order of Police (NFOP) did not have a dedicated person managing social media. Since stepping into this role, I have driven significant growth that clearly demonstrates the value of this investment.

By applying a consistent, data-driven approach focused on targeted content, emotional storytelling, and timely engagement, we have gained 54,428 new followers across Facebook, Instagram, and X (formerly Twitter). This represents an overall growth of about 22%, with follower numbers continuing to rise steadily—fueled by more frequent posting and ongoing improvements based on performance data.

These results are the product of deliberate effort, real-time responses to major events, continuous analysis, and a strong commitment to excellence. This role has been my pride and joy, and I hope that dedication shows in every aspect of my work. Social media isn't something you can set and forget; meaningful growth requires constant monitoring and adjustment. Social media isn't something you can set and forget — it requires constant attention, strategy, and dedication to keep our message strong and our community engaged.

As the voice of the nation's law enforcement, the NFOP is embracing a new era of communication and advocacy through digital media—strengthening our reach, connection, and impact. Looking ahead, we plan to expand video content on Instagram Reels, increase production of original content, and explore emerging platforms to continue growing our reach and engagement among younger officers.

Instagram was our fastest-growing platform, with follower growth up nearly 40% and reach surging over 320%. In May 2025, our posts reached 118% of our audience—evidence of strong sharing and discovery beyond our follower base.

Our top-performing post, a tribute to Chris Kyle, reached over 916,000 accounts and earned more than 124,000 likes, showing the power of emotionally resonant, patriotic content. Total impressions hit 22.13 million, with nearly I million likes overall.

Our hashtag performance data highlights several key hashtags that consistently drive reach and engagement, proving valuable for strategic content placement.

- **#FOPStrong** is the most frequently used hashtag with strong engagement between 6.85% and 9.80%, making it a reliable choice for Fraternal Order of Police-related content.
- Safety-related hashtags like #SaferCommunities, #PublicSafetyMatters, and #CourageToServe each
 appear multiple times with consistent engagement around 8.3%, supporting posts focused on public safety and
 community.
- Veteran and military hashtags such as **#ChrisKyle** and **#AmericanSniper** show the highest reach (up to 917,000) and engagement (~13.9%), indicating their strong impact despite less frequent use.
- Wellness-related tags like **#TherapyCat** and **#WellnessOfficer** also achieve high engagement (II-I3.5%) with substantial reach, ideal for mental health and officer wellness content.
- Political and memorial hashtags (e.g., #Trump2O24, #NeverForget) demonstrate moderate but steady engagement, suitable for targeted messaging.
- Niche tags such as #InTheLineOfDuty have lower reach and engagement, best used for localized or specific posts.
- Specialized hashtags like #InTheLineOfDuty and #PoliceDog have lower engagement (around 2.25%) and reach, suggesting they are best reserved for targeted or local content.

Summary:

Prioritizing high-performing and consistently used hashtags—especially #FOPStrong and safety-focused tags—combined with high-impact veteran and wellness hashtags, will enhance both reach and engagement across our social media platforms.

Overall Observations & Strategic Insights

Content Volume Drives Engagement

The dramatic increase in post frequency—particularly on Facebook and Twitter/X—has resulted in exponential engagement growth. This confirms that a robust, consistent posting schedule is essential to maintaining audience interest and performing well within platform algorithms. This growth has been strategic, not accidental — and it shows.

Emotional Storytelling Resonates

Posts that highlight personal stories, heroic acts, tributes, and K9s consistently generate the highest reach and engagement. Whether it's a father in uniform comforting his daughter or an officer carrying a child to safety, emotionally charged content has proven to be one of our most powerful connection tools. These moments humanize the badge — and our followers respond to that.

Video Content is Key

Reels and short-form videos yield some of the strongest engagement rates across platforms. Content that combines cinematic footage with officer voiceovers, dispatch audio, or stirring music dramatically outperforms traditional posts. Continued investment in video—especially content with captions and subtitles to improve accessibility—will be key to sustaining momentum and growing viewership.

Audience Expansion Beyond Followers

On Instagram, many posts are reaching more accounts than the total follower count—an indication that content is being shared widely and discovered by new users. This presents a significant opportunity to grow our audience organically through shareable, discoverable content. Video and tribute content are especially effective at reaching outside our immediate follower base.

Platform Nuances Matter

Each platform plays a unique role in our communications strategy. Facebook remains our strongest tool for reach and engagement within our target demographic. Twitter/X supports our real-time advocacy and policy efforts, while Instagram thrives on emotional, visual storytelling that builds connection. Knowing what each platform does best allows us to tailor content for maximum impact.

In Summary

The growth of our social media presence over the past several months reflects the strength of a focused, intentional strategy. Increased content volume, emotionally resonant storytelling, and platform-specific targeting have driven significant gains in reach, engagement, and audience expansion.

Looking ahead, there are clear opportunities to build on this momentum: creating original, on-the-ground content, leveraging premium editing tools to enhance efficiency and quality, and embracing a hybrid work model to support the evolving demands of this role.

With continued investment and flexibility, we can deepen our connection with officers, increase brand visibility, and further position the National FOP as a leading voice for law enforcement across digital platforms.

Introduction

Brothers and Sisters, welcome to the 67th Biennial Conference here in Miami Beach. I, along with the members of the Florida State Lodge stand ready to assist you in any way we can while you and your family are with us here in the "Sunshine State". A special thanks goes to the Florida District 6 Director and Conference Chairman, Al Palacio and Miami Lodge 20 President, Felix DelRosario, Co-Chairman. These Brothers and their TEAM of volunteers have planned everything for us to have a great conference. Please give them a hearty FOP handshake and a kind word for their hard work and dedication.

There have been some changes to the conference that we hope you like. Our goal is to make it more engaging, informative, and streamlined. We were able to extend our EXPO hours by an additional day giving you and your families an extra day to visit our vendors and sponsors. Please take the opportunity to thank each one for their support.

Since our last conference, Las Vegas 2023, there have been numerous major personnel changes in the National Office. Mrs. Leigh Ann Pemperton Kruggel retired as our Office Manager after 30 years of service at the National FOP. We wish Leigh Ann well. We promoted my Executive Assistant, Mrs. Angie Hoover, to Office Manager. Mrs. Teri Crone was promoted to the National Secretary's Executive Assistant and Mrs. Lori Harris was promoted to Accounts Receivables. Miss Abigail Muncy, who was hired shortly after the last conference for Membership, was transferred to Receptionist. Due to turnover in Membership, we are fortunate to have on our team Mr. Elijah Brewer and Mr. Gavin Boler. We also have a new EXPO/EVENTS Coordinator on board, Ms. Caprice Campbell and a newly created position of Social Media/Graphics Design Coordinator, Ms. Savannah Nelson. Please introduce yourself to our staff and join me in letting them know how much we appreciate them.

During the past 2 years, my focus has been on the development of our new membership database system. Many resources and manpower have been devoted to accomplishing this. Every department, division, and section of the National FOP has been a part of this process since our new system, when fully implemented, will be an ultramodern program that will allow the local and state lodges to gather and use information they have not been able to do in the past. ACGI "Association Anywhere" built the system. Mr. Andrew Bittner started the project off for the National FOP with the assistance of Mr. Matthew Phillips. Most recently we engaged, as consulting engineers, Mr. Steve Kim and Mr. Mark Hong. Both men have extensive IT engineering backgrounds with Google and Amazon. Mr. Hong will attend the conference to assist me in training on the new system. The new system will roll out in two initial phases. Phase one is now with basic membership management. Phase two will include more advanced features and is scheduled to "go live" by the end of the year. A special thanks goes to all these men for their tireless dedication to us all.

In addition to the membership project, the operations of the National Office, and my duties as your National Secretary I have been extremely busy assisting our National President and our Executive Board. I had the honor of working on the advocation of the repeal of the Windfall Elimination Provision (Social Security Fairness). We did it and each of you should be proud of what you did, collectively, in making it happen. I was further honored to be invited to the White House when President Biden signed the legislation into law. I was equally honored to have attended President Trump's inauguration and to have been a part of the Urban Cities Committee meeting with President Trump and Attorney General Pam Bondi. The meeting was greatly successful as we addressed pending issues such as the rise in assaults on law enforcement officers, unlawful immigration, no income tax on overtime, retention and recruitment issues, and the restoration of surplus military equipment to our agencies.

We continue to find ways to improve services for our members and cut costs. We are currently reviewing the various maintenance and service agreements we have with numerous vendors. As an example, the National Headquarters was approved to have a new roof installed at a cost of around \$150,000.00. The current roof is at the end of life since it is over 20 years old and leaks have begun to develop. After further investigation, we believe we can get a better roof installed at approximately \$60,000.00 less than the original requests for proposals. Staff also monitor mailing costs and convenience charges for debit and credit card fees. My point is that our staff are continuously looking for savings that benefit our membership. They are truly family.

In closing, I will be adding an addendum to this report since it's being put together 6O days prior to the conference. I will include any actions as close as I can for your review and approval. As I previously mentioned about being honored to participate in several projects and events, the highest honor is to serve as your National Secretary. If I can be of service to you, answer a question, give advice, or help you with an issue, I stand ready. Please make your way to my desk at the conference to say hi. Let's take care of business, see our friends, and have a good time.



ADENDUM TO THE NATIONAL SECRETARY'S REPORT - JULY 30, 2025

Brothers and Sisters, again, I welcome you to Miami Beach for the 67th Biennial National Fraternal Order of Police Conference. Here is an update on several important bits of information.

MEMBERSHIP

As of today, we have 382,239 members of which 1,532 are suspended for non-payment of per capita. There are 2219 local lodges.

NEW MEMBERSHIP DATABASE SYSTEM

ACGI, commonly known as Association Anywhere, is our new membership database partner. As I have previously reported, this has been a three plus year project. Our goal was to roll out and go live on June 3Oth, 2O25, however, due to data conversion issues and the need to make sure that the credentialling process runs smoothly for this conference, I decided to delay implementation until after the conference.

Lodges **MUST NOT** enter any changes into VUE on and after August 12th, 2O25. If there is an absolute need to enter member information on or after this date, please contact Roxie at rhollis@fop.net, any membership depart representative, or myself. We will be doing a final "data dump" of information from VUE to the new system. If everything goes according to our plan, the ACGI will "go live" on August 19, 2O25.

We will be conducting training on the new system during the conference and will be conducting a series of training sessions afterwards. These training sessions will be either by zoom, recorded PowerPoints, or a few in person.

The initial "roll out" is the basic membership tracking system which we refer to as Phase 1. Between now and the end of the year, we will be implementing Phase 2 which will be enhancements to the basic system. My aspirational goal is to have a Phase 3 in 2O26 which will include electronic membership cards with individual member QR codes.

We are excited about our new system and do thank you for your help with its development.

ACTION ITEMS BY THE NATIONAL EXECUTIVE BOARD SINCE THE SPRING 2025 BOARD OF TRUSTEES'S MEETING IN SALT LAKE CITY

On March 27th, 2O25, at 6:30 PM (CST) VP Gamaldi moved that the NFOP enter into an agreement with the Gratitude Program. This program is in place for children of military veterans to receive scholarships for higher education and is being offered to expand into children of law enforcement officers. 2nd by Treasurer Smallwood. Motion passed.

On April 9th, 2O25, at 11:OOAM (EST), by consensus the E-Board followed the recommendations of President Yoes on the appointment of representatives of the Congressional Memorial Medal Board. 2nd Vice President Hoyt currently serves.

A motion was made by Secretary Holderfield, second by Sgt at Arms James to approve the newly revised employee handbook. Motion unanimously passed.

On April 10th, 2025 at 5:45PM (CST) President Yoes presented a recommendation from Director of Wellness Martin for the National FOP to participate in the "GUIDE APP" which is developed for first responders to review the various clinicians, facilities and programs available. Motion By VP Gamaldi to approve. 2nd by 2nd VP Hoyt. Motion passed.

On May 21st, 2025 at II:OOAM (EST) President Yoes made a request to grant an Honorary Membership to Michael Rayner for his major contribution to the National Memorial Service. Motion by Secretary Holderfield. 2nd by Chairman Pride. Motion passed.

On June 22nd, 2025 at 7:15PM (CST) Treasurer Smallwood moved that we approve the presented general operating budget and the Foundation Budget for the 2025-2026 budget cycle. Second by Secretary Holderfield. Motion passed.
On July 8th, 2025 at 11:00AM (CST) VP Gamaldi made a request to allow Membership Chairman Shailor obtain a booth at the 2025 National Interdiction Conference, to be held in Charleston, South Carolina, from September 7–12 for \$1,200.00 plus his transportation, meals and lodging for the purpose of recruiting membership into the FOP. 2nd by Chairman Pride. Motion passed.

Brothers & Sisters, welcome to Miami!

Before I begin, I want to take this opportunity to thank the Florida and Miami beach lodges for their efforts in bringing us all to this city and making this a great conference! I look forward to spending time conducting the business of the order with all of you this week and enjoying a little down time as well.

Since we last met, your National FOP has been hard at work, and I am proud of what we have seen from that hard work. From presidential elections to DART deployments, the passage of the monumental WEP/GPO legislation at congress, and everything in-between, the FOP has delivered results to its members far and wide! For decades, we have been working to reverse the government theft that is WEP/GPO and, finally, we have crossed the finish line on that legislation due to the relentless efforts of President Yoes, our legislative team in Washington D.C, the executive board, and the greatest thing about the FOP, all of you!

When we put out our call to action, you mobilized. The strength of our power in numbers was immediately evident when you began calling and emailing your representative members of congress and demanding action. I saw it change votes first-hand and it refreshed my belief that when we act together on anything, there is nothing we cannot accomplish!

Now, on to the work of the treasurer's office. As you will note in the included reports, the balance of the FOP maintains at a steady number year after year. This is in large part to our affinity sponsorship revenue; something I will delve into a bit more later in this report. We are continuing to monitor our investment funds and our management strategy thereof. So far, we have been resilient to much of the market volatility because of these sound strategies.

I am continuing to work on the revision of our corporate affairs and user policies and hope to have them completed soon. I have also been working diligently with members of the executive board and legislative committee in trying to enhance PAC participation. As it relates to that, and as discussed earlier, the FOP is actively engaged in legislative advocacy that supports you in our profession and beyond. The sphere of that advocacy requires funding to get things done. Currently, our PAC, while growing, is at an abysmal number. If you are not contributing, I ask you to consider a simple \$5,\$IO,\$I5, or more,



monthly contribution. Your participation will go a long way towards supporting the legislative priorities of the NFOP. You can scan the QR code included here to contribute.

Moving on, something I'm sure you all have either heard about or have had discussions about is the upcoming per capita increase proposal. As a dues paying member, I can assure you, this is not a topic I, or anyone on the executive board for that matter, takes lightly. The harsh reality is that we have not experienced an increase in per capita to support the NFOP operation for ten years. While we would love to be able to control the costs of things, over the course of the last ten years, we have seen a significant rise in the cost of doing business.

To compensate for that rising cost, the NFOP has continually worked to find alternative revenue sources, like the aforementioned affinity sponsorships. As your treasurer, it is important that I bring my concerns to you regarding our over reliance on these revenue sources, as they are now supporting approximately 12% of the core services the FOP provides in our overall budget. As a dues driven organization, we should not be utilizing affinity dollars to support our core functions. We should be using them to explore new horizons and expand into new ideas or markets.

In conjunction with the NFOP executive board, and a long discussion with the national board of trustees, the NFOP has unanimously approved amending the original per capita proposal to the following: The NFOP per capita will increase two times, at the rate of \$3.00 each time. The first \$3.00 increase will occur in FY 26-27 and the second \$3.00 increase will occur in FY 29-30. Essentially, this will be a \$6.00 increase over the course of almost 20 years when accounting for the last time per capita was increased. I know this topic is not the most appealing to everyone, and I am certain there will be lively debate on the business floor. While that is expected, I encourage everyone to remember that the FOP is an organization comprised of brothers and sisters who are working tirelessly to serve their communities and each other. Lively debate is great, but let us all leave the hall, however this is decided, with our heads held high knowing that we conducted an objective and professional review of the issue, and cast our vote, absent our political alignments, ensuring the strength of the order for generations to come is at the core of our decision. In closing, it continues to be the greatest honor of my lifetime to serve this organization and each of you as your national treasurer. I am humbled daily by your trust in me to lead and a cannot thank you enough for affording me this opportunity. As a point of personal privilege, I am seeking re-election to the office of treasurer, and I would be grateful if you would consider lending me your support once again. As always, if there is ever anything myself, or my office, can do for you, please don't hesitate to reach out.

My Brothers and Sisters,

Over the past two years, I've had the privilege of traveling across our great nation to attend National, State, and local conferences and board meetings. I remain deeply grateful for the warm hospitality extended to me at every stop. Your support and camaraderie have made me feel not only welcomed—but truly valued. I do not take that for granted.

As I reflect on this first term serving as your Second Vice President, I'm proud of what we've accomplished together. But I'm even more energized by the work that remains. My commitment for this next term is clear: to maintain this momentum, continue engaging with members across the country, and make sure your voices guide the direction of our organization. If we haven't met yet—we will.

Addressing Officer Wellness

From the outset of my first term, one of my top priorities was helping address the mental health challenges our members face. Tragically, our profession continues to experience a rise in officer suicides. Many of us have lost a friend, a colleague, or a partner to this silent crisis. We cannot and will not ignore it.

To confront this challenge head-on, I partnered with several courageous members to create a wellness initiative focused on practical, accessible stress management tools. This new program is not a replacement for existing services, it's a supplemental, officer-driven resource tailored to the realities of our job.

We know that asking for help isn't easy. We are the helpers. That cultural barrier is one of the reasons officers often suffer in silence. Our program aims to break that cycle by offering simple, anonymous, and effective resources that can be used privately—anytime, anywhere.

Included in this report is a barcode linking directly to the platform. By scanning it, you'll find instructional videos demonstrating proven mental wellness techniques. These are quick, scientifically supported tools designed specifically for law enforcement. Most importantly—they work.

In the summer of 2O24, I was honored to serve on the National Presidential Screening Committee. I'm grateful for the trust the National FOP placed in me to represent our members during this critical process.

We met face-to-face with then-candidate and now President Donald Trump. During that meeting, we underscored the urgent need to repeal the Social Security Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP), a policy that unjustly penalized our members. We also advocated for the Protect and Serve Act—legislation that remains critical in light of the alarming increase in assaults and ambushes against law enforcement officers.





Greetings from sunny and HOT Arizona!

I'm even more excited to say that to all of you after HR-82, the Social Security Fairness Act, passed the U.S. Senate and was ceremonially signed into law by President Biden!

The amount of work, up to and including the final hours of the Senate vote, cannot be overstated. On December 11th, FOP and IAFF joined forces again to host a rally at Senate Park in Washington D.C. It was truly my honor to represent all of Arizona at that rally.

Second Vice President Goitia and I were invited to and attended an election event for now Congressman Hamadeh. This started with a round table where Speaker of the House, Mike Johnson attended to discuss the future. Also in attendance was Kari Lake. We were subsequently invited to Congressman Hamadeh's election night party and we were joined at that event by Vice President Watts.

As for Kari Lake, I notified her that AZFOP was indeed endorsing her. She subsequently invited me to speak at her public safety rally. Again, Second VP Goitia attended, and we were joined by Lodge 32 President, John Simon. I gave a brief speech and announced our endorsement to the crowd.

In September, I attended the funeral for Officer Zane Coolidge who was murdered in the line of duty. It was a solemn reminder of the continued danger our profession faces after years of mistreatment by those in power. It is my solemn prayer that this new administration helps restore the respect law enforcement deserves.

I continued working with our PSPRS coalition on fixing Tiers 2 and 3. This year we are going to attempt to cap the employee contribution for Teir 3 at 9.5%. This is the first step of several that we have planned to fix the problems.

We are also introducing three bills in the state legislature. First, we are seeking a pay raise for our state troopers and correctional officers. We have locked in at 15% and just passed out of committee. We are seeing a trend back towards the support of law enforcement, started by the governor who admitted that the State departments need raises.

Our next bill targets internal administrative investigations. We are proud to announce that the law in Arizona has officially been signed by the governor after we were successful in both houses! This bill changes the requirement for departments wanting to do an internal interview. Now, they are required to turn over all evidence to the officer and allow them 24 hours to review it prior to the interview. This was a massive victory for us, and we are thrilled to deliver this massive change to all police officers in Arizona.

Our last bill is the one I reached out to all of you about. Thank you all for your responses and we certainly used it in the creation of our bill. In Arizona the current law states that the killing of a police dog is a Class 6 (lowest) felony. In most jurisdictions, this is automatically waived to a misdemeanor. We are seeking to change this to a Class 4 felony for killing a dog and a class 5 for serious injury. We have received a huge amount of support from other legislators, animal rights groups and K-9 units across the state and the nation.

Lastly, I want to let you all know about my personal experience with one of our FOP benefits! After 3O years of firearms instructing, listening to heavy metal music and quite simply not being as conscious of my hearing as I should have been, my hearing went from bad to worse. Not to get too detailed but it was simply this, I was in Disneyland in a room with a couple hundred people. My wife, who was 2 feet from me began talking to me. I could see her mouth moving but I did not hear a single word she said. I contacted my doctor who told me I would need to see an audiologist. Unfortunately, Cigna does not cover these appointments. Cigna also does not cover hearing aids. Thankfully, because of my membership with FOP, Amplifon provided me with a FREE audiologist appointment and subsequently, half price hearing aids.

We are proud to report that we now have 35 Lodges and 21,300 members—and we continue to grow. Our recruitment efforts remain strong, and with the creation of the National Health Care Trust, we believe this initiative could be a game-changer for California.

Since 2024 we have formed the following six Lodges:

Placentia Lodge #25 – formed in 2024 Anaheim PA Lodge #26 – formed in 2024 Tustin POA Lodge #34 – formed in 2024 Glendale POA Lodge #43 - formed in 2025 Burbank FOP Lodge #200 - formed in 2025 Pomona POA FOP Lodge #909 - formed in 2025

Several Lodges have seen significant growth. Lodge 194 – United States Border Patrol Operators Association, chartered in September 2023, has expanded from 31 members to 71. DAY ON THE HILL

Several of our leaders traveled to Washington, D.C. for the Fraternal Order of Police Annual Day on the Hill. It was a highly productive trip, during which we met with 29 members of Congress to discuss key legislative priorities.

With the historic passage of H.R. 82 – Social Security Fairness Act, we witnessed firsthand the impact of engaging with our Representatives and the power of our collective voice in shaping policy.

SACRAMENTO LEGISLATION

Last year, the California Fraternal Order of Police (CAFOP) successfully passed three bills, reinforcing their commitment to legislative advocacy. Building on this momentum, CAFOP is sponsoring two key bills this year. The first addresses settlements involving workers' compensation and personal injury claims, aiming to ensure fair and efficient resolutions. The second focuses on improvements to the retirement system, enhancing benefits and security for law enforcement personnel.

Additionally, CAFOP is actively working on a Public Employees' Pension Reform Act (PEPRA) bill designed to improve recruitment and retention efforts within the law enforcement community. This legislation aims to make public safety careers more attractive and sustainable in the long run.

Furthermore, bills aimed at defunding law enforcement and decriminalizing crimes have slowed down, reflecting a shift in legislative priorities.

The Delaware state lodge has spent the better part of this quarter transitioning.

Legislative:

The 2O25 legislative session was not as challenging as the recent years past, nonetheless we did have to defend policing and public safety for some legislation presented at the end of session. Most of the legislation that was opposed, were bills that the legislators did not attempt to involve police unions and other stakeholders within the criminal justice profession.

Delaware continues to see the "cookie cutter trends" of smart justice reform groups attempting to be proactive or in response to Presidential Executive Orders. The unintended consequences these extreme bills cause is detrimental to both the safety of the community and our officers. It is also overreaching in the sense that we are noticing a push to overstep into our agencies' policies and procedures, without involving the experts in the field. Some examples of this are bills that would stop any involvement or interaction from police agencies and our federal partners with I.C.E. We used this as an opportunity to educate the legislators and the public on our specific agency roles and the narrative portrayed in the media is far from the reality. However, the vague/cryptic language contained in the proposed bills would have prevented us from interviewing individuals that were in our country illegally. Regardless of someone's immigration status we needed to preserve our ability to protect the public and proceed with our response to investigations. More importantly, we had to defend the fact that there are policies and federal/local laws that prohibit policing profiling. The unfortunate message from some legislators towards law enforcement was the assumption that everyone is a "bad actor" and no other profession is judged according to the actions of a few. You rarely see attacks on other industries like we do in policing. Delaware will continue to carry the message of our National Fraternal Order of Police leaders in an attempt to protect while educating the communities we serve.

Membership:

Membership continues to grow as academy classes graduate. However, there is still a small number of groups represented by Teamsters that we would like to join the FOP. We have subordinate lodges within the FOP that have presented struggles in contract negotiations and other labor issues with the leadership in local municipalities. The state lodge executive board continues to provide support and educate these groups on the benefits of using NFOP Labor Services. The common challenge seems to be that some union leaders were being retaliated against because of their role in the union and the felt that this effected their ability to promote. These are opportunities to allow your national brothers and sisters to come in and take some of that pressure and stress off of your local board. National Labor Services have some of the country's most experienced contract negotiators and labor experts. Most subordinate lodges do not know this benefit exists and the different areas of forensic audit, legal and other services that are available. We continue to see good contracts awarded to our officers and median police salaries continue to increase across the state.

As reported last quarter, the statewide membership audit has produced some areas that required special attention. Specifically in the area of eligibility. We have removed a couple of individuals due to not meeting eligibility requirements. They weren't properly vetted, and one was moved from an associate membership to an active membership. One of those individuals was a correctional officer at one time and believed that he should remain. This issue caused the state to order them to vacate those positions, causing vacancies in their executive leadership. The state lodge recently discovered they held another lodge meeting despite being removed. We believe that this issue will be appealed with to the National FOP. Delaware understands that there are states that accept correctional officers in the FOP, but Delaware does not. The main reason being the obvious differences in their roles and responsibilities. Delaware correctional officers do not work in dual roles like other states who have

sheriff's departments or county jails. Delaware is a unified system and correctional officers work inside facilities and not in the community unless in a work release or violation of probation centers or community work projects, supervising the inmates on work crews etc.

II DE Code § 8401

- "Police officer" means as defined in § 8401 of Title 11 and includes probation and parole officers of the Department of Correction.
- "Police officer" does not include any of the following:
 - A. The Department of Correction's Director of Probation and Parole, correctional officers and similar correctional occupations.
 - B. Correctional supervisors and non uniformed correctional employees who are employed in a secure facility operated by the Department of Correction or the Department of Services for Children, Youth and their Families, or who have inmate contact which is composed of correctional lieutenants, staff I ieutenants, correctional captains, non uniformed correctional employees who are employed in a secure Department of Correction facility who have inmate contact and similar occupations.

There are other sections of Delaware Code that excludes correctional officers and other similar professions from the protections that are afforded to our members. As a union, this makes it difficult to provide equal representation if granted membership into the Fraternal Order of Police. See Title 11 Delaware Code Chapter 9200 Section (b) (4).

Delaware's position on correctional officers not being members is due to the fact that correctional officer's roles and duties being so very different than police officers and other officers that work primarily in the community. Correctional officers have their own union that is focused on working conditions and roles/responsibilities inside of the prisons – it would not be beneficial for our members to vote or control their rights and protections and vice versa. Delaware Code in the Police and Fire Act, as well as the law formerly referred to as "Law Enforcement Officer Bill of Rights" – has never and still doesn't cover correctional officers. We have historically used Delaware law to guide this decision. We believe that the Correctional Officers Association of Delaware will continue to defend their rights according to their industry and professional standards of which they are the experts! We have never intended to recruit members away from their fraternal union.

Police Week Events

Delaware honors our fallen officers and their families the week prior to National Police Week. Our ceremony was held on May 7, 2025, in the Capitol city of Dover, on legislative mall. The ceremony was well attended and very beautiful as always. President Kemp would like to thank everyone for their dedication in planning and execution of such an important event. Special thanks to our local C.O.P.S President Ms. Eleanor Allione, State Lodge 3rd VP Jeff Gott, State DRBA Trustee Alexis Walther, Chaplain Micheal Fossett, Lodge 10 Chaplain Dennis Desilet, NCCPD Officer Shears or the important attention to detail and planning that goes into such a special event!

We wanted to thank everyone who made National Police week in Washington DC a success. Delaware had riders in the UNITY Tour as well as others who participated in events throughout the week, and many are excited to become more involved next year. The National Memorial ceremony was absolutely perfect. It was great to see Vice President Vance' participation. For those who have never been – it is highly recommended. It has to be one of the most attended police events across the nation. The energy and experience are like nothing you've ever witnessed. You can clearly see the love and attention that was put into that week – all the hard work definitely showed!

I hope this message finds you well as we enter the final month of summer.

I would like to begin by extending my sincere gratitude to the Florida State FOP Lodge, the Miami FOP Lodge, and all the supporting Lodges and Organizations that made this year's National Conference such a tremendous success. Your hard work and dedication are deeply appreciated.

Reflecting on the past two years, I am proud to say that the DC FOP Lodge has experienced a remarkable resurgence. As some of you may recall, our Lodge faced significant challenges following the last National Conference. However, thanks to the unwavering commitment of our leadership, particularly President Ron Burgeson we have emerged stronger and more focused on our mission: supporting our members and advancing the science of policing.

One pivotal step in our comeback was the approval of our updated Bylaws by the National Board of Trustees. Most notably, these changes formally affirmed the DC FOP's identity as the State Lodge of the District of Columbia. For too long, we lacked a clear role within the broader FOP structure. With this clarification, we've begun chartering local lodges and now provide meaningful support to them as the State Lodge.

This progress has not gone unnoticed. Several of our leaders have been recognized at the national level:

- President Greggory Pemberton of the DC Police Union Lodge 2 received the 2O24 National President's Award.
- Immediate Past President Andy Maybo was honored with the Jack Dudek Member of the Year Award at the 2025 Fall Board Meeting for his outstanding contributions to the District and the FOP.

Our Local Lodges and Labor Committees have also been active on the legislative front, advocating both in the DC City Council and in Congress for legislation to enhance public safety:

- The United States Park Police Committee, led by Chairman Kenneth Spencer, has championed H.R. 1260 The US Park Police Modernization Act, addressing critical staffing and retention issues.
- Lodge 2, under President Pemberton, continues to push for H.R. 2096 Protecting Our Nation's Capital Emergency Act, which addresses similar challenges facing the DC Police Department.
- Additionally, Lodge 2 has partnered with the DC Fire Union to advocate for a Deferred Retirement Option Program (DROP) to improve retirement benefits for both unions.
- On a federal level, the DC FOP has supported H.R. 3226 the Law Enforcement Officers' Equity Act, to ensure 6(c) retirement coverage for all federal law enforcement officers.

Beyond legislation, we took a fresh approach to Tent City during Police Week by partnering with local bars and restaurants in the Navy Yard. This vision, led by President Burgeson, reduced liability for the Lodge while still providing a welcoming space for visitors. Although the final numbers are pending, it appears this is the first Tent City in recent memory that did not incur a financial loss. Many thanks to the volunteers and attendees who made it a success.

In our ongoing efforts to modernize, we sold our long-held property on 4th Street, NW. While the building held many memories, it no longer served our operational needs. We have since moved to a more functional space that better supports our mission, including meetings and training sessions for our lodges and labor committees.

Another highlight was hosting the National FOP's Urban Policing Conference at the DCPU Lodge 2 building. It was a meaningful opportunity for large Lodge Presidents to network and share strategies. Lastly, I am proud to announce the chartering of the DC Metro Transit Officials Lodge 4, composed of active sergeants from the Metro Transit Police Department. This new organization is actively pursuing bargaining rights, and we are committed to supporting their journey toward achieving that goal. In closing, the DC FOP is thriving. We have made a true comeback, and that success is thanks to the dedication of our members and the unwavering support from FOP brothers and sisters across the country. Brothers and Sisters:

The lowa FOP has been doing great things in our state, building our numbers and lobbying our state legislators for protections for lowa law enforcement. Our legislative committee has been hard at work setting the standard, building a safer state for our communities and our officers. As we moved forward in this last legislative session, we successfully passed some of our oldest bills.

- Civil Service Bill- We were able to do away with citizen review boards, keeping untrained and uninformed citizens from recommending discipline after being cleared from the state.
- Officer Involved Shootings- We pushed and passed a bill that required County Attorney's to provide a ruling on Officer Involved Shootings within 18O days. This prevents County Attorneys from holding a ruling for an indefinite period and placing officers at risk for civil action.
- County Attorney Conflict of Interest- This bill prevents a County Attorney to act when there is a conflict of interest between the parties.
- Help for K9 Dogs- This bill allows K9 dogs to receive emergency veterinary treatment while on duty.

While we have been successful in passing several bills, we are still hard at work to get further protection.

- Peer Support Protections
- Improving the lowa Law Enforcement Academy (ILEA), increased funding for training and regional training facilities. Additionally, address gaps and flaws in existing law regarding officers' certifications, reports to ILEA, statutory I grounds for ILEA action, certification investigations, penalizing abusers of the process and provide for accountability of violators, rules of evidence including verification of authenticity of documents, cleanup code & definitions, clarify ILEA's authority, statute of limitations, provide due process, providing the Council with the ability to issue public and private reprimands to officer in disciplinary matter and other updates to ILEA and processes, as well as composition of ILEA council's citizen seats.
- Further clarification provisions, and Brady/Giglio including providing for retroactivity of process to officers
 on list, penalize abuse of process and retribution or retaliation for political or other improper reasons, and
 prohibit conflicts of interest with prosecutor who placed officer on list from representing officer and agency
 while allowing for Sheriff to retain independent counsel to represent department in any matter related to the
 Brady/Giglio case.
- Property tax abatement if killed in the line of duty. A bill for an act authorizing the abatement of property
 taxes owed on property owned by the surviving spouse of an emergency services member killed in the line of
 duty, and including effective date and retroactive applicability provisions.
- Brady Giglio, A bill for an act relating to administrative investigations under the peace officer, public safety, and emergency personnel bill of rights, civil service disciplinary hearings and appeals, and communications in professional confidence, and including effective date provisions.
- Officer Certification Revocation, A bill for an act relating to the revocation or suspension of law enforcement officer certification.
- lowa Public Employees Retirement System, A bill for an act relating to benefits for members of the lowa public employees' retirement system who are employed in a protection occupation. Changes in the employer/employee contribution split (employer down from 60% to 50%; employee up from 40% to 50%). Benefits: Increases the percentage for IPERS protection occupation members used to calculate additional benefits beyond 22 years of service and (from 0.375% and 12% to 0.675% and 20%). Allows early retirement at age 50. Establishes a COLA and eligibility requirements. This bill passed with full support from the House but unfortunately did not pass the Senate.

• Mandatory sentencing for felons with weapons - Reichman Act relating to the mandatory minimum sentencing relating to the control, possession, receipt, or transportation of a firearm or offensive weapon by a felon and providing penalties.

The amount of support we have received from state representatives and members of our communities has been amazing. Brothers and Sisters,

Greetings from Kentucky. I hope all of you are doing well and are ready for a great time here in Miami!

I will start my report with an important update on the KY case involving Officer Brett Hankison. Brett is a member of River City FOP Lodge 614 and a retired officer of the Louisville Metro Police Department.

Officer Hankison was part of the team that attempted to serve a search warrant at the apartment of Breonna Taylor on that tragic night in March of 2020. During the attempted service, Kenneth Walker (Breonna's boyfriend) fired at police officers and struck Sergeant Jonathan Mattingly in the femoral artery. Officer Hankison and two other officers returned fire in defense of themselves and their fellow officers. **Not a single person was struck by the rounds Officer Hankison fired.**

For the past five years Brett Hankison has been investigated, prosecuted and tried in state and federal court. We firmly believe that these prosecutions were politically motivated and occurred so that he could be served up to the public as a scapegoat for the tragedy.

Officer Hankison was acquitted in state court. His first federal trial ended in a hung jury. He was tried a second time in federal court and eventually found guilty on one of the counts for which he had been federally indicted. **He faced up to life in prison for this conviction.**

On December 27, 2024, a Motion for New Trial filed by Officer Hankison was taken under submission by the Court. The underlying basis argued in support of the Motion being flagrant misconduct by the prosecution throughout trial. That Motion was denied 3 days before sentencing in a 58-page opinion by the Court. In the sentencing memorandum submitted by the Department of Justice Civil Rights Division, the prosecution recommended a sentence of I day in prison (with credit for time served) and 3 years of supervised release/probation.

On July 21, 2025, after a 5 1/2 hour sentencing hearing, the judge sentenced Officer Hankison to 33 months in federal prison despite the defense and the DOJ recommending a sentence consisting of only supervised release was appropriate under the circumstances. The prosecutors' (newly appointed) sentencing memorandum noted that after extensively researching 18 U.S.C. § 242 cases, this is the only case in United States history in which a police officer has been charged with depriving the rights of another under the Fourth Amendment for returning fire in defense of his fellow officers, and not injuring anyone.

The DOJ prosecutors acknowledged there being a legitimate dispute as to whether Officer Hankison's conduct amounted to a seizure under the Fourth Amendment. Furthermore, the DOJ sentencing memorandum emphasized that regardless of that substantive issue, there is a legitimate question as to whether a prosecution under this statute should have been brought under these circumstances at all. In total, Brett Hankison has been tried three times—once in state court and twice federally—based on the same underlying facts and been under criminal investigation for more than five years. He now faces the prospect of being detained in federal prison for nearly 3 years.

Officer Brett Hankison returned fire in an attempt to protect his life and the lives of his fellow officers – the rest is all politics and that should not be lost on any of us.

He is a long-time member of the NFOP Legal Defense Plan, which has allowed him to mount the best defense possible over the last five years. Brett and his team are obviously planning to appeal. This could happen to any of us during any shift. Please keep Brett and his family in your thoughts and prayers.

Our KY legislative delegation has put forth a tremendous effort over the past several years and I am very proud of their work. We had some important progress in the 2O25 Kentucky General Assembly. Most notably were the following:

Senate Bill 10 – Retiree Health Insurance Benefit Increase-signed by the governor on 3/19/25

Amend KRS 78.5536, relating to the County Employees Retirement System, to increase the nonhazardous and hazardous duty under age 65 retiree health subsidy to \$40 and \$50 per month for each year of service, respectively, for those members who meet the "career threshold" who began participating in the system on or after July 1, 2003, and who are eligible for a fixed-dollar retiree health subsidy not tied to the premium; extend the employee contribution used to fund retiree health benefits to include members who began participating in the system on or after July 1, 2003. This is nearly double the health insurance stipend provided before this bill was signed into law.

House Bill 520 - Law Enforcement Records - became law 3/27/25

Amends KRS 61.878, relating to open records, to require records of law enforcement agencies compiled in the process of detecting and investigating statutory or regulatory violations to be exempt from public inspection if the disclosure of information could pose an articulable risk of harm to the agency or its investigation by revealing the identity of informants or witnesses not otherwise known.

House Bill 3O – Pension Spiking Bill- signed by the governor on 3/24/25

Amend KRS 61.598 to exempt from the pension spiking provisions any increases in rates of pay authorized or funded by the legislative or administrative body of an employer or mandated in a collective bargaining agreement approved by the legislative body of the employer that are provided to members of the Kentucky Employees Retirement System, County Employees Retirement System, or State Police Retirement System.

House Bill 10-Rights of Real Property Owners-signed by the governor on 3/24/25

Create a new section of KRS Chapter 383 to allow a property owner or his or her authorized agent to request a law enforcement officer immediately remove a person unlawfully occupying real property under certain circumstances; provide criminal and civil immunity to law enforcement officers and property owners acting in good faith; create a civil cause of action for wrongful removal; require the Department of Kentucky State Police to create a form for the petition to remove unlawful occupants; amend KRS 512.010 to define "squatter"; amend KRS 512.020 and 512.030 to specifically include damage to real property caused by squatters in the offense of criminal mischief.

While there is much progress to be made, these changes are a step forward for law enforcement officers and citizens alike in KY.

I continue to serve on the NFOP Legal Defense Plan Board of Directors, as I have since 2014. If you should ever have any questions or concerns about the Plan or coverage, please reach out to me and I will do my best to assist you.

I have greatly enjoyed my time serving as the KY National Trustee (both times). However, I will not be seeking reelection this year. Instead, I will be a candidate for KY State FOP President at our state conference in November. I hope to continue serving with all of you as we strive to improve the representation of our members and better the Order!

We will hold our2O25 KY State FOP Fall Conference in Lexington, KY from November 7-9.

I look forward to seeing all of you soon.

Maine continues to grow its FOP membership at a steady rate. In 2016, Maine had just 15 units/departments and under 200 members. Today, I am proud to announce that we have 58 units/departments and I,000 members. While Maine's membership number are small in comparison to other states with large police departments, we now represent over 60% of all the police officers in Maine.

Two years ago, the State Lodge started an outreach to the unrepresented police officers in Maine – police chiefs and their supervisory staff. We are proud to announce that we have signed up as FOP members, over IOO police chiefs, sheriffs, staff officers and reserve officers. Most, if not all of these previously unrepresented officers, have also enrolled in the FOP Legal Plan. In 2024, we helped these new FOP members by representing a police chief in a critical incident and we also represented several more on administrative matters.

During the same time, while we were growing our Labor Services membership and starting our outreach to the unrepresented officers, we started a "catch all" lodge. We established Dirigo Lodge #2 to help coordinate enrollment as FOP members, officers from smaller departments, individuals wishing to join the FOP for fraternal reason and officers from non-unionized departments. This new lodge has helped sharply decrease the workload on State Lodge executive board members and our 3 FOP labor representatives, while at the same time helping to increase our overall membership.

Starting on January 1st of this year, the State Lodge sharply increased its state dues to help meet its legislative and membership needs. We went from \$1O a year to \$25 a year per member. Surprisingly, we had little push back from our members, especially since we were able to explain our success at the legislature and the numerous requests we get for financial assistance for our members. We are now finally able to build up solid financial support in the need case of LODD assistance for of one of members.

Last year, Maine had 16 officer involved shootings. With a population of only 1.3 million people, critical incidents involving Maine police officers, rank towards the top per capita in the country. All the OIS incidents were determined to be justified by the Maine Attorney General's Office and all the police officers have returned to full duty.

With the help of our Labor Representatives and our lobbying firm, we are continuing to monitor the increased number of anti-cop legislative bills that are being introduced at the state house. The Maine FOP is a member of the Maine Law Enforcement Coalition, a group which is comprised of all of Maine's police unions. As a united group, the Maine LE Coalition has been highly successful in defeating these proposed anti-police bills and we will continue to do so as long as the liberal, defund the police legislators continue to push their far-left agendas. The Maine LE Coalition is in the process of proposing legislation to standardize the Brady/Giglio issues and to allow officers some due process.

Finally, we are excited to announce that in early 2026, the Maine State Lodge will be hosting its first ever awards and membership banquet. We will forward more information as we start to confirm the details of the banquet.

Throughout the year, I remained actively engaged in all National Board of Directors Meetings and Maryland State Lodge Meetings. I also had the privilege of participating in the 44th Annual National Peace Officers Memorial Service. These engagements ensure that our concerns and perspectives are represented at both the state and national levels. Our continued participation underscores our dedication to advocacy and the policy influence that benefits our membership.

2025 Maryland Legislative Session Overview

Session Duration: January – April 2025

This year's legislative session was notably challenging, but it also presented key opportunities. I'm pleased to report that we were able to advance several critical legislative initiatives that had previously stalled in past sessions. These measures are particularly important as we continue to address the impact of the 2021 repeal of the Law Enforcement Officers' Bill of Rights (LEOBR).

Key Legislative Wins

- SB 533 Time Limits for Filing Administrative Charges
 Establishes clear guidelines and limits for the filing of administrative charges, helping ensure due process.
- HB 3O9 / SB 326 Peer Support Confidentiality
 Protects the confidentiality of peer support conversations, promoting officer mental health and wellness.
- SB 767 Collective Bargaining for Calvert County Sheriff's Office
 Grants collective bargaining rights to deputies in Calvert County, enhancing labor protections and representation.

Addressing Gun Reform Consequences

One of the most urgent concerns we tackled this session involved the unintended consequences stemming from last year's comprehensive gun reform bill. A significant focus was placed on ensuring that retirees retain their right to carry—a right previously jeopardized by the new legislation. Despite strong advocacy efforts and initial optimism, the corrective bill was special ordered and ultimately not passed before the close of the session. This outcome was disappointing, but it has reinforced our resolve to continue the fight in future sessions.

Looking Ahead

These legislative efforts are a testament to our unwavering commitment to the rights, safety, and dignity of our members. I remain fully committed to this work and am ready to continue collaborating with all of you to achieve our shared goals. I look forward to seeing many of you in sunny Miami Beach as we continue this important work together.

First and foremost, I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to the members of the Fraternal Order of Police in Massachusetts for reelecting me as your National Trustee. I truly love this organization, and I am honored every day to represent our great state on the national level. It is a privilege I do not take lightly.

I also want to extend my sincere thanks to our brothers and sisters from Miami Beach and the Florida FOP for their outstanding work in putting this conference together. Your dedication and hospitality remind us all of the strength of our organization.

Over the past year, the Massachusetts State Executive Board worked together to make some necessary budget adjustments. These discussions were not easy, but I was proud to play a role in shaping a plan that delivered meaningful cost savings while minimizing the impact on our members.

Financial responsibility may not be glamorous, but it is essential to the long-term health of our organization. By demonstrating that we are thoughtful stewards of our members' dues, we earned the trust needed to pass an increase to the annual state dues. This adjustment will significantly strengthen our ability to continue serving our membership effectively and sustainably.

We've seen exciting growth across the state. I was proud to welcome new members, including the Norwood Superiors, who voted unanimously to join our ranks. Presentations in Hampden County and Uxbridge were met with enthusiasm, leading to immediate growth and strong interest in full labor affiliation. I'd like to thank Attorney Dunlap for being a constant partner and wing man during these outreach efforts—his support has been instrumental.

As part of our national recruitment plan, we have asked our members to help identify large on affiliated groups who would benefit from joining the Fraternal Order of Police. To that end, I've opened conversations with two large unaffiliated groups here in Massachusetts. One is a coalition of 21 police organizations that could benefit from our national advocacy, and the other is a large agency considering the FOP as a cost-saving legal defense option. As we grow, we're not only gaining numbers—we're strengthening our collective voice.

While we've seen an uptick in overall membership, we've also faced the challenge of smaller lodges dissolving and consolidating into larger ones. Many of these smaller lodges simply lack the leadership or operational support to keep moving forward. To help address this, we organized an in-state training modeled after Leadership Matters, which we held in conjunction with our annual conference. The event welcomed attendees from Massachusetts, Vermont, Rhode Island, and Connecticut, and proved to be a success—especially given the short planning window. A heartfelt thank you goes to Secretary Jimmy Holderfield, who not only attended but taught a valuable section on lodge administration. We intend to grow this into an annual program, open to all law enforcement, as both an educational and recruitment tool.

Our presence at the State House continues to grow, thanks to the tireless work of our Director of Government Affairs, Frank Frederickson. During the last election cycle, we endorsed 18 candidates—15 of whom won their races. These results are a clear sign that our political influence is stronger than ever. Among our proudest legislative accomplishments was the passage of HB4746, which provides essential pension protections for officers forced into retirement due to violent injury. This legislation was a hard-fought win, and I strongly encourage lodges across the country to push for similar protections in their states. Standing with our injured brothers and sisters is not only right—it's our responsibility. We stand ready to help in any way we can.

Looking ahead to the 2025–2026 legislative session, we remain focused on advancing key initiatives: ensuring POST Commission representation for officers below the rank of Captain; creating a 25-foot HERO Act safety zone

to protect officers on duty; establishing confidentiality for participants in peer support programs; eliminating the cap on post-retirement earnings; and authorizing Blue Star license plates for the families of fallen officers and firefighters. These are practical, mission-driven priorities that reflect our ongoing commitment to the safety, dignity, and wellbeing of our members and their families.

I've also had the honor of representing the Massachusetts FOP at events that hold deep meaning for our community. From the Massachusetts Law Enforcement Memorial and the Hanna Awards for Bravery to response trailer deployments and the National Law Enforcement Memorial in Washington, D.C., each of these occasions reminded me of the courage and sacrifice that define our profession. Last year, I had the profound privilege of performing at the national memorial service as well as presenting medals to the families of our fallen officers. No words can truly capture those moments—but I will never forget them, and I am deeply grateful to have stood in service to those families.

Our commitment to wellness and mutual support continues to grow in Massachusetts. We've expanded the Struggle Well training program across the state, and the response has been overwhelmingly positive. We've also stepped up for FOP members from across the country, including a South Carolina family whose child was undergoing treatment at Boston Children's Hospital. With the help of our members, we were able to organize meals, gifts, and support to bring them comfort during an incredibly difficult time. That is the heart of our organization—supporting one another at all times.

I once again had the privilege of teaching at Leadership Matters, where I updated the curriculum to reflect current leadership challenges in our profession. The training was well received, and I remain committed to keeping it fresh, relevant, and responsive to the needs of today's law enforcement leaders.

This past fall, we were also honored to host Vice President Joe Gamaldi at the Brotherhood for the Fallen Boston Inaugural Gala. His keynote address was a powerful moment that elevated our presence in Massachusetts and left a lasting impression on everyone in the room. Joe, thank you for your passion and unwavering leadership.

At the national level, the FOP's endorsement of President Trump—based on the will of our voting membership—brought both opportunities and challenges. Regardless of individual political beliefs, the fact remains that we maintain direct access to the President of the United States and are viewed by the administration as the leading voice on law enforcement issues. That level of access is no small achievement—it is a testament to the strength and credibility of our organization.

In Massachusetts, we continue to face significant challenges stemming from recent police reform legislation. Recruitment and retention have become increasingly difficult, and the profession itself feels more vulnerable than ever. Now more than ever, we must stand together, support one another, and push forward with boldness and integrity. Our legislative agenda is strong, our wellness initiatives are expanding, and our commitment to leadership development remains rock solid.

On a personal note, I would like to acknowledge the heartbreaking loss of my lodge's Vice President, and good friend, Retired Trooper Brian Dunn. On Christmas Eve, Brian was admitted to the hospital after experiencing unusual symptoms. Doctors discovered an untreatable brain tumor, and just a few weeks later, he passed away while in hospice care. Brian was more than a colleague—he was a friend, a leader, and a brother. His loss is deeply felt, and his legacy will never be forgotten. Rest in peace, Brian.

As I reflect on the past two years, I am filled with pride and gratitude. Every new recruit, every bill passed, every training delivered, every family comforted—it all comes back to one mission: protecting and empowering the men and women who serve with courage, compassion, and honor. The road ahead is never easy, but I have never been more confident in the strength of this organization or in the resilience of our members. Thank you for allowing me the privilege of serving alongside you.

I want to thank the State of Florida and especially Miami Beach lodge for their hospitality over the next 7 days. The Michigan Fraternal Order of Police has been active in a variety of initiatives since we last met in Las Vegas, reflecting broader trends and needs in law enforcement, public safety, and community relations. Here's a general overview of what we have been involved in:

Advocacy and Legislative Efforts

- Police Reform Legislation: We have been actively engaged in shaping police reform legislation. The FOP
 has worked to balance the need for reform with protecting the rights and interests of law enforcement officers.
 For example, the FOP has voiced concerns over certain proposals for police reform that could limit officers'

- HALO
- 2 million dollars appropriated for defense of Law Enforcement Bill of Rights (MO FOP controls)
- State line of duty death benefit increased from 25k to IOOk

Quite probably our best legislative year ever. Thanks to our lobbyist Mark Bruns, State President Jay Schroeder and legislative director Brad Lemon for your tireless work.

We are extremely grateful for the hard work of President Yoes and the rest of the executive board in the passage of the Social Security Fairness Act. A HUGE accomplishment.

Missouri stands at approximately 7,500 members and we continue to grow. Our at-large lodge numbers 260. It is a vital benefit to provide legal protection to our LEOs in our state who do not have the benefit of joining a lodge near them.

Brothers and Sisters.

I look forward to a productive week in Miami Beach during our National Conference.

I would like to update you on the recent event in Nebraska as well as a legislative update.

I wanted to start off by recognizing two of our Past State Officers, Jeremy Kinsey and Brian Waugh. Jeremy served as our State Vice President and Brian as our State 2nd Vice President.

Brian was recently hired by the Governor to become the Colonel of the Nebraska State Patrol and Jeremy accepted the Chief of Police position for the City of Blair, Nebraska.

Prior to becoming the Chief of Police in Blair, Jeremy served as a Captain with the La Vista Police Department where he was their Lodge Trustee. Brian was the Chief of Police with the Kearney Police Department before his appointment as the Colonel of the Nebraska State Patrol.

We wish them both good luck in their new positions.

Legislative Updates:

The State of Nebraska and our many law enforcement organizations are facing similar issues with recruitment and retention. The State FOP in our legislative efforts have been working on enhancements to our Statewide Retirement system that affects approximately 32 Police Departments. Currently employees and employers each pay 7% into the pensions system. Under LB 179 and effective October 1st, 2O25, that rate will go up to 9% for both the employee and employer contribution.

Under our Recruitment and Retention Act Nebraska Police Officers who work and reside in the state can attend the Nebraska University system tuition free. We enhanced the act to allow children of Police Officers to attend to obtain their degree. Recently we introduced LB6O8 which would include correctional officers, youth detention officers, certain disabled persons, and their children in the First Responder Recruitment and Retention Act. LB6O8 adds corrections and youth detention officers to become eligible for tuition waivers in a relevant career education for themselves. It also allows free University of Nebraska tuition for dependents of corrections and youth detention officers. Law enforcement officers are already afforded this benefit in law and applies to all public colleges and universities. The corrections addition becomes effective on July 1, 2O27.

Labor Update:

The City of Omaha and the Omaha Police Officers Association FOP Lodge #I have come to an agreement and the Omaha City Council approved Mayor Jean Stothert's proposal to increase salaries for Omaha police officers, guaranteeing the Omaha Police Department salaries will always be 5% higher than any other law enforcement agency in the State of Nebraska.

65 Year Anniversary:

The Omaha Police Offices Association FOP Lodge #1 will be celebrating 65 years as a lodge in September of 2025.

FOP Lodge #1 was chartered on September 17, 1960. The interim lodge President was Walter Hines, and they had 62 members, today Lodge #1 has 1072 members and continues to grow and represent the men and women of the Omaha Police Department.

I'm proud to announce that on May 9th the Justice Department and the City of Albuquerque filed a joint motion seeking U.S. District Court approval to terminate the federal consent decree covering the Albuquerque Police Department (APD) since 2015.

Our Governor has indicated She will call a special session to address our crime situation.

Several of our Lodges, including the State Lodge, continue to offer scholarships to their members and family members.

The Salt Lake City Board meeting seems a long time ago and was a great opportunity for board members to network and socialize. We are finally here at our National Conference in Miami Beach. This one has seemed like a long time coming and has survived significant changes since it was first selected. It will be great to see each of you and catch up on activities.

North Carolina FOP enjoyed the hospitality of the Southern States FOP members at our conference in Alabama March 6-9. It is always so helpful to meet with members that are facing similar problems that many of us in the south and other areas of the country are having to address in these difficult times. This networking helps to develop solutions that others have discovered through actual experience.

On April 8 the North Carolina State FOP and North Carolina COPS held a celebration of life event for those officers killed in the line of duty last year. I had mentioned in a previous report that the NC FOP and COPS had decided to not participate in the NC Memorial Service sponsored by our attorney general's office for many years. NCFOP and NCCOPS had been the primary sponsors of this event but it had become too political. Some survivors even said it seemed almost like another funeral for their fallen family member. We have since been holding our own event which is truly a celebration of life and much more upbeat. This year's event was a great success and we are proud of the work of COPS and our FOP committee.

NCFOP held its state board meeting April IO-12 at Carolina Beach. We had a great time and very much appreciate National Chaplain Rick Snyder attending. Our new NC State FOP Disaster Food trailer was present and used for the first time to feed our members in attendance. The trailer is a great addition to our benefits for state and other FOP members across the country and is ready to respond to assist in serving our members in their time of need.

NCFOP now has a statewide lodge that is opened and gaining members. State law enforcement officers and others that do not have a lodge near them are joining this lodge. Potential members can join on our state website and get approved very quickly. Members can decide at a later time to transfer to a local lodge or stay in the state lodge. This has proven to be very popular.

Some of you may know Attorney George Laughrun as he has taught in National FOP courses and is a fantastic FOP attorney. He has represented many officers in North Carolina and is one of the best in the country. George has now agreed to be the NCFOP state attorney and we are thrilled to have him on board.

At the National Fall Board meeting in Charlotte, I had included in my trustee report information on an issue the Charlotte Mecklenburg FOP was having about a battle for outer carrier vests for officers. The CMPD chief refused to allow officers to wear these vests saying they were too militaristic. A great friend and advocate for the FOP, City Republican Councilman Tariq Bokhari, went to battle with the chief and eventually the chief was forced to allow the vests. FOP members from across the nation were asked and did sign a petition presented by Bokhari to support our position. The saga continues as the chief apparently threatened to sue the City of Charlotte for comments made to him by Bokhari. No suit was filed but our Democratic controlled City Council voted to give the chief apparently \$300,000 to keep him from suing. Experts are saying the chief had absolutely no case and it appears the Council gave the chief (they like very much) this money because his feelings were hurt and he was embarrassed by the negative attention from the public and media. The media is attacking this action by the Council and it continues to be a hot issue. Members of the chief's immediate staff even helped the NAACP to file a complaint against Bakhari and the FOP. The complaint was dismissed by the City Attorney. The NC state Auditor is now investigating the Charlotte City Council actions behind closed doors as they will not release the details or actual amount of the payment. Also, during this time, the chief's spokesperson sued Charlotte Mecklenburg FOP and its president for defamation on some comments made on lodge media posts. On April 4 the superior court

judge dismissed the lawsuit saying "This isn't England where we criminalize mean thoughts"! The chief's spokesperson also filed a complaint against Charlotte Mecklenburg Lodge 9 president and it was sustained by the Chief and his staff. He was given 40 hours suspension! We of course are appealing this to our Civil Service Board and this travesty is not over yet. Of course, they waited till Bakhari resigned from the Council to be appointed as Deputy Administrator for the Federal Transit Administration by President Trump. This fiasco has resulted in Charlotte Mecklenburg FOP voting to hold a department wide vote of no confidence on the chief. The final vote will not be available until after this report was due. As I was finishing this report the CMPD chief just announced that he was retiring at the end of this year. I will update everyone on what takes place between now and August at the Conference.

NCFOP continues to help those members and others that were so devastated by Hurricane Helene in western North Carolina. This area continues to struggle and will for years to come. Our lodges and members stepped up for months to do what they could to address this disaster. Thanks again for the help that came from members across the country and the National FOP Foundation Disaster Fund.

The National Police Memorial Service just conclude in DC and was again a great tribute to those officers and families that paid the ultimate sacrifice. NCFOP is proud to have some very hard-working members that help to make this event such a success each year. I have not missed one of these services for many years but had to cancel at the last minute this year due to a medical issue my wife Debbie has now developed. A special thank you to President Yoes, Chaplain Rick Snyder and others that have reached out to me with concern and prayers for Debbie.

I am so looking forward to the National Conference this year in Miami Beach. This should be a great time as we make decisions that will guide our great order for the next two years. NCFOP plans on having many delegates there to do our part in continuing the tradition that keeps the FOP the greatest police organization in the world.

Greetings, Brothers and Sisters,

I hope this finds you all healthy and happy and your travels to Miami are smooth and uneventful. Closing out 2024 and entering 2025, I have been busy, much like most of you. Most of 2024 I spent expanding our legal defense team in ND. Most of our attorneys are based in the eastern part of the state, so if an OIS occurred, the logistics of getting an attorney on the scene quickly impeded us from protecting our members. In 2024, ND had one OIS each month; most months, we had two, and one month three. These numbers are unheard of in our state. Thankfully, every shooting was ruled justified, and the investigation was expedited to return the officers to duty when ready.

Since our last board meeting, ND has been preparing for our bi-annual legislative session. FOP teamed up with the ND Sheriff's and Chief's Association on several bills for law enforcement in ND. Number one was an increase in the statewide pension system. A bill was written by the Chief's Association and co-sponsored by the Sheriff's Association and FOP. Unfortunately, this bill appears to have died a slow and painful death. Several other bills are still being processed as we speak. However, one of the bills naming ND State Highway 200 for fallen heroes in ND passed and was signed into law.

ND was also very busy assisting our national legislative office with the Social Security Fairness Act. We are happy to announce that both Senator Hoeven and Cramer voted favorably. I attended the bill signing ceremony at the White House in January with several of our executive board members.

February 20th-23rd, 2025, I was in Nashville to attend the police week planning meeting. This is the last chance we have as a committee to sit in a room with our auxiliary counterparts and walk through the events for May 15th.

Due to scheduling issues with the ND congressional delegation, I rescheduled our day on the hill until March 4th and 5th, 2O25. These dates were the only dates on which both Senators and Representatives were going to be available. Unknown to me, this was also when President Trump was scheduled to give the State of the Union address. I had a personal meeting with Representative Fedorchak. Unfortunately, due to the chaos on Capitol Hill that day, my meeting with her was a quick hello and handshake. I met for over an hour with her judicial staffer, and we have begun exchanging emails about house legislation.

I was then scheduled to meet with Senators Hoeven and Cramer. However, due to the reaction to the State of the Union, Capitol Hill erupted into chaos again. My initial meeting was switched to staffers, and they needed to schedule the meeting with staffers simultaneously. The meeting needed to be rescheduled multiple times until a decision was made to hold a conference call the following week rather than spending an extra night in DC and attempting to have the staffing meeting the following day.

March 12th-16th, I was with the great folks in Salt Lake City for the National Board meeting. Several items were discussed during the meeting. Highlights were the passage of HR 82, an increase in the legal defense fund, which has been discussed earlier, and an amendment to national per capita in 2027, adding \$3.00 per member per year and an additional \$3.00 per member per year in 2030. Houston, Nashville, and Detroit have all submitted bids for the 2029 biannual conference. Each location meets the requirements to host and will be voted on this August in Miami.

At the last minute, I was asked to represent the memorial committee in Washington, DC, on April 1st to meet with everyone involved in planning police week. Members from C.O.P.S., Police Memorial, FOP, Auxiliary, and many others will attend the meeting.

I will be in Washington, DC, from May 7th to 18th, 2025, as a memorial committee member. This year, we are increasing the available chairs from 7,500 to 10,000, anticipating the largest memorial ceremony to date. I am honored to be a committee member. This year, we will recognize 232 brothers and sisters who gave the ultimate sacrifice. If you or your agency are interested in sending folks to DC, please reach out to me, and I can assist you.

One last project I have been working on is to assist the Sheriff's Association with CRI-TAC funds to bring training into our state at their request. ND has an increase in Posse Comitatus groups, First Amendment auditors, and other factions. I will report more on this later.

Lastly, I would like to take a moment to personally thank President Mitch Wardzinski for his passion, leadership, and professionalism, which he has brought to the NDFOP over the last 5 years. Mitch, I know you never once considered ever being the NDFOP President, but you, Sir, have knocked it out of the park. Your dedication and excellence in leadership have placed the NDFOP as the leader of line officers in this state. I have thoroughly enjoyed working and traveling with you. Thank you for your selfless service to our great state.

P.O. Jacob Derbin, Euclid P.O. EOW 05/11/2024. Died from gunfire.

P.O. Jamieson Ritter, Cleveland Division of Police. EOW 07/04/2024. Died from gunfire.

C.O. Andrew Lansing, Ohio Dept. of Corrections EOW 12/25/2024. Died from an assault. Deputy Larry Henderson, Hamilton Co. S.O. EOW 05/02/2025. Died from vehicular assault. Deputy Daniel Sherrer, Morrow Co. S.O. EOW 05/26/2025. Died from gunfire.

K-9 Fury, Franklin Co. P.O. EOW 11/11/2023. Died from vehicular assault. K-9 Kaya, Streetsboro P.O. EOW 01/07/2025. Struck by vehicle.

The Pennsylvania State FOP continuously holds training seminars throughout the State to inform, educate and prepare our members in Labor Negotiations and Collective Bargaining techniques for PA Act III law enforcement officers, to bargain collectively and proceed to binding arbitration with their employer if no agreement is met. Act III members cannot strike.

The State provides training for officers covered under the PA Act 195 who are law enforcement officers who were not included in the original 1968 legislation of Act III. Act 195 members can meet and discuss salaries and benefits but if they cannot reach an agreement they may go to mediation. If no agreement is made through mediation, the members can strike.

Peer to Peer Support has been initiated throughout the State and is being taught by 20 of our members who attended the Power in Peers presented by the National FOP (Sherri Martin). The training is presented upon request. Currently Erie PD, Harrisburg PD, PA Attorney Generals Office and Philadelphia Lodge 5 have had the training. The training is gaining momentum and new sessions are being planned in other parts of the State.

State funding grants applied for by President Joseph Regan have been made available through Force Science. "Body Worn Camera" training is being presented in four locations across the state. The training educates our members about the benefits, issues, limitations and laws of digital videos. It emphasizes the differences between video and eyewitnesses, factoring in essential elements of eyewitnesses who may deviate from video data. The training aids and provides the knowledge to assist in promoting thorough investigations and court presentations.

The second funded State grant is presented by Force Science titled "Force Encounters Course". The course is designed to understand critical human performance factors in use of Force Incidents. The presentation introduces the psychological and physiological factors that affect threat assessment, sensory perception, decision, performance and memory and applies these evidence-based concepts to high stress and life-threatening encounters in law enforcement context.

The State FOP also provides a 4-hour presentation by the Pennsylvania State Lodge in conjunction with the Pennsylvania State Troopers Association on the proper response members need to do after an officer involved shooting. The training instructs what the officer needs to do after the shooting, what the officer's union representatives need to do on behalf of the officer, as well as providing legal representation to ensure the officer is given proper time to defuse before a formal review of the incident. The above training is followed by the importance of CISM training and forming local teams.

Pennsylvania takes pride in the training afforded to our members. It recognizes the importance of providing educational opportunities to our members. We also are concerned about the emotional toll and well being of all Law Enforcements Officer due to the stress from the job, the impact it has on their emotional and physical well being, as well as the impact this stress carries over to their personal lives.

Brothers and Sisters:

The Fraternal Order of Police – South Carolina Lodge continued its active engagement in professional development and inter-state collaboration through participation in key conferences during 2O25. The Southern States FOP Conference held March 6–9, 2O25, at The Lodge at Gulf State Park in Gulf Shores, Alabama, brought together FOP leaders from across the southern region. Attendees engaged in strategic discussions, attended training sessions on legal updates and officer wellness, and shared best practices for non-union operations. Legislative priorities and strategies were addressed during meetings on March 8, followed by hospitality networking and fellowship among members. I also participated in the North Carolina FOP State Conference in Wilmington, NC. This gathering provided a platform for organizational updates, policy reviews, and offered an opportunity for South Carolina and North Carolina lodges to strengthen their alliance through the exchange of advocacy strategies and operational insights.

In May 2025, two SCFOP members received high honors during the Governor's Law Enforcement Officer of the Year Awards for their roles in a high-risk manhunt involving the attempted murder of a McBee, SC police officer during a traffic stop. Two officers located the suspect in this shooting. A chase and gunfight ensued from that contact. Lance Corporal Gene Michael "Mike" Norris II of the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources was named State Officer of the Year, and Chief Deputy Jonathan Chase Iseman of the Lee County Sheriff's Office was awarded the County Officer of the Year for their effective leadership and coordination of law enforcement efforts during the same incident. These awards underscore the professionalism and dedication of South Carolina officers in protecting their communities.

On May 22, 2025, the SCFOP took part in the 19th Annual South Carolina Law Enforcement Memorial Service, held at the Statehouse Fallen Officer Memorial in Columbia. This ceremony honored officers who made the ultimate sacrifice, including those who died in the line of duty in 2024 and historical inductees dating back to 1809. With remarks from state leaders, family members, and FOP officials, the service reaffirmed the organization's enduring commitment to honoring the fallen and supporting their families.

As part of its ongoing membership expansion efforts, SCFOP reached a milestone in its "Road to 5000" campaign with the successful chartering of a new lodge in Dillon, South Carolina. This achievement reflects the organization's commitment to statewide growth and its focus on increasing representation, resources, and advocacy services across the state.

SCFOP also remained highly active on the legislative front, tracking and supporting several key bills during the 2024–2025 legislative session. \$ 74, now enrolled, modernizes South Carolina's legal framework by expanding the use of electronic records in official proceedings. \$ 126, the Law Enforcement and Judicial Personal Privacy Protection Act, was signed into law and will take effect on January 26, 2026, shielding officers, judges, and their families from public disclosure of personal information to combat harassment and threats. \$ 127, also enrolled, addresses jurisdictional matters involving the Catawba Indian Nation, and likely supports intergovernmental cooperation or tribal sovereignty.

5 136 mandates the dismissal of certain pending gun possession charges, potentially aligning with new firearm legislation such as constitutional carry provisions. **5 156**, with its free conference report adopted, allows for homicide charges in cases where fentanyl distribution results in a fatal overdose—part of the state's larger effort to combat the opioid crisis. **H 3127**, ratified as **R 57**, increases penalties for failing to stop for law enforcement, addressing public safety concerns associated with vehicle pursuits. **H 3276**, the **South Carolina Hands-Free Act**, now ratified as **R 59**, prohibits handheld device use while driving to reduce distracted driving incidents.

Finally, H 3437 - currently in progress—may amend post-retirement earnings limitations for public employees, an important issue in addressing law enforcement staffing shortages by enabling the return of experienced retirees to the workforce.
In conclusion, the South Carolina Fraternal Order of Police continues to advance its mission across multiple fronts. With key legislation enacted, membership growing, and officers being recognized for their heroism, the organization remains focused on several priorities for the remainder of 2025. These include supporting the implementation of newly passed laws — especially those addressing officer privacy and fentanyl-related prosecutions – continuing expansion into underrepresented areas through the "Road to 5000" campaign, advocating for reform on post-retirement earnings policies, and building upon inter-state collaboration through conferences and joint training opportunities.

Welcome to Florida and our 2O25 National Conference! Thank you to our hosts for the excellent hospitality and all the hard work that goes into welcoming thousands of friends over to enjoy fellowship together. The FOP has been a crucial part of the evolution of the law enforcement profession since our last Conference and have faced many legislative challenges across the Nation. The strength of the Fraternal Order of Police has been more visible than ever before with our ever-expanding presence to represent our members and profession in the face of sizable false narratives. Our National Board has worked diligently to stay ahead of the false messages and help to educate the public with fact-based discussion.

Since our last National Conference in Las Vegas, Texas has continued to be a busy place. With the introduction of the NFOP Healthcare Trust and group health plan availability, we are proud to have several locals working on joining the plan and providing this new benefit to our members. At the time I am writing this report Pasadena Lodge 125 is close to becoming the first Lodge in the Nation to have FOP provided healthcare for its members! We hope that by the time we arrive in Miami to be able to report that the process has been completed with them, and to also make more progress in several other Lodge's working on adopting the plan as well.

The National Legislative Program of the FOP continues to lead the way for all offers across the Nation. I am pleased to have been a part of each year's Day on the Hill event, helping to lobby for the legislative needs of our members. The past few years have seen many changes across Congress, with exciting movement on some of the FOP's top priorities. I was honored to represent Texas at the final rally held in support of the repeal of the WEP and GPO to equalize Social Security benefits for members across the Nation. The passage of that key legislation speaks volumes to the legislative efforts and effectiveness of the FOP in Washington, and I encourage all our local lodges to join in the efforts. Our combined strength continues to be the most powerful influence of National legislation affecting law enforcement.

I have been blessed with the opportunity to volunteer to assist the National Memorial Committee with preparations for both National Peace Officer Memorial Service's since our last conference. A small team comprised of members from across the Nation travel to Washington in the beginning of May and spend about a week on the ground at the Capitol preparing the site for the services. It is a labor of respect and love for those that have given their all, and their families left behind. I encourage all members to attend the National Memorial at least once in their career, as it is an amazing and rewarding experience to honor our fallen and their families.

Our Legislative Committee was on the ground in Austin daily as a part of the Texas Law Enforcement Collation, for our biennial legislative session again this year. Our team worked daily on monitoring progress of ongoing police related proposed legislation and worked constantly on behalf of all law enforcement in the Great State of Texas. With the short legislative session length in Texas our committee led by Lodge 716 (Dallas) James Parnell (Second Vice President of the State Lodge), along with Lodge IIO (Houston) Ray Hunt (Past President), Lodge 39 (Harris County) David Cuevas (State Vice President) and Lodge II2 (TMPA Statewide) John Wilkerson, they continue to work diligently every day to ensure the needs of Texas law enforcement were met. As I write this, our session is in full swing, and the big challenges are yet to come within Texas. With our team tracking legislation, working the Capitol and educating our members, this promises to be another good session for Texas Law Enforcement.

I am honored to serve as a member of the NFOP Recruiting Committee, covering Texas and the surrounding states. We are continuing our work with the Texas Municipal Police Association and our growing list of new local lodges for our future in the Great State of Texas. When I became the National Trustee, we had about 4,500 active members in Texas. As I am writing this, we currently have 17,865 active members, in 42 active local lodges. We do have a couple of local lodges currently suspended (for per capita) and are working to help them update their status. I am also working with a couple of Federal groups on forming new Lodges, where we have previously not had a strong

presence with our Federal Officers working within Texas. We continue to evaluate and update the processes and procedures in use at the State Lodge. This is necessary to help define the role of a more modern State Lodge, serving members across the state with vastly different needs. With lodges ranging in size from 12 to over 5,000 members the service needs are quite different. We continue to work on refining our strategies to address our top priorities of legislative, educational services, member support services and better branding/marketing. We will continue to work with our existing local lodges to merge with both competing and complementary groups and bring those new members into the FOP, along with meeting with new groups across the State as we are able too. Greetings, Brothers & Sisters,

It is my continued honor to serve as your Utah State Trustee. I appreciate the opportunity to represent our state and contribute to the vital mission of the Fraternal Order of Police. Since our last meeting, we've faced both challenges and opportunities, and I'm proud to report on the progress we've made together.

As many of you know, Utah's legislative landscape has been significantly shaped by the passage of House Bill 267, an anti-union measure that, for the first time, eliminated collective bargaining rights for law enforcement in Utah. While this marks a major shift, the Utah FOP has remained fully engaged and proactive in response.

In our previous efforts, we worked closely with the bill's sponsors to amend its harshest provisions. At one point, we believed we had reached a compromise supported by all major labor organizations. Unfortunately, after the introduction of a substitute bill, both AFSCME and the Firefighters' Association withdrew their support, prompting Senate leadership to revert to the original version of the bill. HB 267 was ultimately signed into law by Governor Cox.

Key Impacts of HB 267:

- Elimination of Collective Bargaining: This primarily affects Salt Lake City's 400 officers, who were covered under the state's only formal bargaining agreement.
- Meet-and-Confer Practices Continue: Most agencies in Utah will maintain meet-and-confer models for discussing wages and benefits.
- New Reporting Requirements: Labor organizations must submit annual political and membership disclosures to the Lieutenant Governor's office.
- Union Access to Public Buildings Restricted: Agencies now have greater discretion to deny union use of department spaces.

Despite these setbacks, Utah FOP has maintained open and productive communication with legislators, some of whom have since expressed regret for the bill's broader implications. Encouragingly, they've committed to introducing new legislation to establish due process protections for all Utah law enforcement officers, which is currently being drafted. We are actively participating in its development to ensure it reflects the needs of our members.

New Coalition & Referendum Effort

In a historic show of solidarity, **Utah FOP** has joined forces with the Professional Fire Fighters of **Utah** and the **Utah Education Association** to launch a **statewide referendum against HB 267**. This marks a powerful and unified stand against policies that undermine the rights of public sector workers across **Utah**.

Through this coalition, we have successfully returned over **320,000 signatures** — well above the legal threshold to place HB 267 on the ballot for public challenge. This collective effort demonstrates our strength when we stand together, and we are proud to be leading this movement alongside our allies in education and fire service.

Leadership Update
I am also pleased to announce that Scott Stephenson has returned as Executive Director of the Utah State FOP. Scott previously held this position and brings deep institutional knowledge and legislative expertise. We welcome him back with enthusiasm and look forward to working alongside him as we advance our legislative goals and protect the rights of our members.
While HB 267 presents new and significant hurdles, Utah FOP remains steadfast in our advocacy, unity, and mission . I thank you all for your continued support and commitment as we move forward, stronger together.
I look forward to our discussions during the meeting and to building on our shared commitment to protecting the men and women who serve this great organization and our communities every day.

The Washington State FOP continues to grow with now over 3700 members in 24 Lodges. The attraction of membership continues with the WAFOP Labor Coalition and its expansion. We now represent 58 different Guilds/ Associations in the labor arena. As our growth has been steady, we anticipate more rapid growth with adding an active health care coverage program to our members and their employers with the Pacific Northwest Public Safety Benefits (NWPSB) health care program.

Finally, after over 30 years of trying to find active members health care coverage, we have met that goal. Washington State and Oregon FOP have united and secured an affordable health care plan with competitive benefits through our won insurance program. This is a "composite" premium rated health care program. This plan also allows us to compete with Teamsters and other unions in the labor market.

Now that we have competitive health coverage and a Medical Trust savings program to offer, we anticipate more growth of the FOP across both states. Our health care plans will then be what I like to describe "cradle to grave"! This means health care for all FOP members and their families while employed with the PWPSB program; health care insurance with a Pre 65 Health Care program sponsored by the National Fraternal Order of Police through Thin Blue Line upon separation from service; and finishing up with the National FOP Aetna Medicare Supplement program for our senior retired LEO's .

We continue to promote the WAFOP Medical Trust nationwide as a National FOP sponsored as "Member Benefits Trust". This is a program that has been approved by the National Lodge for FOP members who would be interested in short δ long term disability for both on and off the job injury. In addition, and most importantly is the Medical Savings Trust. This program works similar to a VEBA and allows members to direct deposit from their payroll and amount into a IOO% TAX DEFERRED account. Funds deposited in the member account is tax free. It also affords tax free on all earnings and tax free on any IRS qualified medical distributions or payouts.

For those who want to retire early this is a surefire way to prepare yourself to have funds available to apply toward your medical costs after you retire. You do not need to retire to take advantage of the tax-free savings on health care expenses. For the younger families they can also access these tax-free funds for any medical expenses that they or their children have like braces, eye glasses or any other need for healthcare.

The FOP Legal Defense Plan continues to be a big benefit for LEO's. As you may know the recent trial of one of the Auburn Police Officers, Jeffrey Nelson, was convicted of 2nd Degree Murder and 1st Degree Assault. This case resulted in a bill to the LDP in excess of \$4M and that doesn't include any appeals. It is unfortunate for all those involved but Due Process was provided and the funds to pay for it. Like your American Express Card – "don't leave home without it!" For retirees there is a LDP for \$75 per year that gives you full coverage with civil and criminal claims for qualified HR-218 qualified.

Hoping you all are enjoying the dog days of summer and making the most of this conference. The FOP is a member driven organization and would not be possible without each and every one of you helping promote and encourage members from across the state.

2O25 was also an election year for the National Trustee position for our state. I am humbled to announce that I have been reelected to my 9th term as Wisconsin National Trustee. It has truly been an honor to represent Wisconsin on the National Board for the past 16 years. I do not take this responsibility lightly. I want to thank each member from the state of Wisconsin for instilling your faith in me to be your voice on the National Board. I look forward to the challenges that lie ahead.

At the conclusion of the business portion of our conference, our members gathered for an afternoon at the ballpark to watch Milwaukee Brewers farm team, the Wisconsin Timber Rattlers take on the West Michigan Whitecaps.

The FOP remains to be the lead voice for Law Enforcement in Wisconsin as we continue to introduce legislation and provide testimony in support of measures aimed at improving the quality of life for our members and Wisconsin Law Enforcement as a whole. Over the past few months members of our Legislative Committee have been fixtures at the State Capitol providing testimony to advance our legislative priorities. These measures include

Senate Bill 105 / Senate Bill 170

SB IO5 Was introduced in March and pertains to Wisconsin Retirement System annuit rehires. This legislation amends existing statutes to allow retired protective service employees to re-enter state government-related work without suspending existing annuities. Also introduced in March was SB I7O. This is a separate bill that focuses on all WRS annuitants and serves to levy substantial restrictions on all re-hires. Fortunately, our lobbyist convinced the authors of this bill to amend it to exclude state employees designated as protective class. This will ensure our members will not be bound by the restrictions spelled out in SB I7O as we move forward.

Assembly Bill 34

This bill is designed to protect Officers who are forced to use privileged self-defense that results in the death of their assailant from continued litigation without the introduction of significant new evidence that could substantiate criminal charges. This piece of legislation was crafted by the FOP and originally introduced in 2O24. Last year it successfully passed through the State Assembly and Senate but was ultimately vetoed by our Governor.

Assembly Bill 53

This bill extends Class H Felony penalties to individuals who intentionally harm or threaten Community Police Officers operating in an official capacity.

Assembly Bill 124

Assembly Bill 124 would prohibit individuals convicted of violent crimes from changing their names. This legislation is aimed at preventing offenders' efforts to conceal their past.

Assembly Bill 191

This bill stands to alter the way subpoenas are served on Law Enforcement Officers in our state. This bill would require subpoenas to be served on Officers at work rather than at their private residence and shelter them from disclosure of their home addresses. This is a grassroots effort led by the Wisconsin State Lodge after an Ashland County Circuit Court ruling that mandated the disclosure of home addresses for all the witnesses, including Law Enforcement and Crime Lab personnel posing significant safety concerns for these employees.

On April 25th, 2O25, every Public Safety Union in our state inadvertently received a win when the Wisconsin Employment Relations Commission came back with a favorable ruling for Racine Fire Local 321 that ultimately strengthened the bargaining rights for all public safety unions in our state.

In short, the City of Racine filed a petition for declaratory ruling with the commission that was focused on removing significant health insurance provisions from the Firefighters collective bargaining agreement. The ruling returned by the WERC designated that health insurance provisions are mandatory subjects of bargaining for active members in the bargaining unit and protects the public safety union's ability to negotiate health insurance terms with their employers. This hard-fought victory was earned by MacGillis Law Group who represents Racine Fire Local 321. Founding member Chris MacGillis is a member of our Legal Defense team and corporate council for our state lodge. Congratulations to Chris and his associates on this landmark victory.

Wisconsin continues to experience steady growth in both group and individual membership. We are waiting on a date for one lodge chartering and anticipate several new lodge chartering's in the upcoming months.

On April 24th the NFL Draft descended upon Green Bay drawing 600,000 fans to Wisconsin. As you might guess, this presented a significant challenge for area Law Enforcement as the population of Green Bay virtually tripled over the 3-day event. Green Bay Lodge 2 got on board with this early and in conjunction with the State Lodge helped coordinate efforts to provide meals and beverages for ALL first responders working during the three-day event. All in all, the event was well planned and went off without any significant issues. This was a fantastic opportunity for us to support our members and show them who truly has their back.

In closing I want to wish all the candidate elects and those venues vying for national conferences good luck. To all those who are still out there doing the job, we appreciate the selfless sacrifice you make every day on our behalf. May God watch over you and guide you in your continued effort to fight the righteous fight.

Overall, Wyoming continues to see consistent numbers in membership over the last several years, a testament to the dedication of our local lodges and the value members find in belonging to the FOP. We are, however, still navigating dynamics within smaller communities that impact membership numbers, and we remain focused on supporting all lodges across the state in recruiting and retention efforts.

Many Wyoming FOP members are rightly drawn to the FOP for the crucial legal defense benefit. This remains a key component of membership value. However, as noted in previous reports, Wyoming continues to struggle to find attorneys willing to become Legal Defense Plan attorneys and provide representation within the state. The prevailing challenge appears to be the low reimbursement rate offered by the Legal Defense Plan, which many potential attorneys feel does not adequately cover their costs. This perception has unfortunately become widespread within our relatively small legal community. Consequently, we have had to refer our members in need to attorneys in neighboring states to ensure they receive necessary representation. This remains a significant challenge we are actively working to mitigate.

Legislatively, the 2025 Wyoming State Legislature session presented a complex landscape for law enforcement. While some positive proposals were considered, such as potential increases in funding for critical areas like Child Sexual Abuse Material investigations, a particularly concerning piece of legislation emerged: Senate File 196, "Second Amendment Protection Act amendments." This bill, as drafted, contained provisions that would have subjected governmental entities to liability and created potential criminal penalties for law enforcement officers who, in the course of their duties, enforced federal firearms laws that were deemed to conflict with Wyoming statute. This proposal was viewed as a serious and direct attack upon Wyoming law enforcement, placing our dedicated officers in an untenable position and creating potential legal jeopardy simply for upholding laws.

We are grateful that Governor Mark Gordon recognized the inherent dangers and unacceptable nature of this aspect of SF 196. In his message vetoing the bill on March 18, 2025, Governor Gordon rightly stated that the legislation "potentially could vilify Wyoming law enforcement" and emphasized that "Wyoming can do better." He strongly affirmed, "In Wyoming, we back the Blue and we support Second Amendment rights. We shouldn't need to pass boilerplate bills pushed by out-of-state lobbyists simply to fill out a legislative scorecard." I The Governor's clear stance that he did not want to be part of any attack on police, and his commitment to working with the law enforcement community on a path forward, was a critical intervention and a welcome show of support for the men and women who serve and protect our communities. While legislative sessions often bring challenging bills, the nature of SF 196 highlighted the ongoing need for vigilant advocacy to protect the ability of law enforcement to do their jobs safely and effectively.

Conversely, the Wyoming State Legislature has demonstrated active engagement in legislating on issues related to illegal immigration during recent sessions, particularly in 2025, proposing several bills aimed at addressing the matter at the state level. Legislative efforts have focused on areas such as creating state offenses for transporting or hiring individuals unlawfully present in the U.S., requiring state and local law enforcement to cooperate with federal immigration authorities by inquiring about immigration status and reporting unauthorized individuals, prohibiting "sanctuary" designations for cities, counties, or the state, and regulating the validity of driver's licenses held by unauthorized aliens.

Moving on from legislation, Wyoming law enforcement has been tasked to better track Transnational Criminal Organizations, of which the Sinaloa, CJNG, and Juarez Cartels, have been tracked in 40% of Wyoming's counties. Concurrently, Wyoming faces a rapidly evolving drug threat landscape marked by the emergence of highly potent and dangerous synthetics such as Xylazine, Carfentanil, and Nitazenes, alongside concerning trends like reduced cocaine prices linked to overdose increases. Fortunately, Wyoming has experienced the decline in Fentanyl seizures and decline in Fentanyl overdoses. In closing, the Wyoming FOP remains committed to supporting our members through legal defense, legislative advocacy, and fostering camaraderie. While we face ongoing challenges, particularly with the LDP and navigating complex legislative issues, we continue to work diligently to protect the rights and interests of Wyoming's law enforcement professionals. I. NFOP LEGAL COUNSELOR SEMINAR: 2024, 2025 and 2026

A. 2026 Legal Counselor Seminar

The 2026 Legal Counselor Seminar is scheduled for **March 30–31**, **2026**, at the South Point Hotel, Casino & Spa, located at 9777 S. Las Vegas Blvd. The agenda is as follows:

Day One

<u>Larry James</u> Welcome and Seminar Overview

President Yoes Legislative and Administrative Update – A comprehensive update on recent legislation,

administrative developments, and key successes affecting the National FOP.

Phil Abdoo & Marc Curtis Case Study: In-Custody Death and Legal Defense – A detailed review of a major case involving corrections officers charged with involuntary manslaughter in an in-custody death. The presentation will cover union response, media involvement, defense strategies, and the nuances of representing corrections officers compared to patrol

officers.

<u>Skylar Limkemann</u> Brady/Giglio: Legal Developments and Model Policies – An overview of leading

duties of corrections officers, including obligations to intervene, respond to inmate assaults, provide medical care, and prevent inmate suicides. Emphasis will be placed on

deliberate indifference standards and officer training practices.

Matt Hill Workers' Compensation, PTSD, and Fitness for Duty – An overview of workers'

compensation laws across all 5O states, with a focus on PTSD claims, officer fitness-forduty evaluations, accommodations, and the legal framework surrounding forced

retirement.

B. 2025 Legal Counselor Seminar

The 2025 Legal Counselor Seminar took place on February 13-14, 2025, at the Planet Hollywood Resort & Casino in Las Vegas, NV.

From the General Counsel's Office, Christopher Green and Marissa Borschke presented on the status of Civilian Review Boards. This presentation offered a timely update and comprehensive overview of Civilian Review Boards across the nation, examining their evolving roles, authority, and challenges. Discussion of key topics included subpoena power and budgetary constraints, and the consequential issues these elements present. Through specific examples and case studies, the presentation showed the complexities surrounding these boards, including the tensions between accountability, transparency, and resource limitations.

Christopher Green and Marissa Borschke also presented on Artificial Intelligence in Policing. This presentation discussed the intersection between artificial intelligence (AI) and its utilization in law enforcement. It explored the current landscape of AI's implementation, drawing upon real-world examples, and its potential usage. It discussed how AI is being used in the legal industry and at trial. It used case studies to examine AI's evolving role, admissibility issues, and emerging trends within legal proceedings.

Michael Coviello, presented on the "Just Cause" Standard. This presentation offered an in-depth explanation of the concept of "just cause" within the realm of disciplinary actions, providing clarity on its meaning, standard, and practical application. The discussion delved into the fundamental questions: What constitutes "just cause" and how is it assessed in disciplinary proceedings? Additionally, the session provided insights into the requisite notice required in disciplinary actions, understanding the procedural safeguards necessary to ensure fairness and due process. Moreover, the presentation analyzed the types of evidence deemed sufficient to establish just cause, as well as what mitigating factors are considered in order to ensure that disciplinary measures align proportionally with the severity of the misconduct.

Larry James, and Lance LoRusso gave a presentation on Contemporary Issues in Policing. They provided a comprehensive update on Graham v. Connor. It also provided an overview of qualified immunity, updates of state legislation regarding officers' accountability and the various standards, including the use of force, as well as

ABA Formal Opinion 511.

Other presenters for the 2O25 Legal Counselor Seminar included Wes Phillips and Zach Klein, who provided Insights from the City Attorney's Perspective. Zach Klein explored the duty to defend officers and the considerations involved in such decisions as the Columbus City Attorney. Mark Collins and Kaitlyn Stephens presented on Defending Law Enforcement Officers. This presentation offered a detailed exploration through case studies on representing officers from the inception of an incident to its resolution. It delved into the intricacies of navigating interviews with internal affairs and other law enforcement agencies, departmental charges, civil lawsuits, and criminal investigations, including grand jury proceedings, jury instructions, and voir dire questions.

Former Chief Judge Algenon Marbley of the Southern District of Ohio, John Kautzman, and Andrew Duncan discussed Section 1983 Litigation. The presentation was a comprehensive examination of the legal process of Section 1983 lawsuits from the initial filing of the complaint to the trial. They reviewed some of the more controversial and difficult cases involving riots and police conduct.

C. 2024 Legal Counselor Seminar

The 2024 Legal Counselor Seminar took place on February 1-2, 2024, at Planet Hollywood Resort & Casino in Las Vegas, NV.

The seminar focused on navigating the complex legal landscape confronting law enforcement today. As with prior seminars, the National FOP assembled experienced and distinguished practitioners from across the country to provide not only informative legal updates, but also practical tips and information for handling the unique issues that challenge lawyers representing law enforcement.

The 2O24 Legal Counselor Seminar explored the unique legal issues faced by police officers and the legal professionals that work alongside them. Topics included privacy rights for police officers, representing an officer in a use-of-force case, combating placement on Brady and Giglio lists, an overview of recent changes to certification and decertification processes, and cases addressing an officer's duty to intervene, report, and/or render aid. The seminar also included a roundtable discussion moderated by General Counsel Larry H. James, for a deeper diver into some of the most recent hot button issues impacting police officers.

President Patrick Yoes opened the seminar with a general update on the National Fraternal Order of Police. He addressed the benefits that our ListServ is providing to practitioners representing law enforcement. Present Yoes also provided a comprehensive overview on matters affecting law enforcement throughout the country, including key legislative initiatives taking place across cities and states.

When the Akron Beacon Journal sought to compel The City of Akron, Ohio and its police department to provide personnel records with the unredacted names of Akron police officers involved in use of lethal force incidents, the lawyers for the officers sprang into action. Before any investigation into the shooting had occurred, the officers and their families faced threats of violence and harm. Gwen Callendar and Susannah Muskovitz discussed strategies that worked—and did not work—to protect the identities of the officers.

Use-of-force cases often bring law enforcement officers into the legal (and public) spotlight. The principles of reasonableness, as established in the landmark case of Graham v. Connor, still guide the evaluation of an officer's use of force. Lance LoRusso, a former law enforcement officer himself, and current General Counsel to the Georgia State Lodge, has represented over IOO officers in on-duty shootings or in-custody deaths. He brought his plethora of knowledge and experience to discuss effective tools to use when representing an officer in a use of force case before an administrative body, trial court, or grand jury proceeding.

Designation on a Brady/Giglio list means that an officer has credibility concerns as a witness and will not be called to testify at trial. If an officer is unable to testify regarding their involvement in a case, i.e., making arrests, investigations, or handling evidence, the officer is functionally unable to perform a critical part of their job. As a result, officers are placed on restricted duty, stripped of their police authority, or deemed no longer employable. With little court direction or laws expressly outlining Brady/Giglio lists obligations, these lists have developed sporadically and inconsistently. Leo Blackwell and John Kautzman equipped attendees with negotiation, litigation, and legislative strategies to combat the weaponization of Brady/Giglio.

Practically all states have established a formal mechanism for certifying police officers, akin to the licensure procedures for various other professions. Nevertheless, a few states have opted for administrative or regulatory methods instead, Similarly, state laws can encompass provisions for decertification, or states can address this issue through administrative channels or regulatory processes. States that possess preexisting statutory guidelines for certification and decertification are more prone to proposing and implementing amendments compared to states that have not initiated such systems from the ground up. Depending on the specific state and the framework already in place, revisions made in the past three years have spanned a spectrum from comprehensive and farreaching to precise and technical in nature. Chris Green and Marissa Borschke from the Office of the General Counsel presented an overview of recent trends in certification and decertification. Additionally, Tamara Cummings, who has been at the center of many battles with the Illinois State Legislature over the past several years regarding wide-ranging police reform proposals, provided a case study specifically on Illinois' certification and decertification processes.

Garrity and Loudermill rights are designed to protect public employees, including police officers, during administrative investigations. Officers must be informed of their rights when subject to questioning, as statements made under compulsion can have serious legal implications. John V. Berry represents federal employees, government contractors, employers, state employees, federal intelligence agency employees, law enforcement officers, firefighters, and private sector employees, in various employment, labor, and national security law matters. John provided strategies for when lawyers find themselves in a case with Garrity implications.

The Department of Justice can respond to allegations of police misconduct by initiating formal investigations. The result of those investigations is sometimes settled through executing a consent decree between the local police department and the federal government. While this is not a new concept, the country saw an increase in consent decrees and other measures taken after George Floyd case. As part of the second day of the seminar, Marissa Borschke presented on the status of the recent consent decrees, the benefits and complaints of these agreements, and other attempted reforms in the post-George Floyd policing environment.

Michael Coviello presented on medical and mental health issues for officers in fitness for duty matters. His presentation included key considerations for protecting an officer's job and privacy rights.

Law enforcement officers have legal duties to intervene imposed upon them by state laws, federal constitutional law, and agency policies. Since May 2O2O, state legislatures across the country have enacted laws aimed at law enforcement accountability and oversight. These laws include affirmative statutory duties for officers to intervene in, and report on, instances of excessive force or other violations of an individual's rights. For example, Colorado, Connecticut, Minnesota, Nevada, Oregon, and Vermont have created affirmative statutory duties to intervene. As a matter of federal constitutional law, an officer's duty to intervene has existed for decades, Chris Green gave an in-depth discussion on the legal duties and liabilities of officers including the duty to intervene, duty to report, and duty to render medical aid covered by state law, case law, and department policy.

Larry H. James, joined by Lance LoRusso, Tamara Cummings, and John Kautzman, led a roundtable discussion on topics impacting the various jurisdictions that our lawyers represent. This session opened the floor for attendees to seek insight on specific topics or to provide ideas and solutions to any of the unique issues impacting law enforcement officers. The collaboration was invaluable.

II. AMICUS BRIEF UPDATE

A. What is an "amicus brief" and why do we file them?

Since 2001, the Office of the General Counsel has supported the NFOP and its membership, in part, through the filing of legal briefs at all levels of the judicial system—including the United States Supreme Court. These submissions, known as an "amicus curiae" or "friend of the court" briefs, are helpful to the judges tasked with deciding complicated legal issues. The briefs provide important policy implications and offer the unique perspective of those individuals and organizations potentially impacted by the court's ruling. In that regard, the National FOP's briefs supply the vital viewpoint of the boots-on-the-ground officer.

In support of law enforcement officers and to address nationwide public safety concerns, the National FOP has filed forty-three amicus briefs since 2001. In 2022 alone, there have been seven briefs filed—three to the United States Supreme Court. Each brief examined different consequences of the court's action — or lack thereof — on law

enforcement officers and the public they are sworn to protect. The issues in these cases ranges from protecting the qualified immunity defense to demanding due process in Brady/Giglio matters. While not every case is decided in favor of the police, the voice of law enforcement remains a respected and valued contributor.

B. Amicus History

Notable highlights from the General Counsel's amicus brief filings include:

- 43 amicus briefs filed in support of law enforcement since 2001!
- 19 amicus briefs filed to the United States Supreme Court!
- 7 amicus briefs filed since 2022!
- 23 cases decided in favor of law enforcement!

C. Barnes v Felix, U.S. Supreme Court

On May 15, 2025, the U.S. Supreme Court delivered a unanimous opinion in Barnes v. Felix, a case followed closely by law enforcement. The following is a summary of the decision and its impact on law enforcement:

Case Background

Officer Roberto Felix pulled over Ashtian Barnes along a busy Texas highway for suspected toll violations. During the traffic stop, Barnes attempted to drive away. Felix jumped onto the car's doorsill as it began moving and fired two shots inside the vehicle. Barnes was fatally hit but managed to stop the car. The entire incident from when the car started moving until it stopped lasted about five seconds. Two seconds passed between Felix stepping on the doorsill and firing his first shot. Barnes's mother sued Felix, alleging excessive force in violation of the Fourth Amendment.

Lower Court Decisions

The District Court and Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals granted summary judgment to Felix. Both courts applied the Fifth Circuit's "moment-of-threat" rule. This rule limited their analysis to only the circumstances existing at the precise moment the officer perceived the threat (i.e., the two seconds when Felix was on the doorsill). Under this narrow time frame, they concluded Felix reasonably believed his life was in danger when he fired.

Supreme Court's Ruling

The Court unanimously rejected the "moment-of-threat" rule as inconsistent with Fourth Amendment jurisprudence. Justice Kagan delivered the opinion, holding that excessive force claims must be analyzed under the "totality of the circumstances" standard established in Graham v. Connor. The Court ruled that a proper Fourth Amendment analysis:

- Cannot be limited to only the exact moment when force was used.
- Must consider all relevant facts and circumstances, including events leading up to the use-of-force.
- Has no arbitrary time limit on what contextual information is relevant.

Outcome

The Court vacated the judgment of the Court of Appeals. The case was remanded for further proceedings using the appropriate "totality of the circumstances" standard. The Court did not address whether an officer's own "creation of a dangerous situation" factors into the reasonableness analysis.

Concurring Opinion

Justice Kavanaugh (joined by Justices Thomas, Alito, and Barrett) wrote separately to emphasize:

• The inherent dangers of traffic stops for police officers. Justice Kavanaugh did so by citing to the amicus brief filed by the National Fraternal Order of Police.

- o Even for routine traffic violations, traffic stops are "fraught with danger to police officers." Michigan v. Long, 463 U. S. 1032, 1047 (1983). An "inordinate risk confront[s] an officer as he approaches a person seated in an automobile." Pennsylvania v. Mimms, 434 U. S. 106, 110 (1977) (per curiam). That is in part because officers operate at a "tactical disadvantage" when "approaching .an unknown vehicle, with limited visibility and unpredictable threats." Brief for the National Fraternal Order of Police as Amicus Curiae 4. As this Court noted nearly 50 years ago, "a significant percentage of murders of police officers occurs when the officers are making traffic stops." Mimms, 434 U. S., at 110 (quoting United States v. Robinson, 414 U. S. 218, 234, n. 5 (1973)).
- The particular risks when drivers flee during traffic stops.
- The difficult split-second decisions officers must make in such situations.
- That none of the available options for officers facing fleeing drivers are without risk.

Key Legal Principles from the Decision

- Force must be "objectively reasonable" from the perspective of a reasonable officer at the scene.
- Prior events may inform how a reasonable officer would understand and respond to later circumstances.
- Courts cannot apply "chronological blinders" that prevent consideration of relevant context. Meaning, courts are still instructed to judge an officer's actions without the benefit of 20/20 hindsight and with appropriate deference to tense, uncertain, and rapidly evolving situations officers face.
- The Court specifically did not address whether an officer's own actions that might have "created a dangerous situation" should factor into the reasonableness analysis. This leaves open a significant question that courts will continue to grapple with. To what extent should an officer's own role in escalating a situation be considered when evaluating the reasonableness of their use of force?
- With respect to Graham v. Connor and jury instructions, we are tracking cases where an officer is facing criminal charges for a use of force.
 - o For example, in Darby v. Alabama, Officer William Darby was convicted by a jury for murder. On appeal, Officer Darby contended in part that the trial court erred by refusing to give the jury instructions regarding the Graham v. Connor reasonable officer standard. The trial court effectively placed Officer Darby in the position of a civilian rather than a law enforcement officer when it refused to instruct the jury on Graham v. Connor. The NFOP filed an amicus brief in support of Officer Darby's appeal. The NFOP argued that it is reversible error for a trial court not to instruct the jury on the proper use of force standard as set forth in Graham v. Connor and Tennessee v. Garner in a criminal trial for a police officer's use of force in the line of duty.
 - On March 24, 2023, the Alabama Court of Criminal Appeals reversed and remanded Officer William Darby's murder conviction and ordered a new trial. The Appeals Court held that "the proper perspective from which to evaluate a police officer's use of deadly force in such situations is indeed that of a reasonable police officer in the same situation." The Appeals Court concluded that the trial court's failure to give the requested Graham v. Connor jury instruction was reversible error. Officer Darby has since pleaded to a lesser offense and was given time served.
 - o In Davis v. Arkansas, Officer Michael Davis was convicted of negligent homicide for the shooting death of Hunter Brittain. Officer Davis appealed his conviction. He argued that the trial court erred in rejecting his proffered non-model jury instruction with regard to the use of deadly force by law enforcement officers, i.e., the "justification defense." His argument was similar to Officer Darby's contention.
 - Unfortunately, in Officer Davis's case, the trial court found that he only sought the justification instruction on the charge of manslaughter which he was acquitted, but not the negligent homicide charge. Thus, the issue was not preserved for appeal. However, Judge Hixson provided a helpful concurrence.

- Judge Hixson noted that: "If an officer's conduct is judge from the perspective of a
 reasonable officer in a civil case where only money damages are involved, should
 this standard not apply equally in a criminal case when an officer's liberty is at stake?"
 Judge Hixson discussed the "strikingly different" standards between what a "reasonable
 person would have observed" versus what a "reasonable officer would have observed."
 - He continued: There can be no doubt that a police officer is in a markedly different position of heightened awareness than that of the normal citizen when the officer is carrying out his or her duties to investigate suspicious activity and confront those who may pose an immediate danger.

IV. TRADEMARK AND AGREEMENTS

A. Trademark License Agreements

General Counsel monitors the following agreements, among others, for the NFOP: (1) Trademark License Agreements with Royalty Fee and (ii) Trademark License Agreements with no Royalty Fee. We work proactively with Angie Hoover to determine which vendors require the payment of the annual fee including compliance with submission of quarterly reports to determine appropriate royalty payments due and payable.

B. Promotion and License Agreements

General Counsel continues to manage existing Promotion and License Agreements with various universities. We work proactively with Stephanie Simpson to determine which colleges and universities require the payment of the annual fee. We also assist in the admission of new consortium members.

C. Trademark Registrations Compliance

We continue to monitor and file renewal registrations with the United States Patent and Trademark Office for all trademarks and service marks owned by the National Fraternal Order of Police. We regularly update master summary of all current trademarks owned by the NFOP. We constantly monitor eBay, Amazon and the internet, in general, to determine if third-party vendors are selling unauthorized NFOP items.

D. Contract Preparation, Review, and Negotiation

To ensure that the NFOP enters into contracts that align with the best interests of its members and organizational objectives—and engages only with reputable and established entities—the Office of the General Counsel conducts a comprehensive review. This review encompasses an analysis of legal terms and provisions, as well as a thorough assessment of the practical, economic, and tax-related implications of the contract. Specifically, we evaluate each

agreement for compliance with the federal requirements governing 5OI(c)(8) fraternal beneficiary organizations, including limitations on income use, lobbying activities, and unrelated business income. The following are examples of contracts we reviewed and negotiated, as needed:

- Licensing Agreement with Employee Benefit Systems, Inc.
- MOU with Sierra Tucson
- MOU with American Heart Association
- Licensing Agreement with FinancialCop
- Licensing Agreement with Luraco Health & Beauty LLC, d/b/a/ Luraco Technologies
- MOU with FitBod
- Master Marketing Services Agreement with Liberty Home Guard

V. INTERNAL AFFAIRS

The Office of the General Counsel finalized the draft of the NFOP's Employee Handbook for review and approval by the Board. This updated version incorporates revisions to ensure compliance with current legal standards and regulations, while also reflecting the organization's practices. The goal was to provide a comprehensive, user-friendly resource that offers clear guidance to employees regarding their rights, responsibilities, and workplace expectations.

VI. RESEARCH

A. Best Practices for Protecting Psychotherapist Patient Privilege

Communication and records related to critical incident debriefing meetings may enjoy protection under the psychotherapist-patient privilege, safeguarding them from disclosure in a criminal, civil, or administrative proceedings and not subject to subpoenas, discovery, or produced as evidence.

The following best practices align with the federal standard created by the United States Supreme Court in Jaffee v. Redmond, 518 U.S. 1 (1996). However, it is important to refer to state-specific legislation to ensure compliance with any variations from the federal standard. Officers are encouraged to consult with local counsel to confirm adherence to applicable regulations regarding their state privilege.

Best Practices

1. Engage with Licensed Professionals.

To establish the privilege, all communications should occur between a licensed therapist or licensed social worker, or a trained member/professional specifically permitted by state legislation. Verify that the professional has the necessary certifications and/or accreditations.

2. Limit the Meetings to Those Involved in the Incident.

To protect the privilege, the critical incident debriefings and response services should be closed to the general public and closed to anyone who was not directly involved in the critical incident that is the subject of the meeting.

3. Limit the Scope of the Conversations & Evaluation to Treatment Purposes.

Not every conversation with a therapist is privileged. To maintain the privilege, communications to the therapist should be made within the context of seeking treatment. Focus discussions on expressing emotional well-being, psychological experiences, and addressing personal trauma. Refrain from discussing fact-specific details related to the critical incident that may lead to unintentional corroboration or aligning narratives. This privilege is likely to be waived in situations where statements are made or examinations are conducted for purposes other than treatment, such as fitness-for-duty evaluations and examinations for workers' compensation.

4. Understand Confidentiality Terms for Meetings & Evaluations.

To establish the psychotherapist-patient privilege, a determinative factor is whether the officer had a reasonable expectation of confidentiality. The privilege will likely not apply to situations where the meetings or evaluations explicitly state or make it clear that statements and records will be shared to others (i.e., the department) or not kept confidential.

5. Waiver of Privilege — Do Not Disclose Information to Third-Parties.

In order to maintain the privilege, any information divulged in the debriefing meeting must be kept confidential and may not be disclosed to a third party. The privilege may be waived if information or records are disclosed.

Adhering to the best practices outlined above will help establish the federal psychotherapist-patient privilege and protect sensitive information shared during critical incident stress debriefing sessions.

B. Duty to Intervene

How is the duty to intervene established?

- 1. State law.
 - **a.** Since 2020, at least 12 states have created a duty for law enforcement officers to intervene in cases of excessive force or misconduct.
 - **b.** Officers that fail to intervene may face penalties ranging from decertification to criminal liability.
 - **c.** Examples include: California, Colorado, Connecticut, Illinois, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Maryland, Minnesota, New Mexico, Nevada, Oregon, Virginia, Vermont, and Washington.
 - i. The new Virginia law reads: "Any law-enforcement officer who, while in the performance of his official duties, witnesses another law-enforcement officer engaging or attempting to engage in the use of excessive force against another person shall intervene, when such intervention is feasible, to end the use of excessive force or attempted use of excessive force, or to prevent the further use of excessive force." (SB 5030).

2. Case law.

- **a.** Civil lawsuits for failure to intervene are brought under 42 U.S.C. § 1983. Liability under § 1983 requires proof of two essential elements: that the conduct complained of (1) was committed by a person acting under color of state law and (2) deprived a person of rights, privileges, or immunities secured by the Constitution or laws of the United States. Yang v. Hardin, 37 F.3d 282, 284 (7th Cir. 1994).
- **b.** The leading case in this area is Byrd v. Brishke, 466 F,2d 6 (7th Cir. 1972). The plaintiff in that case sued several Chicago police officers for deprivation of his civil rights under 42 U.S.C. § 1983, alleging that they had assaulted and beaten him in a bar using nightsticks and fists. He further contended that the officers "call[ed] him . . . obscene[] and uncivil names and epithets," which seems rather mild compared to being hit with a nightstick. The plaintiff could not identify which officers he contended hit him and which were bystanders, so he alleged that the defendant officers were liable either for assaulting him or for failing to intervene and protect him from the officers who did. The district court directed a verdict for the defendants, but the Seventh Circuit reversed. It found that section 1983 allows for "liability . . . both for misfeasance and for nonfeasance.

c. Recent case example:

- i. Timpa v. Dillard, 20 F.4th 1020 (5th Cir. 2021) A federal civil jury awarded the teenage son of a man who died in 2016 while in Dallas Police custody \$1 million in damages for violating his father's constitutional rights.
 - 1. Within the Fifth Circuit, "[a]n officer is liable for failure to intervene when that officer: (1) knew a fellow officer was violating an individual's constitutional rights, (2) was present at the scene of the constitutional violation, (3) had a reasonable opportunity to prevent the harm but nevertheless, (4) chose not to act." Bartlett, 981 F.3d at 343.
 - 2. The court considered the liability of four officers for failure to intervene. Two of the officers stood feet away from the Plaintiff throughout the fourteenminute duration of the restraint. Each officer was trained to "ensure that[,] as soon as subjects are brought under control, they are placed in an upright position ... or on their side." Both testified that they were aware of the risks of holding an arrestee in the prone restraint position. The officers do not contend that they lacked reasonable opportunity to intervene. Indeed, both officers stood by, observed Timpa suddenly lose consciousness, expressed surprise, and then made jesting comments. Both officers "stood by and laughed" while the fellow officer continued to kneel on an incapacitated arrestee supports an inference of "acquiescence in the alleged use of force."
 - **3.** Next, the supervising officer left the scene 2.5 minutes prior to Timpa losing consciousness. Thus, he lacked a reasonable opportunity to intervene and was entitled to qualified immunity.
 - **4.** The second supervising officer, however, sat in the patrol car "a few feet away" with the car door open while he ran a check on Timpa's license. He testified that he did not hear the other officers mocked Timpa for losing consciousness, but he was observing Timpa for the critical half-minute when Timpa suddenly lost consciousness. Moreover, the record supports an inference that he was aware Timpa had become incapacitated. The court found that a jury could find that the supervising officer remained present on the scene and acquiesced in the constitutional violation.

3. Department policy.

- **a.** 21 of the country's 100 largest police departments have adopted duty to intervene policies since 2020. At least 72 agencies have an affirmative duty to intervene.
- **b.** Example Policy: Baltimore Police Department. See attached.
- **c.** DOJ Policy. Effective on July 19, 2022, the DOJ implemented an affirmative duty to intervene for federal officers. It provides: "Officers will be trained in, and must recognize and act upon, the affirmative duty to intervene to prevent or stop, as appropriate, any officer from engaging in excessive force or any other use of force that violates the Constitution, other federal laws, or Department policies on the reasonable use of force."

What sort of intervention is required?

Answer: It depends. Each state, jurisdiction, department is slightly different. Know your state law, know the case law in your jurisdiction, and know your department policy.

• Make sure the department policy complies with the state law and the case law in that jurisdiction.

- Most state statutes and agency policies are silent.
 - o Minneapolis updated their policy post-George Floyd to require intervention by verbal and physical means.
 - o The prosecutors handling the federal criminal litigation arising from George Floyd's death seem to have concluded that verbal intervention is enough, at least for purposes of criminal liability. One of the officers present at the scene apparently asked Officer Derek Chauvin, as Chauvin knelt on Floyd's neck, "should we roll him on his side?" Although Chauvin said no, the officer who asked the question is the only officer on scene not charged with a crime based on a failure to intervene in Chauvin's unlawful use of force.
- There are a few civil section 1983 cases suggesting that physical intervention may be required under at least some circumstances.
 - o For example, in Gonzalez v. Waterbury Police Dept., 199 F.Supp.3d 616 (D. Conn. 2016), the plaintiff led officers on a high-speed chase, then fled on foot, ultimately hiding in a drainage ditch. He alleged that he was surrounded by multiple officers who began throwing rocks at him, and that they continued to do so even after he surrendered to them. He sued, claiming that several officers were liable either for throwing the rocks or for failing to intervene. The district court denied in part the officers' motion for judgment as a matter of law, ruling that two officers were in a position from which they were able to intervene" in that they "could have communicated to [another officer] that [the rock throwing] needed to stop" and that the officers "could have physically gone to the other side of the ditch and prevented additional rocks from being thrown."

What if the officers are from different agencies?

Answer: It depends. Know the rule in your jurisdiction.

• For example, the Fifth Circuit ruled in Hale v. Townley, 45 F.3d 914, 919 (5th Cir. 1995), that "[t]he fact that [the officer using force] and [another officer on the scene] were from different law enforcement agencies does not as a matter of law relieve [the latter] from liability for a failure to intervene."

Does the duty exist beyond use of force cases?

Answer: Officers can be liable for failing to intervene in matters that do not involve a use of force.

- False confession case. Peterson v. Heyines, 931 F.3d 546 (6th Cir. 2019) —affirming denial of qualified immunity in a case where the plaintiff contended that officers had extracted a false confession from him and withheld evidence from his criminal defense attorney, or failed to intervene when other officers did so; these allegations concerned "constitutional violation[s] with respect to malicious prosecution, procedural due process rights, and failure to intervene."
- First Amendment case. Cooper v. Garman, 2021 WL 4033113 (M.D. Pa. Sept. 3, 2021) (unpublished) denying summary judgment in a section 1983 case filed by an inmate who alleged that officers violated his First Amendment rights or failed to intervene when others did so; "a reasonable juror could conclude that [one officer] violated Plaintiff's First Amendment rights by failing to intervene to stop [another officer]."

C. Duty to Report.

Many of the states that have enacted duty to intervene requirements have included language requiring officers to report misconduct by fellow officers.

• Example: North Carolina.

In North Carolina, when an officer in the line of duty, observes another officer use force, and reasonably believes that force used exceeds the amount of force authorized under state law, (and regardless of whether the observing officer had an opportunity to intervene), the observing officer must report what he or she believes to be an unauthorized use-of-force. The report must be made within a reasonable period of time not to exceed 72 hours after the observation. The observing officer must make the report to a superior law enforcement officer within the observing officer's agency.

If the head of the law enforcement agency of the observing officer was involved or present during the alleged unauthorized use of force, the observing officer must make the report to the highest ranking officer in the agency who was not involved in or present during the use of force.

D. Duty to Render Medical Aid.

How is the duty to render medical aid established?

Answer: Like the duty to intervene, by state law, case law, and department policy.

1. State law.

- a. In addition to the duty to intervene, many states have codified a duty to render medical aid.
- **b.** Examples: Colorado, Illinois, Maryland, Nevada, New York, Virginia, Washington, D.C.
 - i. For example, after the duty to intervene requirement, Virginia's law states: "A law-enforcement officer shall also render aid, as circumstances reasonably permit, to any person injured as the result of the use of excessive force."

2. Case law.

- **a.** Rule: The Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment generally does not provide an affirmative right to governmental aid, but in certain limited circumstances, it does impose upon the State affirmative duties of care and protection with respect to particular individuals. An individual may be constitutionally entitled to police assistance under the Fourteenth Amendment in custodial and other settings in which the state has limited the individual's ability to care for themselves.
- **b.** Qualified immunity is a defense to a failure to render medical aid claim depending on the facts and circumstances.
- **c.** Most courts analyze a failure to render medical aid under a "deliberate indifference" standard. To show deliberate indifference, a plaintiff must show an objectively serious medical need and that the defendant knew of and yet deliberately disregarded that medical need.

3. Department policy.

a. Within many department's use-of-force policy, includes language about rendering medical aid. Where officers are required to render medical aid pursuant to policy, it is a good idea to make sure their duty to do so is qualified with language like "pursuant to their training" or "within the limits of their training."

b. See, e.g., New Orleans Police Department: "Immediately following a use of force, officers and supervisors shall inspect and observe subjects for injury or complaints of pain. Officers shall obtain medical assistance for any person who exhibits signs of physical distress, has sustained visible injury, expresses a complaint of injury or continuing pain, or who was rendered unconscious. This may require officers to render emergency first aid within the limits of their individual skills, training and available equipment until professional medical are providers arrive on the scene. Any individual exhibiting signs of physical distress after an encounter should be continuously monitored by the officer involved in the incident or an on-scene assisting officer until medical personnel can assess the individual. NOPD officers shall request medical assistance without delay when a subject has visible injuries or the subject complains of injury."

What is required? Do officers need to actually provide medical assistance or just make a request for (i.e. call ambulance)?

Answer: The circuits are split on this issue.

- Some courts have categorically held that when officers promptly request medical assistance...the Constitution requires them to do no more. See, e.g., Stevens-Rucker v. Frenz, 739 Fed. Appx. 834 (6th Cir. 2018) and Maddox v. City of Los Angeles, 792 F.2d 1408 (9th Cir. 1986).
- In contrast, other courts have held that "summon[ing] rescue" is insufficient by itself to defeat a deliberate indifference claim and that there are times when the Fourteenth Amendment obligates an officer to intervene personally. See, e.g., Walton v. Gomez, 745 F.3d 4O5 (IOth Cir. 2O14) and, McRaven v. Sandersir, 577 F.3d 974 (8th Cir. 2OO9).

E. Technology Issues

Recent legislative measures across the United States have sparked critical discussions about balancing police accountability, citizens' rights, and the influence of technology on law enforcement, These issues raise important questions about how to protect police officers in a world shaped by smartphones. Below are examples.

1. Florida, SB 184: The Halo Bill

On April 12, 2O24, Florida Governor Ron DeSantis signed the Impeding, Threatening, or Harassing First Responders bill (the "Bill") which went into effect as of January I, 2O25. The Bill makes it punishable, "after receiving a verbal warning not to approach from a person he or she knows or reasonably should know is a first responder, who is engaged in the lawful performance of a legal duty, to knowingly and willfully violate such warning and approach or remain within 25 feet of the first responder."

To violate the Bill, there must be intent to impede or interfere with the first responder's ability to perform their duty; to threaten the first responder with physical harm; or to harass the first responder. "Harass" is defined as an action directed at a first responder that "intentionally causes substantial emotional distress in that first responder and serves no legitimate purpose." Violation of the Bill can lead to a misdemeanor in the second degree which can carry either a \$500 fine under \$8,775.083(1)(e), or 60 days imprisonment under \$8,775.082(4)(b).

Who is Covered? The Bill covers most all emergency personnel. Specifically, it covers:

• Law Enforcement Officers: any person who is elected, appointed, or employed full time by any municipality or the state or any political subdivision thereof; who is vested with authority to bear arms and make arrests; and whose primary responsibility is the prevention and detection of crime or the enforcement of the penal, criminal, traffic, or highway laws of the state. The term includes all certified supervisory and command personnel whose duties include, in whole or in part, the supervision, training, guidance, and management responsibilities of full-time law enforcement officers, part-time law enforcement officers, or auxiliary law enforcement officers but does not include support personnel employed by the employing agency.

- Correctional Probation Officer: a person who is employed full time by the state whose primary responsibility is the supervised custody, surveillance, and control of assigned inmates, probationers, parolees, or community controllees within institutions of the Department of Corrections or within the community. The term includes supervisory personnel whose duties include, in whole or in part, the supervision, training, and guidance of correctional probation officers, but excludes management and administrative personnel above, but not including, the probation and parole regional administer level.
- Emergency Medical Provider: a person who authorized to provide care such as ambulance drivers, hospital physicians, employees, agents, and volunteers.

2. Louisiana, HB 173

Louisiana HB 173 was signed on May 24, 2024 and went into effect on August 1, 2024, It is similar to Florida's Halo Bill. HB 173 provides that any person who fails to stay at least 25 feet away from a law enforcement officer after being told to stay away could face up to 60 days in prison, or a \$500 fine. HB 173 does provide an affirmative defense within its language which allows for a defendant to claim they failed to understand the command, the command was not capable of being received under the circumstances, and that conditions at the time of issuance by the officer restricted the person's ability to abide by the order.

3. Arizona, HB 2319

The "8 foot law" was a proposed Arizona law that would have made it illegal to record police activity within eight feet of an officer. A U.S. District Court judge granted a preliminary injunction enjoining the enforcement of HB 2319. Approximately a year later, the District Court Judge ruled that the law was unconstitutional and imposed a permanent injunction pursuant to a settlement. The federal judge stated that it chills protected First Amendment activity and is unnecessary given existing laws.

4. Indiana's "Buffer Zone"

The Indiana law, that went into effect last July, prohibits knowingly approaching within 25 feet of an officer after being ordered to stop.

A federal judge ruled in favor of a 25-foot "buffer zone," On January 9, 2024, U.S. District Court Judge Damon Leichty of the Northern District of Indiana ruled against the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) of Indiana, who argued that the state's law violated the constitutional rights of citizen-journalists to observe and record police activity. He wrote, "Indiana's buffer law has many constitutional applications within its plainly legitimate sweep. It never once permits an officer to tell a reporter or citizen-journalist to leave altogether or to cease recording police activity." The judge further noted, "And at 25 feet, in measure small steps from an officer's work, this law has only an incidental effect on the public's First Amendment right to capture audio and video and otherwise scrutinize police.

5. Nebraska, Legislative Bill 1185

This proposed bill introduced in March 2O24 faced significant backlash. Legislative Bill 1185 would make it a misdemeanor, punishable by up to a year in jail, to record an officer within IO feet while they are actively engaged in their duties. This was introduced as a product of conversations with law enforcement officers across the state who are saying that they are being constantly harassed during encounters. However, critics argue that courts have been clear: people have a right to observe and record police while they are on duty. Thus, they argue that such legislation infringes on their constitutional rights.

Report of Government and Media Affairs James O. Pasco, Jr.

We are nearly five months into the First Session of the 119th Congress. While there are still some key vacancies to be filled, most of President Trump's Cabinet and Subcabinet nominees have been confirmed by the Senate.

Congress, for the most part, has been focused on adopting a unified budget resolution which will allow both the House and Senate to draft and adopt a reconciliation bill—the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act"—which passed on a 215-214 vote just before the Memorial Day recess.

The FOP and our counterparts at the International Association of Fire Fighters (IAFF) sent a joint letter to the House Committee on Ways and Means urging them to address the following issues:

- Law enforcement officers and fire fighters are often denied full overtime wages for their hours due to the
 mandates of Section 7(k) of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), which require fire fighters to work 54 hours
 per week and law enforcement officers to work 43 hours per week before being eligible for overtime wages.
 We support the President's call for income taxes to be waived on overtime earnings and urged the provision
 be included in the final bill without any limitations tied to any artificial cap on these earnings.
- The FOP and IAFF also urged the Committee on Ways and Means to eliminate or significantly increase the income tax deductions on State and local taxes (SALT).
- We also urged the Committee to include the President's proposal to waive income taxes on Social Security earnings for public safety officers.

The FOP similarly engaged with the Committee on Oversight and Government Reform to exempt all Federal law enforcement officers from any and all pension cuts that will be under consideration as part of the reconciliation process. We raised our strong concerns that any pension cuts would lead to mass retirements at a time when law enforcement agencies across the country are struggling to recruit, hire, and retain officers. These include Federal agencies in the U.S. Departments of Justice and Homeland Security. Many agencies, like the U.S. Capitol Police and U.S. Secret Service, are requiring officers to work excessive amounts of forced overtime, which negatively impacts officer morale, officer mental health, and mission readiness.

One of the proposals considered would result in a pay cut of 3.6% by requiring more senior officers to make higher contributions from their wages to the Federal Employee Retirement System (FERS). In addition, their retirement calculations would change, costing some officers tens of thousands in retirement income. The National FOP has called on the committee and the House to exempt Federal law enforcement officers from these pension cuts. Of the 2.4 million non-postal Federal employees affected, only 137,000 are Federal law enforcement officers. Many law enforcement officers have a mandatory retirement age of 57. Unlike other Federal employees who could offset these retirement losses by working longer, Federal law enforcement officers who deserve the retirement benefits they earned will not have this option.

The version of the bill that was favorably reported by the House Budget Committee did not include any changes to FERS for Federal law enforcement officers, which includes the FERS annuity supplement. A newer draft expands the exemption for Federal employees who are required to retire early, such as Federal law enforcement officers, to cover all such employees, regardless of whether they are forced out because they hit the mandatory retirement age. The implementation date, previously set on the date of the bill's enactment, has been shifted to I January, 2028, and language now exists clarifying that Federal employees may maintain eligibility for the supplement provided they are "entitled" to it prior to 2028. The latest draft also delays the change in Federal retirees' annuity calculations from the high-3 to high-5 average salary model by one year, to I January 2028.

With respect to budgets, the FOP is also urging the House to act on S. 1077, the "District of Columbia Local Funds Act," which passed the Senate by unanimous consent in March. When the President signed H.R. 1968, the "Full-Year Continuing Appropriations and Extension Act" into law, Senate lawmakers recognized that the language exempting the District of Columbia's budget was inadvertently left out of the bill. The "District of Columbia Local Funds Act" corrects the error. Without swift action by the House on this bill, the District of Columbia will be forced to make steep cuts across the board—including to the budget for the Washington, D.C. Metropolitan Police Department (MPD). This forced the Mayor of the District of Columbia, Muriel E. Bowser, to issue an order immediately freezing spending and hiring. The mayor's order also instructs the city administrator to begin planning for furloughs of D.C. government workers and the closures of some D.C. government facilities. Agencies including police, fire, and the District's 9II call center could face staffing cuts and facility closures. This bill is critical to preserving the ability of MPD to protect the residents and visitors of the District of Columbia.

President Trump has called on House leaders to bring S. 1077 to the House floor and pass it immediately, but so far the House has failed to act. The National FOP is working with the Labor Committee for the Washington, D.C. Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) on this issue.

The remainder of our report is organized into five Sections, beginning with a status update on our top legislative priorities. **Section II** provides the status of President Trump's most recent Executive Orders and **Section III** provides a status update on FOP-supported legislation, as well as bills we oppose, which are under active consideration or pending in Congress. **Section IV** provides a list of legislation on which the FOP has already taken a position as of 21 May. **Section V** provides information on the importance of the National FOP Political Action Committee as well as our grassroots and social media outreach.

SECTION I: UPDATE ON TOP LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES IN THE 119TH CONGRESS

COLLECTIVE BARGAINING LEGISLATION

119th Congress: H.R. 1505/5. 636, the "Public Safety Employer-Employee Cooperation Act" **118th Congress**: H.R. 3539, the "Public Safety Employer-Employee Cooperation Act"

The FOP worked with Representatives Peter A. Stauber (R-MN) and Nicole J. Budzinski (D-IL) to re-introduce H.R. 15O5, the "Public Safety Employer-Employee Cooperation Act." We did not have a Senate companion for this legislation in the previous Congress, but this year Senator John W. Hickenlooper, Jr. (D-CO) introduced the Senate companion bill as S. 636.

The bill is a top legislative priority for the FOP and our partners at the International Association of Fire Fighters (IAFF) and would recognize the right of public safety officers to collectively bargain over hours, wages, and working conditions.

In the upcoming months, the FOP will reach out to all previous cosponsors of the bill from the 118th Congress.

LEGISLATION EXPANDING FEDERAL LAW ENFORCEMENT RETIREMENT BENEFITS

119th Congress: H.R. 3226, the "Law Enforcement Officers Equity Act" 118th Congress: H.R. 1322/S. 1658, the "Law Enforcement Officers Equity Act"

This legislation would expand the definition of "law enforcement officer" with respect to retirement benefits to include all GS-OO83 officers—which will benefit the nearly 30,000 Federal law enforcement officers who are not currently eligible for this benefit. This would provide these officers with 6(c) retirement benefits and the ability to retire after 20 years of service at the age of 50, or after 25 years of service at any age.

We worked with Representatives Andrew R. Garbarino (R-NY), Gerald E. Connolly (D-VA), and Brian K. Fitzpatrick (R-PA) to re-introduce the bill.

We are working with Senator Cory A. Booker (D-NJ) to find a Republican lead for Senate companion bill, as Senator J.D. Vance (R-OH) left the Senate after being elected Vice President of the United States.

SECTION II: UPDATE ON EXECUTIVE ORDERS

In March, President Trump issued an Executive Order (EO) entitled "Exclusions From Federal Labor-Management Relations Programs." The bill ends collective bargaining rights for most Federal employees involved in "intelligence, counterintelligence, investigative, or national security work." The EO does preserve collective bargaining rights for "agency police officers, security quards, and firefighters."

Also in March, President Trump issued an Executive Order entitled "Continuing the Reduction of the Federal Bureaucracy." Section 2(a)(i) of the EO has effectively dismantled the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service (FMCS), which has provided vital services to labor relations and has been especially valuable to law enforcement labor organizations like the Fraternal Order of Police. The FOP has written President Trump asking that he reconsider the EO's implementation with respect to the FMCS, and the FOP is engaged with the Administration on this issue.

The FOP is also in a dialogue with White House officials about our concerns with the recent reductions in force at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, specifically within the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), which, among other responsibilities, certifies first responders eligible for health care through the World Trade Center Health Program. The White House staff assured the FOP that they will work with us to ameliorate the impact of the reduction in force and to ensure that 9/11 responders receive the highest quality of care.

Deputy U.S. Attorney General Todd W. Blanche issued a memo entitled "Soliciting Feedback for Agency Reorganization Plan and RIF" which solicited feedback from Departmental components about concerns and proposals with respect to Section 3(c) and 3(e) of the Executive Order 1421O, "Implementing The President's 'Department of Government Efficiency' Workforce Optimization Initiative."

The FOP <u>wrote</u> to the Deputy Attorney General about our concerns that the proposal could result in the termination of the independence of the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS), making this vital component of our national policing strategy into just another grant making program under the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA).

We urged the Justice Department to maintain the independence of the COPS program and to consult with the FOP before embarking on any major changes to the structure, agencies, or programs to the Department.

In early May, the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of California placed a <u>temporary restraining order</u> on Executive Order 1421O, which prohibits the Administration from broad Federal workforce reductions.

More recently, President Trump signed an Executive Order entitled "Strengthening and Unleashing America's Law Enforcement to Pursue Criminals and Protect Innocent Citizens" which includes a provision in Section 3(a)(v) that reads: "seek enhanced sentences for crimes against law enforcement officers." The FOP shares the President's strong views on this issue. We condemn violence targeting law enforcement officers and call on Congress to enact the "Protect and Serve Act."

President Trump also signed an Executive Order entitled "Protecting American Communities from Criminal Aliens" which includes a provision to cut Federal funding from sanctuary cities that do not comply with new immigration

policies.

The FOP continues to work collaboratively with the President and all components of his Administration on these issues.

SECTION III: UPDATE ON ACTIVE OR PENDING LEGISLATION

The "LEOSA Reform Act"

In mid-May, **H.R. 2243**, the "LEOSA Reform Act," was considered and passed by the U.S. House of Representatives last month on a 229-193 vote. The bill, which was introduced by Representatives Donald J. Bacon (R-NE) and Henry Cuellar (D-TX), will now go to the Senate for further consideration. Our Washington D.C. staff has been engaged with the Senate Committee on the Judiciary about moving forward on this legislation.

Currently, the Law Enforcement Officers Safety Act (LEOSA) exempts qualified active and retired law enforcement officers from local and State prohibitions on the carriage of concealed firearms. This legislation amends existing law to ensure that officers can carry in the same venues as civilian concealed carry permit holders. The bill also extends the exemption to magazine capacity and would allow active and retired law enforcement officers to access services in U.S. Post Offices, Social Security Administration offices, Veterans Affairs offices, and other Federal facilities without disarming or securing their firearms elsewhere. It would also allow the States to decide to extend the period between training certifications for qualified retired law enforcement officers from 12 months to 36 months.

The "LEOSA Reform Act" would not increase the number of officers who carry firearms under the current LEOSA statute. It does, however, remove conflict and confusion from current State and Federal laws while closing existing loopholes to prevent any officer from inadvertently putting themselves in legal jeopardy.

The Senate companion bill, S. 679, was introduced by Senator John N. Kennedy (R-LA) and has eight cosponsors.

The "Protect and Serve Act"

The National Legislative staff continues our advocacy campaign. We've had numerous in-person meetings with key House Judiciary Committee staff to build support for this bill. We have also reached out to Representatives who cosponsored the bill in the previous Congress. Our cosponsorship total in the House is currently at 61.

The FOP worked with Representative John H. Rutherford's staff to revise the bill language which we believe has improved the bill and will help us grow support for it. The legislation creates a new Federal offense for anyone who "willingly" assaults a law enforcement officer and would sentence such an offender to a term of imprisonment of IO years or for life in the case of murder or attempted murder. In order for Federal charges to be brought, the State must ask the Federal government to assume jurisdiction, or the U.S. Attorney General must certify that a Federal prosecution is "in the public interest and necessary to secure substantial justice." To make this certification, the U.S. Attorney General must consider the extent of planning and premeditation, the intended outcome, and a disregard for human life. These are very specific and narrow circumstances that were designed to respond to incidents like the assassination of two officers in New York City in 2014 and the mass murders of officers in Dallas and Baton Rouge in 2016.

In the Senate, our D.C. staff met jointly with staff in the offices of Representative Rutherford and Senator Thomas R. Tillis (R-NC), the sponsor of S. 167, the companion bill, and agreed that the revised language will be incorporated into the Senate bill as it moves through the legislative process.

As of the end of April, there have been 21 ambush-style attacks on law enforcement officers in which 21 officers were shot and five of whom were killed.

We urge all FOP members to contact their Representative and Senators and ask them to support this legislation!

The "Honoring Our Fallen Heroes Act"

Representatives Mary Gay Scanlon (D-PA) and Carlos A. Giménez (R-FL) re-introduced H.R. 1269, the "Honoring Our Fallen Heroes Act." The Senate companion bill was introduced by Senators Amy J. Klobuchar (D-MN) Kevin J. Cramer (R-ND) as S. 237.

The legislation would categorize duty-related cancer fatalities as a line of duty death under the Public Safety Officers' Benefits (PSOB) program. Law enforcement and other public safety officers are routinely required to enter or operate in potentially hazardous environments. Those who are exposed to known carcinogens and who are subsequently diagnosed with cancers related to that exposure will be considered to have sustained a personal injury in the line of duty for the PSOB program if the cancer causes their death or disability under this bill.

The Senate Judiciary Committee considered and favorably reported this legislation by voice vote in May.

The "Protecting Taxpayers' Wallets Act and the "Paycheck Protection Act"

The House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform considered, amended, and favorably reported H.R. 1210, the "Protecting Taxpayers' Wallets Act," to the House floor on a 23-21 vote.

The legislation is blatantly anti-union and the FOP <u>strongly opposes</u> it. The legislation takes the extraordinary step of requiring Executive branch agencies to charge labor unions representing agency employees a quarterly fee for their use of agency resources. It would make that fee based on the value of the time a union representative spends on official union business and the value of agency resources provided to the union while employed by the agency and on duty. The determination of such a fee could not be considered as an unfair labor practice or be subject to collective bargaining. The FOP will continue to oppose this legislation on the House floor.

The committee also considered and favorably reported H.R. 2249, the "Preserving Presidential Management Authority Act," on a 23-21 vote. The bill would allow an incoming president, but not incumbents, to terminate any collective bargaining agreement provision entered into by employees of a Federal agency that is in force and effect on the date such president is sworn into office. It also provides that any language in such an agreement that conflicts with a rule, Executive Order, presidential memorandum or any other presidential order, as determined by the president or the head of an agency, would not be enforceable. The FOP strongly opposes this legislation.

Finally, the committee considered and favorably reported H.R. 2174, the "Paycheck Protection Act," on a 23-21 vote. This is another anti-union bill that would prohibit union members from paying their dues automatically from their paychecks—a standard practice at every level of public employment. This would place an unnecessary burden on union members who receive services based on their payment of dues. The FOP strongly opposes the bill and will continue to fight against its passage on the House floor.

- H.R. 993 (Correa, D-CA) the "Directing Resources for Officers Navigating Emergencies (DRONE) Act," which would allow law enforcement agencies to use Edward R. Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (Byrne-JAG) funds to help purchase and operate unmanned aircraft systems;

- **S. 1300** (Cornyn, R-TX) the "Project Safe Neighborhoods Grant Program Authorization Act," which would reauthorize critical funding and support for local law enforcement agencies and community organizations that help reduce violent crime and enhance public safety;
- **CLEARED COMMITTEE S. 1316** (Peters, D-MI) the "Strong Communities Act," which would establish a grant program for local law enforcement agencies to assist in recruiting officers from their own community;
- **5. 1333** (Cornyn, R-TX) the "Strengthening Child Exploitation Enforcement Act," which would close loopholes in Federal child abuse criminal statutes;
- **5. 1401** (Kennedy, R-LA) the "Targeting Child Predators Act," which would extend the time law enforcement can seek a court order to delay a subpoena notification from 90 to 180 days;
- **5. 1409** (Cornyn, R-TX) the "Public Safety Officer Concussions and Traumatic Brain Injury Health Act," which would establish concussion protocols for law enforcement agencies;
- CLEARED COMMITTEE 5.1563 (Klobuchar, D-MN) "Retired Law Enforcement Officers Continuing Service
 Act," which would establish a grant program to support State and local agencies in leveraging the expertise
 of retired officers for tasks like assisting with investigations, forensic analysis, and reviewing camera footage;
 and
- **CLEARED COMMITTEE S. 1595** (Cornyn, R-TX) the "Improving Police Critical Aid for Responding to Emergencies (CARE) Act," which would expand the existing U.S. Department of Justice's Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (Byrne-JAG) program to allow for the purchase of trauma kits.

Report of the Officer Wellness Division Sherri Martin, Director

It's great to be together again with all the delegates in Miami Beach attending the National Conference! It is my pleasure to report the work and achievements of the National Officer Wellness Committee and the FOP Division of Wellness Services. We have made tremendous strides since we were last all together in Las Vegas two years ago. Last year was an especially rewarding one for our committee as we saw several of our projects grow and flourish, and we have started 2025 off running full speed ahead, always expanding and adding new programming and fresh ideas!

Power In Peers, our curriculum in law enforcement peer support, created by the FOP in cooperation with the COPS Office of the US Department of Justice, was finalized in early 2024 and we have been teaching all over the United States, training trainers in this brand-new curriculum! Three plus years of work went into the careful crafting of this 5-day course, suitable for both active and retired members, law enforcement civilian support staff, chaplains, and mental health professionals. The course was piloted in late 2023 and early 2024, and the COPS Office was so pleased with the course that the third pilot normally required was waived. With the benefit of grant funding provided by the COPS Office, the FOP has been able to carry the course to eight states so far (as of this writing), and we have a goal to hold at least one Train-the-Trainer session in each state, giving us the ability to spread this training throughout the law enforcement profession. Each session has students representing various agencies who are trained in the curriculum and will be able to carry it back to their agencies or regions as trainers. In fact, we have already had several trainers leading classes at the basic level, providing officers with their very first training in peer support. As we know that the demand for peer support is higher than ever, as we know that it is a resource that officers trust, we aim to ensure that every corner of the US has trained law enforcement peer support available for officers.

As students pass the Power In Peers course and become certified Supporting Peer Mentors, they join a network of other trained SPMs. With this course, we are building a nationwide network of trained peer supporters that will spread the reach of this training. Our goal is to build the Call on Peers network, which we hope will become a tangible resource where officers in need of support can connect with a trained peer in the next agency or clear across the country. The nationwide reach of the FOP will propel the development of this project. The Power In Peers course not only bears the FOP name but will also provide a nationally certified and standardized training program approved by IADLEST and POST. We look forward to training Supporting Peer Mentors around the country and building a network of support that will save careers and lives!

In conversations about officer wellness, the importance of including law enforcement families continues to be an increasing focus. We recognize that families are officers' biggest concern as well as officers' strongest source of support, and we, along with other leading organizations in the profession,

are making moves to do more to include law enforcement families in our wellness efforts and initiatives. As we previously reported, the National Fraternal of Police has been awarded federal grant funding to do just that. With our Blue Family Focus program, we are creating a wellness training course for law enforcement family members. Designed as a companion to Power In Peers, the Blue Family Focus curriculum will provide family members with the tools to support their officer and to manage stress that may impact the law enforcement family. In addition, another aim of the course will be to teach law enforcement families to provide peer support to other law enforcement families, further strengthening the web of support around our larger law enforcement family. We have assembled an advisory panel of subject matter experts, including representatives from our National Auxiliary, and have begun development of this course, which we hope to deliver toward the end of 2025.

We continue to add providers and programs to the FOP Approved Provider Bulletin, our nationwide directory of vetted wellness services. Within the first year of the site's launch, our committee interviewed dozens of clinicians and programs, and this process continues with new providers and programs constantly coming our way to be vetted. We receive new applications each week and will not rest until we fill the map. The APB allows members to search for competent resources and connect on their own, without anyone else being involved. Our FOP Wellness Provider Vetting Guide has been shared with police agencies working to build their own wellness programs, and we have directed various wellness providers to it as they work to build their programs to meet our needs and expectations. Our vetting process remains the most stringent and thorough that we have seen. Being identified as an FOP Vetted & Approved Wellness Provider has become a mark of excellence, and we are proud to have created a dynamic in which practitioners are striving to provide the best services to the men and women of law enforcement. The site, our vetting process, and our Wellness Provider Vetting Guide have been highlighted by other police groups as we lead the way in this effort. This program has truly become a flagship program, an effort not replicated by any other organization, and we are the profession leader in vetting wellness services and programs for law enforcement.

In February, we hosted the sixth annual FOP Wellness Summit and fifth annual Wellness Professionals' Forum in Nashville, Tennessee. The National Officer Wellness Committee work hard to put together an interesting program each year and we are excited about response to the events from attendees. These training events focus on various aspects of officer wellness and present the most current information and research in the field. Since our first Summit in 2020, attendance has continuously grown each year, and this year was no exception! The number of attendees has nearly tripled since we began the program, which is a testament to the hard work put in by the committee to create a quality training event! We provide a robust agenda filled with presenters known internationally in the field of officer wellness, and attendees are able to choose from a range of seminars providing current information on various aspects of wellness. We add unique events that provide extra opportunities to discuss, learn, and experience new topics. We have included families too, as we implemented a spouse rate for the events this year. Interest in our FOP Wellness Professionals' Forum continues to grow with the expansion of our network of Vetted & Approved providers as well. My heartfelt thanks to the members of the National Officer Wellness Committee who work diligently each year to make these events a success.

Our FOP Biennial Critical Issues in Policing Survey series has become another cornerstone of our efforts in officer wellness and has drawn much attention both within and from outside of the profession. Our ability to draw over six thousand responses from our brothers and sisters around the country with each survey is simply unmatched and is the envy of researchers in academia. Many thanks to those of you who participated and encouraged your members to have their voice heard! These surveys allow us to compile vital information about the current state of law enforcement, and to report factual data about the experiences and views of police officers. Alongside our research partner, Dr. Jacqueline Drew of Griffith University, we have continuously over the past two years reported the findings of the 2023 survey at various conferences, as well as through written publications. We have recently completed the full report of the 2023 survey, which provides an overview of the most significant findings. The 2023 iteration of the Biennial Critical Issues in Policing Survey Series provided us with vital information about the state of law enforcement mental health, but also about issues affecting recruitment and retention in our agencies. Here in Miami, we are launching the 2025 Biennial Critical Issues in Policing Survey. We encourage and humbly ask every member to participate and to have your voice be heard! The survey can be completed anonymously and is open to active and retired members of law enforcement. It is vital that we hear every voice!

Based on the findings of our surveys, which we began in 2019 and then established through practice beginning in 2021, we have published academic papers, journal and magazine articles, a book chapter, as well as podcasts and webinars, all aimed at making sure that the truth is told about the experiences of our officers. The full reports of the findings of the surveys can be found at www.fop.net. Since 2019, we have shared our findings with the field, appearing at conferences of police officers and police scholars to share the voices of the men and women doing

the work. We have also been able to provide statistics and data to support efforts to improve wellness programs around the country. Our goals have been not only to identify sources of stress for law enforcement, but to demonstrate the connections between recent social climates and the wellbeing of officers, their motivation, and their morale. We continue to identify the resources that work best for our officers to ensure that we provide effective support, always looking for areas where we can do even better. With this survey research, we are the leading voice in officer wellness and the only organization that can speak for rank-and-file officers about what is affecting us and which resources we need to stay well.

As always, the members of the National Officer Wellness Committee and I express heartfelt gratitude to the National Board for continued support of our efforts, and we also thank all the members of the FOP for allowing us to care for you! Our committee takes immense pride in our work, as we constantly aim to expand and improve the suite of wellness products and programs we have built for our members. We look forward to achieving new goals in the coming years and to continuing to ensure that wellness remains part of our national dialogue. There is still so much to do, and we remain enthusiastic and committed!

We continue to receive daily inquiries from around the country seeking services for members. We are happy to be able to provide resources for our brothers and sisters, and we welcome these calls. We have condensed all of our most popular training events into one concise week and added some additional events to meet the emerging needs of our organization. With a tournament bowling plaza on site, along with a 16-screen Movie Theater Complex and eleven on-site restaurants, the South Point is clearly a family-oriented venue.

Apprenticeship Program

We still have the basic outline of an Apprenticeship Program in our arsenal of resources. Most recently we were approached by the Law and Public Safety Education Network, a not-for-profit 5OI(c)(3) that is basically a consortium of state career and technical agencies that operate under the State Departments of Education. They have networked with many of the same organizations that we have in our quest to address our recruitment and retention dilemma. Our goal is to form a partnership where we can enhance each other's youth educational initiatives. We are still in the



exploratory stages of this partnership and hope to have something tangible in early 2026. LAPSEN has a booth in the expo, pay them a visit to see all they have to offer.

Next Generation 911 (NG9-1-1)


We continue to work with other professional public safety organizations to implement next Generation 9-I-I interoperability. Most of our emergency communications centers are severely susceptible to cyber-attacks. Interfaces to advanced technologies that we all enjoy on our mobile devices are practically non-existent in our 9II centers. Delivery of critical information to officers working the field is nowhere where it should be. We have estimated that we will need in excess of fifteen billion dollars to address the current needs of our 9II centers.



Our partners in this endeavor are the International Association of Chief of Police, Major Cities Chiefs, National Sheriffs Association, International Association of Fire Chiefs, National Association of State EMS Officials, Metropolitan Fire Chiefs Association, National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives and the International Association of Public-Safety Communications Officials (APCO).

4.9 GHz

The FOP was successful in gaining support from the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to allocate this bandwidth (494O-499O MHz) to FirstNet. In October 2O24, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted a new framework establishing a nationwide Band Manager for the 4.9 GHz band. This Band Manager will coordinate spectrum usage, optimize public safety operations, and facilitate the integration of advanced technologies, including 5G. The Band Manager is authorized to enter into a sharing



agreement with the First Responder Network Authority (FirstNet), allowing FirstNet to access unassigned portions of the 4.9 GHz band for its nationwide public safety broadband network, provided incumbent operations are protected.

FirstNet

The FirstNet Authority was established in light of September II, 2001, to create a single, nationwide broadband network specifically for first responders. The tragedies of September II revealed fundamental problems with communication systems used by our nation's first responders. The FirstNet Authority's mission, as mandated by Congress, is to oversee



the buildout, deployment, and operation of the nationwide public safety broadband network called FirstNet. There is a potential sunsetting of funding for First Net in 2O27 and therefore we are monitoring developments in this area.

CRI-TAC

For the last eight years the FOP has been an active participant in the Collaborative Reform Initiative – Technical Assistance Center (CRI-TAC). Based on a "By the field – for the field" concept we have been able to serve over two thousand law enforcement agencies nationwide. CRI-TAC offers customized training and consultation for just about any challenge a law enforcement organization may face. From best practices on data collection and analysis to active shooter training, CRI-TAC has a solution. This program is a COPS Office initiative funded through the Department of Justice. Application for assistance is simple, and all services delivered are free. Visit https://cops.usdoj.gov/cri-tac for more information or personally contact Keith Turney for assistance.

Rather as titled, it is a blueprint of recommendations to guide an organizer towards best practices in the establishment of a training event, whether it be a one-time stand-alone event, or a repetitive training occurrence. This document is not all encompassing as there are nuances to every event that cannot be planned for or anticipated. Members at all levels of the organization are encouraged to utilize this document to ensure that everyone from creator to organizer to staff member has a common understanding of terms, expectations, and time lines as they relate to a successful event.

- Only active FOP members currently working in law enforcement or retired from law enforcement shall be considered for this award. Retired law enforcement officers are to be considered as active members.
- All applications must be received by the committee chairperson no later than six weeks prior to the first day
 of the Board Meeting of National Conference.

The Kenneth Canterbury Excellence in Leadership Award will be awarded to the nominee who most displays the characteristics of an FOP Leader. This award will be presented at the Biennial Conference every odd year.

- The nominees must be submitted in legible typewritten form on FOP letterhead, giving all pertinent information as to why the members of your lodge feel the applicant should be considered for this prestigious award.
- All nominees must be submitted by a subordinate lodge in good standing. No individual member shall submit his or her name as a nominee for this award.
- Nominees should be considered on the basis of who most displays the characteristics of an FOP Leader.

Report of the Border Safety Committee

Brothers and Sisters,

What a difference an administration makes.

Last year I went with one of my committee members and active Border Patrol Agent, Brother Settles, to visit the border in Sasabe, Arizona. As we drove along the border fence it was obvious that construction had been halted, tons of materials were just sitting on the side of the road. As we got about 2 miles from the legal check point, we came to a spot where the border fence simply stopped. Imagine the difficulty to cross the border by simply walking an extra two miles where the fence no longer is in the way.



Pretending the border was not issue clearly did not work. U.S. Border Patrol had to close almost all checkpoints and stop nearly all patrol simply to handle the influx of people crossing the border. The stats for 2024 are shocking.

The House Committee on Homeland Security did a report that covers the insane difference between the two administrations. Instead of typing out the same report, follow this link here to see for yourself.

I can also share my own recent experiences with the border. Over the last month, I had to travel south. Once to Sierra Vista and then to Tubac. Both areas have checkpoints that have been closed for most of the last 4 years. In my recent travels, BOTH checkpoints were open and operating.

During Day on the Hill I met with Congressman Ciscomani. He has introduced 3 bills in Congress that address some glaring holes in border security. I discussed these bills with him and forwarded my report to National.

H.R. 35 - Agent Raul Gonzalez Safety Act

* This is his bill that we backed last session. It establishes crime levels for vehicles fleeing from Border Patrol or any law enforcement at the border. *

H.R. 263 - Transnational Criminal Organization Illicit Spotter Prevention and Elimination Act

This bill makes it a crime to interfere with any Border Patrol enforcement efforts to include destroying surveillance equipment.

H.R. 488 - To require the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Secretary of State to implement a strategy to combat the efforts of transnational criminal organizations to recruit individuals in the United States via social media platforms and other online services and assess their use of such platforms and services for illicit activities.

This bill makes the use of social media to recruit people for illegal border crimes and trafficking efforts.

It is my solemn hope that now that the proof of everything that we said exists, we can actually learn from it and continue the efforts to secure our border.

Report of the Conference Evaluation Committee

With this being a brand-new committee for the 2O23-2O25 years, we had a list of duties to try and accomplish:

1) To review the current procedures for conference locations (possibly allowing actual major cities to bid on the conference site with less work and responsibilities on local and state lodges). 2) To review and make recommendations that will offer greater financial and logistical bargaining options to the FOP prior to the selection/voting of the location. 3) To review and evaluate our current conference schedule and make recommendations on maximizing the sharing of information and enhancing the conference experience for all FOP members. 4) To review and evaluate the actual number of days for the conference as well as time management. 5) To do a deep dive into the actual criteria for hosting a national conference location which should also include working with the appointed site committee and making recommendations. 6) To come up with new and fresh ideas for the conference experience for all members yet continue to allow the members to have the final vote of the location.

I will also tell you that the National Executive Board was completely committed to this new committee and worked just as hard as we did to try to revamp the look, feel and overall experience in our Biennial Conference. In not giving away any secrets or possible surprises, I hope each of you see that each one of your National Executive Board members as well as the committee members have tried to make a difference and want to make the National Fraternal Order of Police Conferences, second to none from this point forward.

After several months of working with the committee, conducting several zoom meetings and taking advice from our national executive board members, three major changes were presented to the board of directors in Salt Lake City, Utah. One change in the first section of the Constitution and By-Laws and two in another. These changes were asked to be presented to our membership as Constitution and By-Law changes this coming August at our National Conference in Miami Beach, FL. Although we wanted all three presented as one change, your National Trustees requested they be separated out and voted on each one individually. Once we completed that task in Salt Lake City, only two passed unanimously to move to the membership and the third failed by a narrow vote. Below are the changes that we hope you will approve and make the changes in our Constitution and By-Laws:

(PRPOSED CHANGE APPROVED BY TRUSTEES TO BE PRESENTED TO MEMBERSHIP)

Change #1

Amendment to the BY-LAWS of the Fraternal Order of Police

Amendment #7

The proposed change to the National By-Laws is under Article 5, Organization, Section 4.B, Biennial Conference Site Review Committee.

The purpose of this National By-Laws change is to allow the Site Review Committee additional time to make actual site visits for all bidding locations, with said visits to take place during the time of year when the conference will be held.

CURRENTLY READS:

Section 4. Biennial Conference Site Review Committee

B. <u>Locations</u> bidding for the Biennial Conference site shall submit in writing to the National Secretary their intention no later than <u>October I</u> of the even year prior to the site selection. The committee shall review such proposed sites and shall report to the National Board of Trustees no later than the third required National Board Meeting. The National Board of Trustees may vote to remove a site from consideration should it fail to meet the established criteria.

TO READ:

Section 4. Biennial Conference Site Review Committee

B. <u>States/Cities</u> desiring <u>to have</u> the Biennial Conference site <u>held in their location</u> shall submit in writing to the National Secretary th<u>e benefits of their location</u> no later than <u>March I</u> of the even year prior to the site selection. The committee shall review such proposed sites and shall report to the National Board of Trustees no later than the third required National Board Meeting. The National Board of Trustees may vote to remove a site from consideration should it fail to meet the established criteria and <u>instruct the National Secretary to seek RFPs</u> from other locations.

(THIS WAS THE SECOND AMENDMENT THAT WAS PRESENTED HOWEVER, IT WAS SPLIT AND ONLY ONE SECTION WAS APPROVED TO BE SUBMITTED TO THE MEMBERSHIP)

Change #1

Amendment to the Constitution of the Fraternal Order of Police

The purpose of this National Constitution change is to allow the National Board of Trustees and National Office to host our National Conferences. This will take the burden from bidding states and allow them to focus on the conference events package.

Additionally, this amendment would allow the National Board of Trustees to implement a registration fee for all attendees to assist in offsetting the rising cost of hosting our national conferences.

The proposed change to the National Constitution is under Article 5, Organization, Section 2. Conference.

CURRENTLY READS:

Section 2. Conference. The National Fraternal Order of Police shall hold a Conference to be known as the Biennial Conference of the National Fraternal Order of Police.

A. The Conference shall be scheduled to commence no earlier than the first Sunday of July nor later than through the third week of October of each odd numbered year.

TO READ:

Section 2. Conference. The National Fraternal Order of Police shall hold a Conference to be known as the Biennial Conference of the National Fraternal Order of Police.

- A. The Conference shall be scheduled to commence no earlier than the first Sunday of July nor later than through the third week of October, unless a different date is approved by the National Board of Trustees, of each odd numbered year.
- 1. States/Cities desiring to be considered for selection shall follow the requirements as outlined in the By-laws, Article 5, Section 4.

(PRPOSED CHANGE APPROVED BY TRUSTEES TO BE PRESENTED TO MEMBERSHIP)

2. The National Board of Trustees may host the Biennial Conference under the direction of the National Executive Board and the National Office, beginning with the 2031 Biennial Conference of the National Fraternal Order of Police.

(THIS RECCOMMENDED CHANGE WAS NOT APPROVED BY THE TRUSTEES AND WILL NOT BE VOTED ON AT THIS CONFERENCE)

The National Board shall have the authority to implement a registration fee for all members/delegates attending the Biennial Conference of the National Fraternal Order of Police.

In closing, I want to touch briefly on the last item that we wanted to present to the membership for the Constitution and By-Law change was the ability for the National Board to be allowed to charge a registration fee for future National Conferences. In the history of the Fraternal Order of Police we have NEVER charged a registration fee and the cost to put on these conferences has gone up so much in the past few years that it's hard to keep up with the cost and put on such a great event. I know the National Board and National Office try their best to continue to present such a professional and informed conference, however the funds are running out. I hope that each of you go back to your respective lodges and begin the conversation of allowing the National Board to present a change to the Constitution and By-Laws to allow a fee in the future. At the bottom of this report and a few other locations at this year's conference will be a QR code. This QR code is there to ask each member to log onto the code and give us your thoughts as far as the registration fee as well as any other comments or suggestions for the improvements or improvements for the best National Police organization in the world. #FOPSTRONG.

On June 18, 2025, members of the FOP Conference Safety and Security Committee traveled to Miami Beach and toured the Miami Beach Conference center (MBCC). We met with the staff of the conference center, a Miami Beach PD liaison officer and a member of the local FOP Lodge.

Part of the process was to review the printed copy of the floor plan along with inspecting the doors that will be available to determine the number of door guards needed for efficient access and security.

We located and discussed areas of concern and received a commitment from all parties involved to supply all the resources necessary to secure these areas and provide a reasonable amount safety for our members.

Members of this committee will be on site every morning by O7OO to ensure that the safety procedures are in place. We will also be available to transition our speakers to the proper location to await their time on stage. We will work with the door guards to assist in any issues that may arise.

It should be noted that the MBCC is a designated government facility. No individual may be eligible to carry a weapon into the Miami Beach Convention Center (MBCC), with the exception of sworn law enforcement officers possessing full-time, active-duty status with a law enforcement agency that has jurisdiction within the City of Miami Beach, and who possesses the requisite certifications. The lessee, event contractors, exhibitors, and attendees must abide by Florida Statute 79O. Lessees of the space within MBCC reserve the right to inspect persons and property entering their leased space.

Welcome to the 67th Biennial National Conference of the Fraternal Order of Police. I would like to thank my Brothers and Sisters from the State of Florida for their hard work and efforts in hosting our National Conference.

The Committee members and I would especially like to express our sincere appreciation and thanks to Secretary Jimmy Holderfield and the National Lodge staff in Nashville for their continued support and assistance. We also extend a very special thank you to Angie Hoover for her assistance to our Committee during the past two years. And most recently, we welcome and offer our thanks to Teri Crone who has become our new National Office contact person.

Since the 2023 Biennial Conference in Las Vegas, the National Constitution and By-laws Committee members have worked hard to fulfill our duties and responsibilities to the National Lodge, the Committee, and the members of the Fraternal Order of Police. I would like to recognize and extend my personal thanks to the members of your Constitution and By-laws Committee for their conscientious and exemplary service. The Committee members are Mike Brunson of Florida, David Burks of Kentucky, Mark DellaVecchio of Pennsylvania, Marlin Humphrey of Georgia, Lynn Ideus of Arizona, Kevin (Bart) Simpson of Arkansas, Phil Tenerelli of Illinois, and Ron Ultz of Alabama.

During the past two years your committee members have responded to numerous inquiries and proposed amendments received from the National Office which were submitted by State Lodges. These inquiries and proposed amendments to individual State Lodge Constitutions and By-laws were reviewed and researched by the Committee, with recommendations being sent back either to the individual State Lodge or presented to the National Board of Directors during National Board of Directors meetings for their action.

The National Lodge Constitution and By-laws Committee takes the responsibility of safeguarding our most sacred National Lodge Constitution and By-laws very seriously. Amending our Constitution and By-laws is an extremely important exercise and should be approached with great care and thoughtful consideration. The Committee understands this and continues to strive to protect the sanctity of our longstanding Constitution and By-laws.

The Constitution and By-laws Committee received, from National Secretary Jimmy Holderfield, ten (IO) proposed amendments to the National Lodge Constitution and By-laws for consideration, review, and recommendation. During this 67th National Biennial Conference, each of these proposed amendments will be individually presented to the delegates for consideration and a vote will be taken to either Adopt or Reject each of the proposed amendments.

These ten (IO) proposed amendments are located within this Biennial Conference booklet. Seven (7) of these proposed amendments were submitted by the National Board of Trustees, and three (3) by the Chicago Lodge 7 (Chicago, Illinois). The National Lodge Constitution and By-laws Committee received and reviewed these proposed amendments for form, grammar, placement within the National Lodge Constitution and By-laws, substance, and conflicts.

After our meticulous and thorough review of the proposed amendments, it is the recommendation of the National Lodge Constitution and By-laws Committee to Adopt Amendments 1 thru 8, and to Reject Amendments 9 and 10.

The Committee's recommendation to Adopt signifies that the proposed amendment has satisfied the Constitution's requirements of form, grammar, placement within the National Lodge Constitution and By-laws, substance, and the lack of conflicts. Conversely, when the Committee's recommendation is to Reject, this signifies that one or more of these requirements has not been satisfied.

Report of the Correctional Officers Committee

Since our last National Conference in August 2023, the Correctional Officer Committee has continued to meet regularly via social media platforms. Our focus on correctional-related issues remains an essential part of our broader commitment to supporting all law enforcement officers, particularly those working within correctional facilities. Over the past two years, the Committee has been actively engaged in several critical areas affecting the correctional workforce.

One of our primary concerns has been officer wellness and safety. The Committee consistently advocates for the health, safety, and overall well-being of our correctional officers. In line with this commitment, the FOP supported S. 1295, the Bureau of Prisons Security Check and Action against Narcotics (BOP SCAN) in Mail Act, around April 2025. This legislation aims to limit the influx of illicit substances, including synthetic drugs and opioids, into correctional facilities and mandates the Bureau of Prisons to implement protective measures to safeguard staff. We have also supported broader mental health initiatives such as H.R. 2502, the Law Enforcement Training for Mental Health Crisis Response Act. Although not correction-specific, this legislation addresses mental health training that benefits all officers, including those in correctional settings who frequently encounter individuals experiencing mental health crises.

Staffing and retention continue to be a major concern across all sectors of law enforcement. The Correctional Officer Committee strongly advocates for adequate staffing and improved recruitment and retention. While not always detailed in a corrections-specific manner, legislation such as H.R. 3376, the Enhancing COPS Hiring Program Grants for Local Law Enforcement Act, directly supports these goals and could have a significant impact on correctional agencies.

The Committee has also highlighted the ongoing problem of assaults on Correctional Officers in jails and prisons across the country. These incidents continue to illustrate the dangerous conditions faced by those working behind the wall. We remain committed to identifying and addressing the gaps in resources, personnel, and safety measures that plague our nation's correctional institutions.

In addition to legislative and safety advocacy, the Correctional Officer Committee has taken an active role in providing professional development opportunities for our members. We were proud to offer educational breakout sessions at both the 2O24 and 2O25 Leadership Matters Seminars. These sessions were designed to share relevant updates, best practices, and support strategies for those in the correctional field. Furthermore, we are excited to announce a significant breakout session at this year's National Conference. Dr. Dominique Roe-Sepowitz of Arizona State University will present critical findings from her study on sex trafficking cases that have been built and solved from behind bars in the Las Vegas and Phoenix areas since 2O18. This important presentation will shed light on the vital role corrections can play in broader investigative efforts and law enforcement collaboration.

We would like to express our deep gratitude to the dedicated members of the Correctional Officer Committee for their hard work and continued service. Our committee includes Co-Chair Leslie Baxley of Arizona, Scot Ward of Illinois, Daniel Johnson of Kentucky, Randall Lowe of Arizona, David Cuevas of Texas, Giovanni Concepcion of Florida, and Eddie Hogan of New Mexico.

Report of the Disaster Area Response Team

Greetings Brothers and Sisters, I am excited to report to you in Miami Beach as to the great work your DART team has completed since its beginnings over six years ago.

Over the past six years, and with nine full disaster deployments to disaster areas throughout this nation, it is clear that disaster response is a great value and asset to our members and non-members alike throughout this country. From Tornado Alley to Hurricane Central, and major wildfires, we have discovered the critical need for our members to have assistance from the National FOP, a hot meal, fellowship, or help taking care of their homes while they are taking care of others is a need that is well defined as our mission after a disaster strikes. Many DART teams from around the country have performed amazing work as we have deployed in our areas. It has been and is our intent to work with the already established DART teams around the nation and help other states join the cause to help provide a great response in the event disaster strikes as one strong Fraternal Order.

Not too long after the August 2019 Conference in New Orleans, President Yoes contacted us with the news that he was forming a new committee for a National FOP Disaster Area Response Team or "DART", and he shared with us his vision of what this committee could accomplish. We spent some time talking about the sheer magnitude of the project and the need from our members across the country.

As the search began, we started looking for donors to help us finance this program. The New York Surgeons Lodge Member Emil Braun, who was placed on the committee, pledged the first \$10,000 to go toward a purchase and to maintain a DART program. President Yoes then started having conversations and contacted James Franzoni, an Associate Member in New York that is the CEO of U.S. Employee Benefits Services Group. James pledged \$75,000 and then hooked us up with AETNA that pledged another \$75,000. Soon the donors lined up and AT&T First Net gave us another \$75,000. With pledges of \$235.000 we started combing the country for the perfect trailer that we could find for cheap enough to have an operating budget but nice enough to meet our needs. The search had us looking at dozens and dozens of potential trailers, but none fit both those needs of cost/vs. function. The search continued until we found what we felt was the balance of a trailer that was functional but a blank slate for us to build on our plan of a large mobile command center and kitchen. The trailer is a 53' NASCAR style hauler with a large working area in the trailer and plenty of great storage up top for our various working supplies and dry storage. The trailer was retrofitted by Superior Trailer Solutions located near Charlotte North Carolina and it is a site to be seen. Please visit our area at the expo and tour this amazing vision that has become reality. The trailer was purchased for the price of \$65,000 out of New York. The retrofit of the trailer bringing it to ready status was roughly another 120,000. One of our major donors is UPS who has pledged an in-kind donation to transport the trailer to disasters anywhere in the country. This is a great donation because it takes the cost of having to purchase and maintain a tractor to pull the trailer where we need it. We recently partnered with Mission Square with a very generous donation that is keeping the FOP DART team up and running strong.

In our efforts to build this program we have received great support and suggestions from all over the country. One of the key functions of our mission is to also provide logistical remediation support to members who are stuck on shifts while their own homes may need debris removal and general reclamation. We continue to be supported with our partnership with Lowes Home Improvement out of North Carolina and they have agreed to donate three trailers that will be stored on the east coast, west coast, and southern coast. We have utilized these trailers on deployments and have a great crew of hard-working volunteers led by Jay King of Alabama. These guys and gals go out every day in the extreme heat and help put stability and hope into the officers who are working unbearable shifts stitching their communities back together. I cannot emphasize enough he great impact this service has on our brothers and sisters around the country.

Each of these trailers are equipped and ready for helping our members who are in need around the country. We will staff the trailers with FOP Volunteers around the areas affected or who will be able to come help out. We are working on putting a list together of volunteers and we will be getting a flip book out that describes what is expected from our volunteers and what they can expect from us. An exciting new feature that the National FOP is providing is an insurance policy for member volunteers in the event that an injury occurs. We found out the hard way that accidents can happen and medical bills can be very expensive. President Yoes and the National Board went to work and made sure that each member volunteer at our deployments is covered under a medical insurance policy to help cover any costs to the member if an accident occurs.

We continue to also be grateful for the trailers that we received from states wanting to help with this project. Utah donated a 26' enclosed trailer that is set up perfect to turn into a bunk house or for hauling supplies to the sights. Also, the Missouri FOP donated a large military quality diesel generator that will help us at our deployment sights so that power will never be an issue as well as a blow-up air-conditioned bunk house so members can sleep in comfort. Many states are joining the mission with trailers being maintained and developed in North Caroliana, Indiana, Florida, New York, New Jersey, Oklahoma, California and others across the nation. This mission is literally catching fire and making a real difference in the lives of our members affected by natural or manmade disaster in our country.



We continue to build on our vision to see this Disaster Area Response Team as a continued reality and many corporations and state lodges have assisted us in building our inventory at zero cost to the foundation or our fraternal order. IOO% of the money that has been spent was donated by the contributors I mentioned earlier.

One thing we can all agree on in this room is that the FOP is the greatest rank and file Police organization in the world. Now we can add to this mission and our members will know, that when disaster strikes, whether man made or by nature, HELP IS ON THE WAY.

The overwhelming response by you, the members across this great nation, has

THE MISSION & VISION OF THE NATIONAL FOP DISASTER AREA RESPONSE TEAM OR "DART"

DART MISSION STATEMENT

Provide a national disaster response providing equipment and resources for major natural and man-made disasters, where local first responders do not have adequate resources to provide basic life needs, including but not limited to food, water, peer support, and basic hygiene needs of first responders working within the affected disaster areas. To offer core services to those who are protecting and serving by offering support to their families and homes while they are forced to work long shifts.

THE MISSION OF DART

To deploy DART resources to the areas of major natural and man-made disasters to build partnerships with those communities to assist in preparing meals, providing services and to act in conjunction with the area incident command to make sure the basic needs of the first responders are met.

THE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES OF DART

Preparation for DART to be deployed to a particular disaster area.

To purchase and maintain an adequate space for operations in any situation.

Equipment and staff must be IOO% self-sufficient and require no outside assistance for housing from the disaster torn area.

Equipment should be sufficient to house and maintain the members running the operation.

Enough Committee or volunteer staff need to be named and be adequately trained to operate and maintain the readiness of the DART equipment so that disaster response can be immediate when called upon by the National FOP President.

To develop a core group of members to deploy with the DART trailer and set up members that can deploy locally to help run the operations of the equipment.

It is the intent to have this core group manage the actual deployment of the trailer while local and other volunteers come to help with tasks set forth by the onsite managers of the deployment.

COORDINATING EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND RECOVERY

Emergency Operations Center (EOC): During major events the EOC is the focal point for information coordination, resource requests, and decision making.

FOP DART will coordinate with the EOC for location and list of resources we are providing to help with the overall effort of the Disaster Response.

DART would train member volunteers in basic response skills including fire safety, equipment operation and maintenance, chain of command, and basic skills required to the tasks they are asked to help with.

To provide services to the homes and families of those affected by the disaster who are charged with working long shifts with their respective agencies. In short, to serve, those who are protecting and serving.

NATIONAL FOP DART FUNCTIONS AND ACTIVITIES

Work with national partners to properly fund and equip the DART team for a national response to natural or manmade disasters.

Respond to emergencies/disasters in the United States.

Develop, maintain, and coordinate Emergency Management plans.

Conduct/attend all-hazards training and exercises.

Coordinate all operations with the chain of command within the committee.

Develop teams of member volunteers who can help with affected homes and families of those who are victims of the devastation with remediation or clean-up crews to help in the rebuilding process.

children with special needs and assisting Easter Seals programs.

The Florida committee's community partnerships showcase the breadth of their outreach, from collaborating with Chick-fil-A on community initiatives to adopting a first-grade class at Jacksonville Beach Elementary School, where they provide essential school supplies. These efforts demonstrate how FOP diversity committees can serve as pillars of support within their communities, building trust and positive relationships through consistent, meaningful action.

Additionally, Miller and his committee members have taken on the solemn responsibility of attending parole hearings for inmates who killed law enforcement officers. Their advocacy resulted in all ten offenders being denied parole and receiving extended review periods from 2065 to 2108. This dual approach—combining community service with steadfast advocacy for fallen officers—exemplifies diversity committees' comprehensive role in building community bridges and honoring the law enforcement profession.

Roy Wilkins (MD) has emerged as a voice in diversity education. He conducted two comprehensive training presentations across multiple venues to advance the understanding and implementation of diversity and inclusion principles. His recent presentations at the **FOP Leadership Matters Training** in Nashville, Tennessee, and the **Pennsylvania State FOP Conference** demonstrate the impact and challenges of delivering diversity education within law enforcement organizations.

At the Leadership Matters Training in February 2025, Wilkins successfully engaged approximately 60 attendees from various state and local lodges, overcoming initial technical difficulties to deliver a highly interactive session. The overwhelmingly positive feedback from participants, with many expressing plans to implement the training concepts in their respective lodges, demonstrates the tangible impact of well-executed diversity education. His adaptability in addressing technical challenges while maintaining engagement exemplifies the professionalism required for effective training delivery.

Wilkins' experience at the Pennsylvania State Conference presents valuable lessons about the strategic importance of scheduling and promotion in diversity training. While initial attendance was limited due to competing "hot button" topics, his persistence and the support of PA State Lodge President Joe Reagan led to a more successful follow-up session with meaningful engagement from attendees, including FOP National and State Board members. His thoughtful recommendations for enhanced promotion, strategic scheduling, and interactive elements reflect a commitment to continuous improvement in diversity education delivery.

Through these comprehensive training efforts, Wilkins is building the educational foundation necessary for sustainable diversity progress throughout the FOP, ensuring that all members understand inclusive leadership principles and practical applications.

Brandon E. Walker (MO), a KC FOP Lodge #99 member, has demonstrated exceptional leadership in addressing systemic barriers that disproportionately affect diverse employees within law enforcement agencies. Recognizing that high childcare costs represent a critical retention challenge, particularly for single mothers in civilian roles such as communications, Walker partnered with Missouri State Senator Maggie Nurrenbern to secure \$3 million in state funding for a groundbreaking childcare assistance program.

This innovative tri-party partnership model requires the City of Kansas City to match the state contribution, creating a sustainable \$6 million program that addresses one of the most significant workforce retention challenges facing urban police departments. The initiative explicitly targets employees who demonstrate strong dedication to their roles but are forced to leave due to financial barriers rather than performance issues. By implementing an income-based contribution system, the program ensures equitable access while maintaining shared responsibility among all stakeholders.

The strategic impact of this initiative extends far beyond financial assistance. Walker's approach recognizes that true diversity and inclusion require addressing the structural barriers that prevent dedicated employees from remaining in law enforcement careers. The program's focus on communications division employees—often lower-paid civilian roles filled by women and minorities—demonstrates a sophisticated understanding of how economic factors can perpetuate workplace inequality.

Complementing this major initiative, Lodge #99 has implemented monthly fraternal meet-and-greet luncheons before general membership meetings on the first Monday of each month. These gatherings serve two purposes: improving fraternal engagement among existing members while recruiting potential members who may be uncertain about joining the FOP. Walker emphasizes that these luncheons create a "diverse atmosphere" where the lodge demonstrates its commitment to advocating for ALL members, regardless of their role or background within the department.

This comprehensive approach—combining structural financial support with ongoing community-building efforts—exemplifies the multifaceted strategy required for effective diversity and inclusion work. Walker's initiatives show how local lodges can catalyze policy innovation and cultural change, creating environments where all members can thrive professionally while building stronger, more inclusive law enforcement organizations.

Report of the Federal Officers Committee

Good afternoon, brothers and sisters.

My name is Jesse Van Orden. I've dedicated over 20 years to law enforcement, currently serving as a Police Captain in the Pocono Mountains of Pennsylvania and as President of Stroud Lodge #75 in Monroe County. It's an honor to address such a distinguished gathering of dedicated professionals.

I was drawn to the Federal Officers Committee nearly two years ago, recognizing the vital need to address the unique challenges facing our federal colleagues. Since then, I've had numerous meetings, calls, and emails with federal legislative officials from my area, advocating for solutions to the issues impacting law enforcement. I'm grateful to the national board for entrusting me with a role on this committee this past summer, and I plan to continue this path, working with the National FOP to resolve issues for my brothers and sisters. Our mission is clear: to amplify the voices of federal law enforcement, increase FOP membership within federal agencies, and advocate for policies that support and protect you.

In my short time on the committee, I've been consistently impressed by the dedication of federal officers, even in the face of significant hurdles. And that brings me to the core issue we must address: the fragmentation within federal law enforcement.

Each agency operates with its own set of rules, contracts, and benefits. This creates disparities – in union representation, pay scales, and, critically, retirement benefits – even within departments that fall under the same agency head, like the Department of Defense civilian police. This lack of standardization is unacceptable. It undermines morale and creates a two-tiered system where officers performing the same dangerous work receive vastly different compensation and protections.

The FOP is uniquely positioned to bridge these divides. We must identify the specific challenges within each agency – and we are doing so. Through this committee and the strength of the National FOP, we will work tirelessly to find solutions.

One of the most pressing issues is the outdated definition of "Law Enforcement Officer" used by the Office of Personnel Management. This definition, unchanged since 1988, unfairly disqualifies nearly 30,000 dedicated federal officers – officers at agencies like the Veterans Affairs Police, Department of Defense Police, FBI Police, U.S. Postal Police, and the Federal Protective Service – from receiving the 6c retirement benefits they rightfully deserve. These are men and women who face the same risks, shoulder the same responsibilities, and deserve the same protections as their counterparts.

This isn't just about retirement; it's about fairness, respect, and recognizing the value of their service. It's about acknowledging the sacrifices they and their families make.

That's why the National FOP has reintroduced H.R. 3226, "The Law Enforcement Officers Equity Act." This legislation will correct this injustice and extend 6c retirement benefits to all federal law enforcement officers.

And we cannot forget the escalating threats to officer safety. The National FOP is also advocating for H.R. 1551, "The Protect and Serve Act," which would impose federal penalties on those who intentionally target law enforcement officers with violence.

These bills are not simply legislative priorities; they are statements about our values. They are about protecting those who protect us.

But legislation doesn't pass itself. We need your help. I urge each of you, when you return home, to contact your U.S. Representatives and Senators. Tell them why these bills matter. Share your stories. Remind them of the risks you

face every day. Let them know that the FOP – and the law enforcement community – is watching. To ease the burden of formulating these emails the National FOP has provided pre-typed letters in their action center (votervoice.net/FOP/Home) that can be emailed to your legislative officials. The National FOP is the largest and most powerful law enforcement organization in the world, and we will continue to fight for you. We will advocate for increased compensation, improved working conditions, and the resources you need to do your jobs safely and effectively. We are committed to officer safety, but also to ensuring you are treated with the dignity and respect you deserve. As a committee member, I pledge to continue working collaboratively across agencies and with our partners in the FOP to advance the interests of federal law enforcement. Thank you for your unwavering dedication. Your commitment to duty and honor is an inspiration to us all. Stay safe, enjoy the conference, and enjoy Miami! Thank you!



Report of the Grievance Committee

Greetings Brothers and Sisters,

Since the last Conference in Las Vegas in 2023, the National FOP has garnered many advances for the Membership, both Active and Retired for which we should all be proud.

The Grievance Committee is equally proud of the fact that there was only one appeal tenderd to them since the last Conference, which we would like to believe is reflective of the assurance of due process rights and appropriate resolve of issues for all of the members who have filed an appeal in the past. That being said, it is obvious that there is still work to be done.

The only appeal filed with the National Lodge in the past 2 years came from a Sister in the Chicago John Dineen Lodge 7. That Sister appealed what she considered a denial of her request to view and inspect financial records of Lodge 7. The original appeal was handled by the Illinois State Lodge and their Grievance Committee who determined that the 2 counts appealed not be sustained due to a failure of the Appellant to meet the burden of proof in her presentation and testimony. The Illinois Committee also recommended that the Lodge 7 Board review their recently imposed restrictions for membership reviews of records and notes in the hopes of establishing reasonable procedures to review Lodge financial records, notes and any other materials a member should be accorded access to under procedures of the Fraternal Order of Police or State Law.

For several years now as a result of hearing numerous appeals relative to individual membership issues and rights this Committee has been advocating for expanded membership rights in addressing these appeals, in this case the National Committee found that the Sister failed to properly file an appeal with the National Lodge as she was in excess of the 3O day requirement to do so, which disallowed the Committee to hold a hearing on the appeal, but the Committee felt that the recommendation and efforts of the Illinois Grievance Committee were worthy of recognition.

I would like to recognize the Members of the Grievance Committee for their dedication to the issues covered on behalf of the Membership of this great Organization: Jim Fitsko from Ohio, Joe Fitzgerald from Delaware, Dave Frazier from Georgia, William McDonald from Pennsylvania, Denis Spaulding from Kentucky and D.L Ward from Texas. Many of these members have been with me for a large part of the 26 years that I have had the honor of chairing this committee and to them and those before them, you have my deepest gratitude in guaranteeing membership rights through the work we have dedicated ourselves to in each of the appeals addressed.

Report of the Healthcare Committee

The National FOP Healthcare Committee is proud to provide this report outlining our efforts and achievements over the past two years. Our work continues to focus on enhancing the health, wellness, and long-term security of our members through proactive healthcare solutions, expert partnerships, and innovative program development.

Retirement Healthcare Planning

The Committee has explored a number of healthcare retirement benefit options to better support our members post-retirement. We have carefully reviewed several plans, including:

- VEBA (Voluntary Employee Benefit Association): We have worked with Financial Cop, a trusted and
 endorsed provider of the National FOP, to evaluate VEBA plans that offer tax-advantaged savings for future
 healthcare expenses.
- MERP (Medical Employee Retirement Plan): We have also spoken with CBIZ and reviewed the MERP model as an additional option to help members plan for their post-retirement medical needs.

Both models offer promising solutions, and the Committee will continue its due diligence in identifying the most beneficial and accessible programs for our members nationwide.

Advancements in Preventative Health

Recognizing the critical need for early detection of health risks, the Committee is moving forward with several healthcare providers that offer advanced **blood testing** for cardiovascular disease and cancer markers. These screenings aim to identify risks before symptoms occur and are part of a broader commitment to preventative care. More details will be shared as these partnerships are finalized, and pilot programs are developed.

A Landmark Partnership: NFOP and the American Heart Association

Perhaps the most exciting and transformative development over the past two years has been the establishment of a partnership between the National Fraternal Order of Police and the American Heart Association (AHA).

This collaboration addresses a pressing concern: law enforcement officers face significantly higher risks of cardiovascular disease and stroke due to occupational stress, irregular work hours, and the cumulative toll of traumatic exposure. Our partnership with the AHA seeks to:

- Raise awareness of these elevated health risks within our profession.
- Promote a comprehensive pre-detection and early screening plan to help identify at-risk officers before emergencies occur.
- Encourage lifestyle changes that support heart health through improved nutrition, physical activity, stress management, and tobacco cessation.
- Deliver customized education and outreach tools tailored to FOP members and their families.
- Leverage national AHA resources, including research, advocacy, and access to community-based programs.

This initiative is not just about treating illness - it's about **empowering our members** to take control of their health before issues arise. Together with the AHA, we are laying the groundwork for a stronger, healthier future for law enforcement nationwide.

Looking Ahead

The Healthcare Committee will continue developing new programs, exploring additional wellness partnerships, and pushing for policy reforms that prioritize preventative care. We are also working toward creating model standards for annual occupational physicals and cardiovascular screening protocols, which can be adopted by local lodges and departments.

Conclusion

We believe the health of our members is foundational to the strength of our organization. With the steps we've taken - and with partnerships like the one we now have with the American Heart Association - we are turning that belief into action.

Thank you for your continued trust and support as we move this mission forward. Together, we are building a future where our members are not only protected in the line of duty but also cared for long after their shift ends.

The committee discussed ideas on future labor training topics and the best avenues and approaches to provide them. Report of the Law Enforcement Apprenticeship

Apprenticeship Program

We still have the basic outline of an Apprenticeship Program in our arsenal of resources. We have a plan, yet we require an avenue to implement it. Most recently we were contacted by the Law and Public Safety Education Network (LAPSEN), a not-for-profit 5OI(c)(3) that is basically a consortium of state career and technical agencies that operate under the State Departments of Education. They have networked with many of the same organizations that we have in our quest to address our recruitment and retention dilemma.

In their work they have identified what they call the "GAP YEARS". Those years from the time a student leaves high school to the time they are eligible to undertake a law enforcement career. These Gap Years is where LAPSEN along with Public Safety Cadets and Scouting's Explorer Program have identified as the time period where much of the investment in student education is lost. Young people leave high school and either plan for college or enter the workforce in a non law enforcement profession. By the time a young person is eligible for law enforcement employment, many of them are well invested in other opportunities.



LAPSEN believes that we can help address the issue of Gap Years with our apprenticeship initiative which fills the Gap Years issue. We have had some initial discussions, and our goal is to form a partnership where we can enhance each other's youth educational initiatives. We are still in the exploratory stages of this partnership and hope to have something tangible in early 2026. LAPSEN has a booth in the expo, pay them a visit to see all they have to offer.

News from Around the Country

The Apprenticeship Committee continues to monitor recruitment and retention issues from around the country. We have developed a library of events that can be accessed as we research various opportunities.

What trends are we seeing? As agencies continue to struggle with recruitment and retention, technology is filling in the gaps. Camera surveillance systems, license plate readers and drones as first responders are replacing the boots on the ground. Where we would normally see pushbacks from labor groups fearing job replacement, we are instead seeing the technology welcomed with open arms. This is occurring due to the sheer exhaustion of sworn personnel who are unable to maintain a stable family life and take time off when it is due them.

Additionally, we are seeing that organizational culture often eclipses pay and benefits when it comes to officer retention. There are huge bonuses available to entice new blood into an agency. That gets them in the door where they remain until their obligation is met. Then it's off to greener (money wise) pastures. Agencies that can afford to offer big signing bonuses are cannibalizing those who cannot. There are some outliers that are noticeably changing the landscape. Occasionally we will encounter an agency that is not struggling on retention or recruiting. When asked what their secret was, it always came down to the nurturing culture of their agency where everyone felt supported in their mission.

The Police Executive Research Forum (PERF) continues to report that their survey data shows that recruitment was improving amongst their members, mostly large cities. The FOP and the IACP continue to question their findings. We are not seeing what they are reporting.



Police Staffing Observatory

In early 2023 the FOP agreed to partner with Dr. Jeremy Wilson from the University of Michigan on a grant application that he submitted to NIJ which was awarded. The Police

Staffing Observatory produces reports and newsletters specific to our current crisis. We have been following their reporting.

The Law Enforcement Apprenticeship Committee consists of Willie Jinkins III (LA) David Cuevas (TX) and is chaired by me, Keith Turney (IL). I personally want to thank Brothers Jinkins III and Cuevas for their continued dedication and support to this project.

The National FOP Legal Defense Plan does not meet in person during National Conferences. The information contained in this updated report will be more current than the report that was submitted for the printed book.

The FOP Legal Defense Plan Board will meet in **September 2025**, **Chicago IL**.

We urge you all to stop by the National FOP LDP booth (601-603) in the expo and say hello to our partners. If you have any questions or if you would like to sign up for any of our services, they will be able to assist you right there at the booth.

MEMBERSHIP DUES

The current rates are as follows:

- \$324 Full coverage Admin, Civil/Criminal
- \$72 Civil and Criminal only
- \$75 Concealed Carry Coverage (retirees only)

The new rates effective upon renewal in 2026 will be:

- \$396 Full coverage Admin, Civil/Criminal
- \$84 Civil and Criminal only
- \$75 Concealed Carry Coverage (retirees only)

ENROLLMENT

The plan continues to grow. The numbers below are as of June 30, 2025.

- Total Active Membership 125,383

We have grown by 50,000 members in the last 7 years.

AVERAGE MONTHLY PAYMENTS

The plan is averaging \$1.400,000 a month in defense of our members.

CREDIT CARD PAYMENTS

Our fees for credit card processing have been growing as the plan has grown. In the past year we paid out approximately ISOK in credit card fees. This is causing us to reevaluate our position on accepting credit cards for group payment. We will be looking into this issue over the next couple of months, but change is likely to occur.

CURRENT LARGE CASES (unfortunately this is not an exhaustive list)

Alabama Officer dispatched to a repossession where the owner had threatened the repo person with

a gun. When the officer arrives, the owner still has the gun. Verbal commands are given, not followed, and ultimately an officer involved shooting occurred. The officer was charged with

murder. The current reserve is 35Ok, likely to go higher.

Kentucky I am sure that you are all aware that the officers involved in the fatal shooting in Kentucky were

cleared in state court. Unfortunately, three of the officers have been charged in federal court for various crimes. Recently, a judge dismissed the most serious of charges, but the case is moving

forward. The current incurred is \$3,415,000.

Washington This is a fatal shooting that has now gone through trial with a guilty verdict. We are now funding

the potential appeal. To date we have spent \$4,341,571. The officer was sentenced to 16 years

on one charge and IO years concurrent on charge 2.

DC An officer involved in a pursuit of suspect on a two wheeled vehicle who was not wearing a

helmet, crashed, and ultimately died. The officer was charged with and convicted of 2nd degree murder. To date, the plan has paid over 1,322,900. This officer was pardoned by

President Trump.

Illinois This case is not yet a large case, but it appears to be heading rapidly in that direction. This case

stems from an officer involved shooting where there was a threat of throwing hot or boiling water

on the officers.

Colorado Officers used force. Medics arrived and administered a sedative. Ultimately the subject died,

and the officers were charged with criminally negligent homicide. The officer was convicted,

and it is currently under appeal. To date we have paid nearly I million dollars.

Colorado Officer accused of threatening a minor with arrest if she didn't perform sexual acts. Currently

paid 203K with an additional 204K reserved.

ENROLLMENT OF NEW MEMBERS

New members who have filled out an application but who are still waiting for an FOP membership number may be enrolled prior to receiving their FOP number by placing the word "Pending" in the membership number field. If you utilize this feature, it is imperative that you go back and add the number as soon as possible, but not later than two months after enrollment. If the number has not been received within two months, please contact Hylant and they will work with you.

POST CERTIFICATION REVOCATION HEARINGS

It is very important to remember that revocation hearings are covered under the administrative coverage portion of the Legal Defense Plan. This means that those members who only have Civil and Criminal will not be covered for the revocation processes.

CONCEALED CARRY COVERAGE (CCC) FOR RETIREES

I want to take a minute to remind you all about our Concealed Carry Coverage for retirees. We have seen several states use this plan to increase their membership numbers by either bringing back former FOP members or getting new members to join for this coverage.

In response to member inquiries and needs, in January of 2021 we rolled out a plan offering for retired FOP members. The coverage is called "Retiree Concealed Carry Coverage". The Plan pays for a Participants reasonable and necessary Legal Defense Costs for Civil or Criminal actions brought against the participant resulting from the legally authorized carrying and or use of a weapon pursuant to and in accordance with State Laws or LEOSA in the protection of persons and/or property. The plan provides unlimited coverage and costs only \$75 per year.

To qualify for benefits the member must be legally carrying a concealed firearm or carrying such firearm in their vehicle or home. The members must also satisfy all State or LEOSA requirements for qualified retired law enforcement officers to carry concealed. If you are qualified through LEOSA this coverage will cover you nationally as you will be able to legally carry nationally. If you are only qualified in your State, then the coverage will be limited to the area that your state qualification allows you to legally carry. This coverage will not apply to incidents that arise if the member is open carrying.

The retired concealed carry coverage took the place of our old HR218 coverage. While this plan has grown considerably since its inception, we think the growth should be much greater. We urge all of you to let your members know about this incredibly inexpensive option for unlimited coverage. If you are interested, we have a booth in the expo where they will be happy to help you join.

BACKDATING

Backdating is an issue that we face far too often. Usually this happens when there is a change in lodge leadership and payment or enrollment in the LDP falls through the cracks. These are difficult decisions for the LDP Board as we are being asked to provide coverage even though the member wasn't properly enrolled. We do our best to protect the intention of the officers and the lodges but imagine calling your auto insurance carrier and telling them that you meant to send in your payment before the car accident.

In just the last **seven months**, we have had **27 backdating requests**. Processing those requests has taken over **75 hours** of staff time. Nothing is worse than having an officer involved in a critical incident who is then told they don't have coverage because the local or state lodge has not sent in the appropriate lists or payments.

Another issue we have been facing more, and this is much more difficult to positively resolve, has to do with when someone signs up for the lodge and possibly payroll deduction versus when they are signed up for the legal defense plan. In other words, if you sign up a new member and they sign payroll deduction forms on January 15th, that payroll deduction is taken out of the check and given to the lodge on January 30th, then the lodge signs the person up for legal defense on the 30th, that person does not have coverage between January 15th and January 30th. If members want coverage during that time, the lodge needs to enroll and pay for that member on January 15th. As a lodge, you can either collect the money needed for that time directly from the member or you can front it, but if we don't receive payment and the officer's information, we can't cover the member during that time. I cannot count the number of times an officer has had a significant event during this period between the date they filled out the documents with the lodge and the time the lodge processes them.

If you have questions or concerns about getting members signed up in a timely fashion, please reach out to Hylant, or feel free to call any of our legal plan trustees and we will gladly help you.

PLAN ATTORNEYS

The plan currently has 700 attorneys. While that is a large number, we are aware that in certain parts of the Country we are always in need of more attorneys. It is very difficult for the plan to add attorneys without assistance from local lodges and or local FOP leaders. To facilitate adding more attorneys, we have added a tab on our website, www.foplegal.com for attorneys to apply. Please forward attorneys who you would like to join the plan to that link on the website. If you have any problems or additional questions on adding attorneys, please do not hesitate to contact Sedgwick directly.

MEMBERSHIP GOALS

The LDP has met our goal of reaching 125,000 members before the conference in Miami. We have now established a goal of 10,000 CCC members and 150,000 total members by the 2027 conference in Salt Lake City. We will be evaluating options and rolling out programs to assist in achieving these goals.

HYLANT CONTRACT

At this meeting we came to agreement in principle with Hylant on a new 3-year contract that will run from May 1st of 24 thru April 3Oth of 2O27. This contract will expand the marketing and recruitment efforts Hylant will be responsible for. We will keep you posted as we work with Hylant to continue the incredible growth the plan has seen over the last decade.

THANK YOU TO JIM ROBBS

Jim Robbs has retired from Sassetti. As one of his roles, he served as the accountant to National FOP Legal Defense Plan from 2004 through 2024. We cannot thank Jim enough for all of the work and dedication that he has given to the plan. Please join us in wishing Jim well as he embarks on a new chapter. Spoiler alert—Jim will be taking over the role that Bob Crone has filled for years in assisting lodges with tax exempt status and filing of IRS paperwork.

COMMITTEE

I want to thank my committee and our partners for the tremendous amount of work they put into dealing with plan issues. It is a very busy committee, but also very rewarding. I am honored to work with such dedicated people.

Report of the Memorial Committee

Greetings Brothers and Sisters,

I am humbled to report to all of you on behalf of the Memorial Committee and Auxiliary Memorial Committee and the annual National Peace Officers Memorial Service (NPOMS). On May 15th of this year, we honored 232 of our brothers and sisters who made the ultimate sacrifice in 2024. The FOP Memorial Committee faced several challenges this year, the main one being mother nature and the unpredictable weather. We were fortunate that we were able to start setting up a day earlier this year which allowed us to get the majority of the West Front set up before the 2 days of saturating rain began to fall. I am happy to report that, as always, all the members of the committee stepped up and did an amazing job. They were able to work through all the obstacles that came up, all while navigating some new territory. We are fortunate that we have built great working relationships with the Architect of the Capitol and the United States Capitol Police. These relationships allowed us to problem solve and work through all the issues that came up.

Due to the large number of officers that we were honoring again this year, President Yoes again requested the assistance of several National Trustees at the NPOMS to assist with the presentation of the Supreme Sacrifice Medals to the surviving families. By having the National Trustees assist with the medal presentation, it allowed additional time with the families, making the service more personal for all of those involved. Thank you to those National Trustees that assisted with the presentation of medals. I know that this is no small task and can be physically and emotionally draining. Without your willingness to help, the service would not have gone as smoothly as it did. Because of the positive feedback we received from those participating in the service, going forward we will continue to incorporate the National Trustees with the presentation of the medals. I also want to extend a special thanks to Chaplain Snyder and Wellness Director Martin who were on hand throughout the NPOMS to offer support to the Executive Board and the National Trustees who assisted with the Supreme Sacrifice Medal distribution. This support is welcomed and appreciated on a very emotional day.

It has been the goal of the Memorial Committee each year to enhance and improve the service each year and we are continually looking at how to accomplish this. One of the major changes that you saw this years' NPOMS was the additional of video screens on the West Front. By having the video screens, those attendees that were in the back section were able to see more of the service and it allowed them to feel more involved. We were also able to livestream the service and will have a full video recording of the NPOMS. While this year was a test with the video screens, but we are hoping that this will be the new standard. We are hoping to continue to improve and capitalize on all the additional features that the video screens provide for us to promote the FOP and the NPOMS. Special thanks to Travis Brower and Savannah Nelson from the Grand Lodge who assisted with the livestream and the graphics that were displayed throughout the NPOMS.

We were fortunate again this year to contract with Aisha Malik of Aim Aro Logistics. We have worked with Ms. Malik in past years when she oversaw the NPOMS while working for her previous employer as a paid contractor. In 2022 she started her own company, Aim Aro Logistics. Given our prior experience collaborating with Ms. Malik for the NPOMS, and knowing her capabilities firsthand, we chose to continue our contract with her and her company to oversee the set-up of the West Front for the 2025 NPOMS. With her knowledge of the industry and the site, she was able to have several of the vendors that we have used in the past bid against one another. This resulted in cost savings and a much smoother set-up process. Additionally, the majority of the work was completed ahead of schedule, which was even more critical this year due to unforeseen weather-related delays. Aim Aro Logistics also helped us build on our working relationship with Capitol Concerts, who is responsible for the Memorial Day, 4th of July and Labor Day concerts at the US Capitol. We have been able to work with them to utilize some of their equipment, and they have allowed us to access the US Capitol grounds a day early. These are just a few of the examples of how contracting with Aim Aro Logistics has resulted in a reduction in the total cost for the service and more streamlined operations.

We would be remiss if we did not acknowledge the Fraternal Order of Police Auxiliary. The Auxiliary is the backbone of the NPOMS and deserves huge thanks for all their hard work and dedication. Without Committee Chair Julie Black, the entire Auxiliary Memorial Committee and their volunteers, the NPOMS would not be possible. Their work with the surviving families at the host hotel throughout the week is nothing short of incredible. On the morning of May 15th, they were able to work their magic to get all the buses loaded at the hotel on time, to the US Capitol and unloaded and have all the survivors seated with plenty of time to spare before the service was scheduled to start. This was a monumental task that they were able to execute flawlessly. We also want to recognize the countless agencies that assist with the NPOMS each year: the host agency the United States Capitol Police, DC Metropolitan Police and United States Border Patrol, the United States Park Police, United States Secret Service and the DC Metropolitan Fire Department. There are also countless volunteers that assist with the NPOMS year after year. We would like to specifically thank those members from North Carolina, Minnesota, Louisiana, New Jersey, Texas, North Dakota, Washington and Utah. Without the assistance of these agencies and the volunteers from these states, the NPOMS would not be possible. We will continue to do our best to make the NPOMS a very personal experience for the survivors in attendance by allowing them to be an active participant in the service all while doing our best to complete the service in a timely matter.

In closing, please remember that this service is OURS, meaning the Fraternal Order of Police's. We still have many members who attend police week that do not know that it is an FOP event and do not stay for the NPOMS. Our goal is to continue to showcase the FOP at our event and show the world that we will honor our fallen like no other. We have come a long way from the humble beginnings of the first NPOMS in 1982. It began as a gathering in Senate Park of approximately 12O survivors and supporters of law enforcement. Decades later, the FOP NPOMS continues to remain the cornerstone of National Police Week. We, as a fraternal organization, must support our own event and encourage all those attending from our home states to stay and attend. If you have suggestions on how we can improve the NPOMS for future years, please let us know. We welcome any and all feedback that you may have from the 2O24 NPOMS, whether it be positive and negative. As a committee, we always strive to improve the NPOMS and to find new and innovative ways to honor our fallen brothers and sisters. Report of the Pension Committee

According to the National Conference of State Legislatures and Retirement State Legislation Database there are 28 states that have some type of pension or retirement bill pending and approximately 163 bills pending so far in 2025. For the year 2024 there were 45 states that had some type of pension or retirement bill with 221 bills total. These bills may cut some of your current benefits such as Contribution Rates, Cost-of-Living Adjustments, Early Retirement Incentives, Divestiture, Deferred Retirement Option Plans, Defined Contribution and Hybrid Plans, Defined Benefit Plan Changes and Retiree Health Benefits, Reemployment after Retirement, General Service Credit. I continue to encourage you to visit the NCSL.org website and look at the existing bills in your state. These bills are not just related to Public Safety. They include all bills related to Public Pensions. I encourage members to visit www.ncsl.org and look at what bills are pending in your state.

Representatives of Alliance for Prosperity & a Secure Retirement (APSR) spoke at the 2O24 Spring Board Meeting. If you are fighting any pension issues in your state, you need to reach out to this organization. You can become a member and there is no cost. You can reach out to them for assistance, and they will give you information on what can be done to help you in your fight. I would recommend visiting info@prosperityretirementalliance.com I will also have membership forms with me at the National FOP Conference. You can also reach out to the Pension Committee for help with any pension issues you are having.

Windfall Elimination Provision/Government Pension Offset

The National FOP has been fighting WEP for almost forty years. On January 5, 2025, President Biden signed into law H.R. 82, the repeal of the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) and Government Pension Offset (GPO). The amount of time and energy that President Yoes committed to this fight was unprecedented. Jim Pasco and Tim Richardson from our National Legislative Office also put in a tremendous amount of work for this historic event to occur. The National Executive Board made sure that information was put out to the membership so that this could be accomplished! It was a true grassroots endeavor. If you still have questions, download the MARCH 2025 issue of the FOP Journal. President Yoes in his President's Message outlined very important information that you need to know. I know that this is going to be hard for some members to believe but please spread the word about this historic win! I am still getting calls from members asking when this is going to take effect. We do have members that do not have email and do not use social media so it is important to reach out to as many people as we can as FOP leaders to make sure it gets out to our membership.

Early-Age Medicare

There has been very little movement on this since my last report. Senator Brown introduced \$.3113 the Expanding Health Care Options for First Responders Act. It is co-sponsored by Senator Fetterman(D-PA) and Senator Blumenthal (D-CT). There is a companion bill in the House, H.R. 6030. Jay McDonald the Ohio FOP President did meet with Ohio representatives and requested that the bill be reintroduced. If there is any movement, I will notify the membership.

I want to thank President Yoes and Vice President Gamaldi for their confidence in me and for the consistent support they—along with the Executive Board—have provided.

President Yoes established an ambitious vision for the growth of our organization, and I'm proud to report that we have made meaningful progress toward those goals. Most notably, since our last conference, we successfully welcomed two new state lodges—Montana and Vermont—into the FOP family. These additions bring us to 48 state lodges, including the District of Columbia, leaving New Hampshire as the only state in the continental U.S. without a lodge—for now.

The addition of Montana was made possible by the tireless work of Brother Brent Jex from Utah, who acted as the point man on the ground and demonstrated the kind of tenacity and commitment that defines our organization. Vermont's inclusion was a project especially close to my heart. Recruited by Russ Winninger from Connecticut, I had the privilege of swearing in new lodges across the state. I invested a great deal of time and effort traveling, engaging, and pursuing the individuals needed to form a strong foundation. I'm especially thankful to President Corrow, Trustee Baldea, and Vice President Rice for their dedication and partnership. Together, we achieved what once seemed like a distant goal.

President Yoes' presence at the swearing-in ceremonies for both new lodges sent a powerful message to their respective boards about the value and importance of their roles within the broader FOP. His personal involvement speaks volumes about the commitment our national leadership has to expanding and strengthening our membership.

At present, our total membership remains steady at approximately 377,000. While the momentum has slowed slightly compared to previous months, we believe the increased national visibility of the FOP—particularly our recent successes in Washington—can serve as a compelling incentive during future recruitment efforts. Nevertheless, we must remain vigilant. One trend worth noting is that smaller lodges, particularly in states like Massachusetts, are increasingly folding into larger, at-large lodges due to difficulties in managing administrative responsibilities. While this may offer short-term efficiency, it could have long-term implications for member retention, and we need to be proactive in addressing it.

As liaison to Labor Services, I've maintained a close working relationship with Director Mayberry. I had the opportunity to attend the joint labor service/labor committee training in December, where I emphasized the importance of a unified message across all branches of our organization. Often, lodges served by national labor services appear disconnected from the fraternal side of the FOP. In response, Director Mayberry has implemented new policies to ensure state lodges and trustees are actively involved in the formation of new labor lodges. This not only educates potential members on the full scope of what the FOP offers but also opens the door to fraternal membership even in departments that opt out of labor services.

One of the primary areas our committee sees as crucial to the growth of the organization is modernization, specifically how we onboard new members. We are in agreement that the current process must evolve. Today's prospective members, particularly those in their twenties and thirties, expect a seamless digital experience. Asking them to fill out paper forms and write checks is an outdated model that risks losing potential members before they've even joined. The digitalization of new lodge paperwork was a solid step forward, but we must go further. I've had encouraging conversations with President Yoes and Secretary Holderfield, and I'm pleased to report that the new membership system in development promises to address many of these concerns by integrating essential processes and streamlining the experience for new members.

Ease of access is a top priority. With Secretary Holderfield's assistance, we've replaced the outdated three-ring binder system for new lodge charters with fully digital forms. For those who still want traditional items like the charter poster, seals, or gavel, these can now be ordered through the national office. Looking forward, my long-term goal is full online integration that feeds directly into our membership system.

Another key initiative we're working on is the development of national talking points for use during recruitment presentations or in the creation of state-specific materials. We welcome contributions from across the organization on what should be included. Our current discussions involve highlighting major legal defense fund (LDF) cases, national and local legislative wins, member benefits, and more. I've also had the opportunity to work with the LDF Committee, and I'm thrilled that much of the content we requested has already been incorporated into their most recent report. I look forward to continuing this collaboration to create focused recruitment materials, especially those promoting LDF's popular concealed carry coverage for retired officers.

Looking ahead, I believe we must increase our presence at key national association meetings. These include—but are not limited to—the National Latino Peace Officers Association, the National Tactical Officers Association, the National Association of School Resource Officers, the National Black Police Association, and the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP). Having a recruitment table at these events is not only an opportunity to engage potential members, but also a way to ensure the FOP brand remains front and center among the most motivated and influential officers in the profession.

I was also particularly inspired by the outstanding work of the Memorial Committee and the National Auxiliary in this year's National Peace Officers Memorial Service. Their efforts in elevating our branding and presence during this solemn occasion were remarkable. I have always believed that the immense effort our organization puts into this ceremony should be more widely recognized. Law Enforcement Memorial Day is observed on May 15 for a reason—and we are that reason. We must continue to reinforce that message.

To that end, I've been in conversation with both the Memorial and Marketing Committees to explore how we can respectfully build on the visibility we have during Police Week. Our goal should be to maintain the dignity of the occasion while using the opportunity to raise awareness of the FOP's mission and expand our reach. At the very least, I believe we should have a greater presence at non-FOP events during Police Week and establish a branded information and recruitment table at Tent City. This is a chance to show who we are—not just in words, but in action—and to let others see the strength and unity of the FOP.

I'm excited to continue coordinating efforts between LDF, Labor Services, and other committees as we push for a nationwide recruitment campaign. Innovation is no longer optional—it's essential. While our current methods have served us well, we must be honest about their limitations and be willing to adapt and modernize. Every idea—especially those that are fresh and different—has the potential to transform the way we grow our organization.

Growth, however, is only part of the equation. Retention is equally critical. We must remain committed to serving our current members with the highest standards and keeping them actively engaged with the FOP. Everyone reading this report knows the value we provide—let's make sure our members and prospects know it too.

In response to previous feedback and suggestions from committee members, I've overhauled the Recruitment and Retention training program to be presented at Leadership Matters and at this conference. This training is specifically designed for the highly motivated and involved members of each state, and our goal is to provide them with the tools, knowledge, and support necessary to grow the FOP within their communities.

In closing, I want to thank all the committee members and subcommittee members who have worked so hard over the past two years. Your commitment is the backbone of our success, and I look forward to what we will accomplish together in the years ahead. Let's keep building. Let's keep innovating. And above all, let's keep growing the FOP—stronger, smarter, and more unified than ever.

Report of the Safety δ Technology Committee

Officer Safety concerns with Fentanyl and other dangerous drugs are an extremely serious concern of the FOP. It was brought to this committee's attention that many law enforcement entities are providing personal protective gloves that don't meet an FDA standard of protection. Simply stated, many officers are being provided with disposable gloves (often purchased because they were the low bidder) that meet no level of safety standards. A company is supposed to be at the Conference Expo to allow members to take this survey in person.

The NIJ's updated Body Armor Standard has been in effect for approximately 2 years. The availability of armor that meets the old standard should no longer be sold. The new standard, known as the "OIOI.O7" is the current standard. With the roll out of the new standard, please do not think that armor which meets the old standard, OIOI.O6, is not any good. Those armors are built to a very good protection level.

Reminder that the nomenclatures associated with the armor have changed. Most users would often refer to the threat protection level as "3A" or "2" for pistol rounds. To alleviate confusion concerning what threats the armor would protect the wearer from, the armor will now have prefixes of "RF" for rifle protection and "HG" for handgun protection. The rounds used to test armors, particularly for rifle threats, have changed to meet the threats being faced by law enforcement. Some manufacturers' websites are still using outdated nomenclature for body armor.

Since the last biennial conference, the Board of Directors approved, and letters of support were authored by our worthy President Yoes have been sent out showing the FOP's support of emerging technologies which enhance officer safety and the equipment that is used by law enforcement. These have included treatment of vehicle brake parts to enhance service life and fade resistance; enhanced technology for the visibility of commercial vehicles that have broken down; support of Artificial Intelligence that supports public safety.

There are many chances for emerging technologies and artificial intelligence (AI) to become more prevalent in our everyday lives as well as in the performance of our duties in law enforcement. AI can assist with many items from mass casualty incidents, natural disasters (like the CA wildfires), coordination of assets (like in large scale transportation of people), and even daily items like getting tow trucks quickly to a scene. AI is often overlooked by public safety leaders in ways that it can assist us to make the public safer as well as aid in post incident recovery from natural disasters. I believe that the current administration will be looking to our great organization to be at the forefront of taking public safety into a more technologically modern world.

Recently an organization reached out to the FOP asking if we endorse minimum standards for law enforcement uniforms. This is something that the committee will entertain to see if it is a feasible item for this committee to participate in.

Concerns over some service weapon reliability issues has the attention of the National Board. In the near future FOP leaders will be meeting with this manufacturer to discuss the concerns of our members.

Report of the Site Committee

Brothers and Sisters,

This is the report of the National FOP Site Committee for the 2029 National Conference. The Site Committee members, Bill Doughtery (IL), Jack Pike (OK), David Stevens (FL), Taylor Holba (NJ), Bill Owensby (IN), Tom Hayes (TX), and Myself Todd Bramwell (MA), Chairman of this committee.

First, I want to thank my brothers who sit on this committee for their service to the committee and taking time to conduct these visits on short notice and in a short time period.

The Site committee conducted visits to three cities bidding for the 2O29 National Conference, Detroit, Houston, and Nashville. All three cities have Convention centers which meet the requirements set forth by the National Standing rules. In April I was notified that Houston had removed their bid to host the National Conference.

Detroit: The Detroit visit was conducted on February 26th-28th 2O25. The committee members attending this visit was myself, David Stevens, Bill Dougherty, Jack Pike, President Yoes, and Secretary Holderfield. As mentioned above the convention center meets the requirements. The Proposed dates for the convention are **August 12 -17, 2O29.** Detroit has allocated hotel rooms throughout the city. The Hotels vary in distances to the Convention center, but Detroit was able to lessen the footprint of hotels to the convention center and able to secure a larger room block from hotels in the downtown area. The hotels are mostly within a 2O–25-minute walk, with some IO–I5-minute walk to the convention center. There is public transportation, but it's believed that buses will be needed. There are 1385 rooms allocated with the rate between \$189-\$250, 1780 rooms \$251-\$299, 400 rooms \$300-\$400, 25 rooms at \$489, and 410 rooms with rates still to be determined. Detroit has an International Airport approximately 30 minutes away.

Nashville: The Nashville site visit was conducted by Myself (Todd Bramwell), David Stevens (FL), Taylor Holba (NJ), Bill Dougherty (IL), President Yoes, and Secretary Holderfield. This visit was conducted on March 3-5th, 2O25. As mentioned before a visit was done at the convention center and it meets all requirements to host the National Conference. The proposed dates are **July 8th-13th, 2O29**. Nashville has agreed to block 36OO rooms for the peak dates of the proposed National Conference. Almost all hotels are within a .6 mile of the convention center All walkable. The other rooms more than .6 miles are 2 hotels just over 1 mile that consist of a total of 25O rooms. Nashville airport is 9 miles away (14minutes) drive to the convention center. The hotel price ranges in Nashville \$259-\$299 (126O rooms), \$3OO-\$349 (194O rooms), \$35O-\$4OO (5OO rooms), 5O rooms at \$475.

The Site Committee is happy to report that both cities meet the requirements set forth in the standing rules of the Fraternal Order of Police.

I want to thank all our Brothers and Sisters at each city that we conducted site visits to for their hospitality and their efforts and the opportunity to see what each city offers. The site committee members really did appreciate it, and I thank you all.

With this clarity, we've moved quickly to charter local lodges and provide the structure and support worthy of a true State Lodge.

That progress has resonated beyond our own lodge:

- President Greggory Pemberton of the DC Police Union Lodge 2 received the 2024 National President's Award.
- Immediate Past President Andy Maybo was honored with the Jack Dudek Member of the Year Award at the 2025 Fall Board Meeting for his steadfast dedication to the Order.

Our labor committees and local lodges continue to lead the charge in public safety advocacy:

- Chairman Kenneth Spencer of the US Park Police Committee has spearheaded support for H.R. 1260
 the US Park Police Modernization Act, addressing critical staffing needs.
- Lodge 2, under President Pemberton, has been actively championing H.R. 2096 the Protecting Our Nation's Capital Emergency Act, and is working in coalition with the DC Firefighters to advance a Deferred Retirement Option Program (DROP).
- The DC FOP also strongly supports H.R. 3226 the Law Enforcement Officers' Equity Act, which
 seeks to extend 6(c) retirement coverage to all federal law enforcement professionals.

In May, we reimagined Tent City during Police Week by relocating it to the Navy Yard and partnering with local businesses. This new model not only reduced our liability, but—based on early numbers,. I believe this may be the first Tent City in recent memory to avoid operating at a financial loss. That success belongs to the dedicated volunteers and creative thinkers who refused to accept business as usual.

Another major milestone was the sale of our longtime 4th Street property. While its legacy is respected and remembered, it no longer met our operational needs. We've since relocated to a modern, purpose-built facility that better reflects our growth and supports meetings, training sessions, and engagement among our lodges and labor committees.

This spring, we had the privilege of hosting the National FOP Urban Policing Conference at Lodge 2's headquarters—a valuable opportunity for large lodge presidents to connect, strategize, and share ideas.

I am also proud to share that the Metro Transit Labor Committee successfully negotiated another contract for its members and has transitioned into Metro Transit Police Lodge 3, continuing its proud representation of the brave officers and detectives of the Metro Transit Police Department.

Finally, we have officially chartered DC Metro Transit Officials Lodge 4, composed of active sergeants from the Metro Transit Police Department. They are already moving forward in pursuit of bargaining rights, and we remain committed to standing with them every step of the way.

Brothers and Sisters, the DC FOP has truly made its comeback.

We are no longer rebuilding, we are leading!

That progress would not be possible without the trust and support of our members and the enduring strength of our FOP family nationwide.

SECTION III:

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS

The following proposed amendment is submitted by the National Board of Trustees. It was voted on and approved at the Spring National Board of Trustees Meeting March 14-15, 2025, in Salt Lake City, Utah.

The following amendments to Article 19 of the Constitution are being proposed for consideration. Section 6.C would allow a state lodge to receive the constitution and/ or by-laws and amendments from the various subordinate lodges in electronic format. Most state lodges are doing this now.

Additionally, it adds new subsection F. to Section 6 requiring all state and subordinate lodges to make updates to their Constitution and/ or By-laws when changes are adopted to the National Constitution or By-Laws at a National Conference without the need to announce and vote on said changes at the state or local lodge level.

Finally, it adds a new section 12. Over the past several years, there have been instances of subordinate lodges turning in their charter or simply stopping paying dues or per capita. States have found it to be burdensome if not impossible to retrieve the books, assets, seals, and memorabilia from these lodges. After consultation with the General Counsels in several jurisdictions, it was recommended that a specific section be included in the Constitution noting the chartering authority to aid a state lodge should the need to take action in their jurisdiction's court system arises.

EX-The proposed change to the National Constitution is under Article 19, State and Subordinate Lodges, Section 6 Constitutions, adds a subsection F. Additionally, it adds a new section 12 after Section 11.

CURRENTLY READS:

ARTICLE 19 State and Subordinate Lodges

Section 6. Constitutions

C. Each subordinate lodge in those states where there is a state lodge shall submit for approval two (2) copies of its Constitution and By-Laws, if any, and any revisions thereto to its respective state lodge and said state lodge shall, prior to approval thereof, determine that said Constitution and By-Laws, if any, are not in conflict with the Constitution and By-Laws of that state lodge or the National Fraternal Order of Police.

TO READ:

ARTICLE 19 State and Subordinate Lodges

Section 6. Constitutions

- C. Each subordinate lodge in those states where there is a state lodge shall submit for approval two (2) copies of its Constitution and By-Laws or an electronic copy, if any, and any revisions thereto to its respective state lodge and said state lodge shall, prior to approval thereof, determine that said Constitution and By-Laws, if any, are not in conflict with the Constitution and By-Laws of that state lodge or the National Fraternal Order of Police.
- F. Any amendments that have been adopted by the delegates at the National Biennial Conference which apply to each state and subordinate lodges and their membership thereof, shall automatically become part of the state and subordinate lodge's Constitution and/or By-laws, and are not subject to the provisions requiring notice and adoption as it pertains to proposed amendments. State and local lodges failing to make the necessary adjustments to their Constitution and / or By-Laws will default to the National Constitution and By-Laws. All state and subordinate lodges will be notified of any such changes from the National Secretary's Office.

Section 12. Any Lodge that surrenders its charter voluntarily or is in arrears for payment of dues or assessments more than 89 days, shall immediately surrender all books, records, and assets to the appropriate chartering lodge. In the case of a subordinate lodge, to the state lodge that issued their charter and in the case of a state lodge or a subordinate lodge chartered by the National Lodge, to the National Board of Trustees in accordance with the applicable state law of the charting lodge. Article 31 Section 1. B changes the way member rosters are to be submitted from paper to electronic form.

The following proposed amendment is submitted by the National Board of Trustees. It was voted on and approved at the Spring National Board of Trustees Meeting March 14-15, 2025, in Salt Lake City, Utah.

This proposed amendment is being offered to Article 23 of the Constitution. The proposed changes include changing the wording from **his** to **the member** and requiring documentation to be in electronic form. Additionally, it adds a method and timeline for appealing the decision of the National Board of Trustees concerning the individual party's case.

EX- These proposed changes to the National Constitution are under Article 23, Discipline, Section 3, Individual members and Section 4, Subordinate and State Lodges.

CURRENTLY READS:

ARTICLE 23 Discipline

Section 3. Individual Members

- B. In the case of discipline imposed upon an individual member involving suspension, expulsion, or removal from office by a subordinate lodge, an appeal may be taken by the member to the state lodge and an appeal may be taken from the decision of the state lodge by the non-prevailing party to the National Board of Trustees and, ultimately, to the Biennial Conference.
- I. An appeal to the state lodge may be brought by the filing of a written notice of appeal with the state president not more than thirty (3O) days after the member's receipt of official notification of his suspension, expulsion, or removal from office. Unless continued or delayed for good cause, such appeal shall be heard by the state lodge at the next board meeting following the state lodge president's receipt of such notice of appeal and, unless waived in writing by both the appealing member and responding lodge, a written decision shall be rendered by the board within ten (IO) days after such meeting. Both the appealing member and the lodge from whose action the appeal is brought shall have the right to a hearing at which both parties may be heard and may present witnesses and documents. Such hearing shall be conducted in conformity with Article 23 of the By-Laws. The parties to the appeal shall receive notice of the date of the hearing by certified mail not less than ten (IO) days before such hearing. (Amended 8/19)
- D. A party seeking to appeal from the decision of the state lodge shall give notice of appeal to the National Board of Trustees by submitting by certified mail within thirty (3O) days of the party's receipt of notice thereof, a written submission consisting of the decision from which the appeal is taken and such other written materials as the appellant deems relevant to a fair consideration of the appeal by the National Board of Trustees. The appellant shall serve one (1) copy of the notice of appeal (including all written submissions) upon the opposing party (which shall be the state or subordinate lodge secretary where such opposing party is a lodge). Where the appealing party is a subordinate lodge, it shall submit fifty (5O) copies thereof upon the National Secretary not less than sixty (6O) days prior to the National Board of Trustees meeting at which the appellant seeks to have their appeal heard. The party opposing the appeal shall, within thirty (3O) days of their receipt of the notice of appeal, submit a responsive written submission to the National Secretary and the opposing party, which responsive submission shall contain such materials as it deems appropriate and relevant to a fair consideration of the appeal by the National Board of Trustees. In cases in which the responding party is a state or subordinate lodge, such lodge shall submit fifty (5O) copies of its responsive submission to the National Secretary. In cases in which the party opposing the appeal is an individual member, they shall submit one (1) copy of their responsive submission to the National Secretary. (Amended 8/19)
- F. An appeal to the Biennial Conference may be taken by either party from the decision of the National Board of Trustees respecting any appeal of disciplinary action imposed upon an individual member by a subordinate lodge, a state lodge or discipline imposed by the National Board of Trustees.

A party seeking to appeal a decision of the National Board of Trustees to the Biennial Conference shall serve notice thereof upon the National Secretary and the opposing party. Such notice of

appeal shall consist of a concise statement describing the act or failure to act upon which the appeal is based, the basis for such appeal, the decision appealed from, and those written materials the appellant deems appropriate and relevant to a fair consideration of the appeal by the National Board of Trustees. The opposing party may respond in writing to such notice of appeal with such materials as it deems necessary and shall submit a copy of such response to the National Secretary and the appealing party. Said notice of appeal and any responsive submissions shall be forwarded by the National Secretary to the National President who shall deliver said materials to a committee of the Conference which shall consider the matter and report thereon to the Conference prior to a vote thereon by the delegates. By their taking of the oath or their acceptance of the charter of the National Fraternal Order of Police, each member and each lodge specifically acknowledges and agrees that the decision of the Conference shall be final.

Section 4. Subordinate and State Lodges

- A. Except as otherwise provided herein, a subordinate lodge shall only be disciplined by the state lodge of which it is a member. A state lodge shall only be disciplined by the National Fraternal Order of Police. Such discipline may be imposed only upon a showing of good and sufficient cause after a fair hearing by the state lodge's governing body (in respect to subordinate lodges) or the National Board of Trustees (in respect to state lodges) and may include suspension or revocation of a lodge's charter. Such hearing shall be conducted in conformity with Article 23 of the By-Laws.
- B. A subordinate lodge may appeal from the imposition of discipline by its respective state lodge to the National Board of Trustees and, ultimately, the Biennial Conference.

Such appeal shall be commenced by serving upon the National Secretary and the secretary of the state lodge from whose action the appeal is brought, within thirty (3O) days of notice of the action appealed from and by certified mail, a notice of appeal. Such notice of appeal shall consist of the decision or ruling appealed from and all relevant written materials believed by the subordinate lodge to be necessary for a fair consideration of the matter by the National Board of Trustees. Fifty (5O) copies of said notice of appeal shall be served upon the National Secretary for distribution to the members of the National Board.
- 2. Not more than thirty (3O) days after receipt of the subordinate lodge's notice of appeal, the state secretary shall serve fifty (5O) copies upon the National Secretary and one (1) copy upon the opposing party, of its statement of position and/or response to the appeal of the subordinate lodge which submission shall, in any case, include a copy of the minutes reflecting the action from which the appeal is taken and such other materials as the state lodge deems appropriate.

TO READ:

ARTICLE 23 Discipline

Section 3. Individual Members

- B. In the case of discipline imposed upon an individual member involving suspension, expulsion, or removal from office by a subordinate lodge, an appeal may be taken by the member to the state lodge and an appeal may be taken from the decision of the state lodge by the non-prevailing party to the National Board of Trustees and, ultimately, to the Biennial Conference.

An appeal to the state lodge may be brought by the filing of a written notice of appeal with the state president not more than thirty (3O) days after the member's receipt of official notification of his the member's suspension, expulsion, or removal from office. Such hearing shall be conducted in conformity with Article 23 of the By-Laws. The parties to the appeal shall receive notice of the date of the hearing by certified mail not less than ten (IO) days before such hearing. (Amended 8/19)

- D. A party seeking to appeal from the decision of the state lodge shall give notice of appeal to the National Board of Trustees by submitting by certified mail within thirty (30) days of the party's receipt of notice thereof, a written submission consisting of the decision from which the appeal is taken and such other written materials as the appellant deems relevant to a fair consideration of the appeal by the National Board of Trustees. The appellant shall serve one (1) copy (written or electronically) of the notice of appeal (including all written submissions) upon the opposing party (which shall be the state or subordinate lodge secretary where such opposing party is a lodge). Where the appealing party is a subordinate lodge, it shall submit fifty (50) copies one (I) copy electronically thereof upon the National Secretary not less than sixty (60) days prior to the National Board of Trustees meeting at which the appellant seeks to have their appeal heard. The party opposing the appeal shall, within thirty (30) days of their receipt of the notice of appeal, submit a responsive written submission (electronically) to the National Secretary and the opposing party, which responsive submission shall contain such materials as it deems appropriate and relevant to a fair consideration of the appeal by the National Board of Trustees. In cases in which the responding party is a state or subordinate lodge, such lodge shall submit fifty (50)copies one (1) copy electronically of its responsive submission to the National Secretary. In cases in which the party opposing the appeal is an individual member, they shall submit one (1) copy electronically of their responsive submission to the National Secretary. (Amended 8/19)
- F. An appeal to the Biennial Conference may be taken by either party from the decision of the National Board of Trustees respecting any appeal of disciplinary action imposed upon an individual member by a subordinate lodge, a state lodge or discipline imposed by the National Board of Trustees.

A party seeking to appeal a decision of the National Board of Trustees to the Biennial Conference shall serve notice thereof upon the National Secretary and the opposing party by certified mail within 3O days of the rendered decision of the National Board of Trustees. Such notice of appeal shall consist of a concise statement describing the act or failure to act upon which the appeal is based, the basis for such appeal, the decision appealed from, and those written materials electronically the appellant deems appropriate and relevant to a fair consideration of the appeal by the National Board of Trustees. The opposing party may respond in writing electronically to such notice of appeal with such materials as it deems necessary and shall submit a copy of such response to the National Secretary and the appealing party. Said notice of appeal and any responsive submissions shall be forwarded by the National Secretary to the National President who shall deliver said materials to a committee of the Conference which shall consider the matter and report thereon to the Conference prior to a vote thereon by the delegates. By their taking of the oath or their acceptance of the charter of the National Fraternal Order of Police, each member and each lodge specifically acknowledges and agrees that the decision of the Conference shall be final.

Section 4. Subordinate and State Lodges

- A. Except as otherwise provided herein, a subordinate lodge shall only be disciplined by the state lodge of which it is a member. A state lodge shall only be disciplined by the National Fraternal Order of Police. Such discipline may be imposed only upon a showing of good and sufficient cause after a fair hearing by the state lodge's governing body (in respect to subordinate lodges) or the National Board of Trustees (in respect to state lodges) and may include suspension or revocation of a lodge's charter. Such notice of appeal shall consist of the decision or ruling appealed from and all relevant written materials (electronically) believed by the subordinate lodge to be necessary for a fair consideration of the matter by the National Board of Trustees. Fifty (5O) copies one (1) copy electronically of said notice of appeal shall be served upon the National Secretary for distribution to the members of the National Board.

2. Not more than thirty (3O) days after receipt of the subordinate lodge's notice of appeal, the state secretary shall serve fifty (5O) copies one (1) copy electronically upon the National Secretary and one (1) copy electronically upon the opposing party, of its statement of position and/or response to the appeal of the subordinate lodge which submission shall, in any case, include a copy of the minutes reflecting the action from which the appeal is taken and such other materials as the state lodge deems appropriate.

The following proposed amendment is submitted by the Chicago John Dineen Lodge #7, Chicago Illinois. It was unanimously approved by the Chicago John Dineen Lodge #7 Board of Directors at its regular Board Meeting on April 2nd, 2025, and is being presented for consideration to the Delegates in attendance at the 67th Biennial Conference in Miami Beach. Florida.

This proposed amendment is specific to Article 19. Section IO. Receivership for State and Subordinate Lodges. It increases the percentage of votes needed to take action against either of those lodges from 2/3's to 3/4ths. The 3/4th is consistent with the threshold needed for discipline against the National Executive Board members to go forward. The possibility of removing a sitting President of a subordinate lodge and especially a state lodge should be held to no less of a standard. To be given the authority to assume control of a lodge is the most serious power that can be given and should require the highest vote obligation.

EX-The proposed change to the National Constitution is under Article 19, State and Subordinate Lodges, Sections 10 Receivership.

CURRENTLY READS:

ARTICLE 19 State and Subordinate Lodges

Section 10. Receivership

- A. The president of any state or subordinate lodge that shall become insolvent shall provide written notice thereof to the National President. In such event, the National Fraternal Order of Police may, but shall not be required to, assume control of such insolvent state or subordinate lodge for a period of six (6) months, during which period the insolvent lodge shall be operated under the supervision of the National President or their designee. Extensions in increments of six (6) months may be granted at the request of the state or subordinate lodge president and with the approval of the National President.
- B. Upon written request therefor made by two-thirds (2/3) of the governing board of a state or subordinate lodge to the National President, the National Fraternal Order of Police may, but shall not be required to, assume control of such lodge. In such case, the lodge shall be operated for a period not to exceed six (6) months under the supervision of the National President or their designee.
- C. In the event the National Fraternal Order of Police becomes aware of malfeasance and/or misfeasance in the operation of a State or Subordinate lodge, which is not being appropriately addressed, the National Secretary shall make notification to the National President, the Chairman of Trustees, and the National Executive Board. The National President shall authorize the General Counsel, along with an assigned committee, the duty of investigating this malfeasance and/or misfeasance and the General Counsel may freeze the assets and records in order to preserve evidence and protect membership property from loss, with a majority vote of the Board of Trustees. This action shall not extend more than I year or until the Lodge function can be made whole. If more time is needed the National Board of Trustees may extend this time limit by a two-third (2/3) majority vote. (Amended 8/21)
- 1. Any discipline imposed by either the State Lodge or National Lodge will be in accordance with Article 23 of the National Lodge Constitution.

TO READ:

ARTICLE 19 State and Subordinate Lodges

Section 10. Receivership

- A. The president of any state or subordinate lodge that shall become insolvent shall provide written notice thereof to the National President. In such event, the National Fraternal Order of Police may, but shall not be required to, assume control of such insolvent state or subordinate lodge for a period of six (6) months, during which period the insolvent lodge shall be operated under the supervision of the National President or their designee. Extensions in increments of six (6) months may be granted at the request of the state or subordinate lodge president and with the approval of the National President.
- B. Upon written request therefor made by **three-fourths (3/4)** two thirds (2/3) of the governing board of a state or subordinate lodge to the National President, the National Fraternal Order of Police may, but shall not be required to, assume control of such lodge. In such case, the lodge shall be operated for a period not to exceed six (6) months under the supervision of the National President or their designee.
- C. In the event the National Fraternal Order of Police becomes aware of malfeasance and/or misfeasance in the operation of a State or Subordinate lodge, which is not being appropriately addressed, the National Secretary shall make notification to the National President, the Chairman of Trustees, and the National Executive Board. The National President shall authorize the General Counsel, along with an assigned committee, the duty of investigating this malfeasance and/or misfeasance and the General Counsel may freeze the assets and records in order to preserve evidence and protect membership property from loss, with a **three-fourths (3/4)** majority vote of the Board of Trustees. The following proposed amendments are submitted by the Chicago John Dineen Lodge #7, Chicago Illinois. They were unanimously approved by the Chicago John Dineen Lodge #7 Board of Directors at its regular Board Meeting on April 2nd, 2O25, and is being presented for consideration to the Delegates in attendance at the 67th Biennial Conference in Miami Beach, Florida.

This proposal crosses many paths within the Constitution so there are several redline edits. Its overall purpose is very simple. To give a voice to the ENTIRE membership when it comes to the National Executive Board members. Nothing would change regarding the in-person delegates at the conference. The separation of voting duties is intentional. The current language explains delegate duties at the conference and items they would vote on in person. They would still be the party who votes on conference locations, floor motions and Constitution δ Bylaw changes at the conference. This simply expands Executive Board Officer elections to the entire dues paying membership. This proposal can easily be facilitated. Once nominations are closed on the floor, all qualified delegates who are not at the conference whose email addresses have been supplied and verified by the State lodge of membership will be sent an email ballot to vote on the morning before the in-person vote. A 3rd party vendor would facilitate that portion of the election. It would be secure and meet privacy guidelines set prior to the conference by the National Board of Directors. Once in-person voting commences then the electronic email vote will end. The total electronic votes cast by the two groups would be added at the close of in-person voting by the election committee. Only the vendor would maintain the vote totals of electronic voting until all voting has been concluded. This will allow every dues paying member to decide leadership and not just those in attendance. With manpower shortages everywhere, the cost of travel along with other considerations, these conferences are becoming more costly to send large delegations to attend. This proposal, I believe, covers all relevant voting sections. Its purpose is clear and if there is a section missing that needs to be addressed to be uniform, I will expect the committee to send that concern to be addressed by myself (John Catanzara Jr.) and our counsel who drafted the changes.

EX-The proposed changes to the National Constitution are under Article 6, National Officers-Section 3 Nomination, Election, and Installation and Article 17, Delegates-Sections 2 thru 6, Article 25, Resolutions, and Article 27. Official Order of Business.

CURRENTLY READS:

ARTICLE 6 National Officers

Section 3. Nomination, Election, and Installation

- D. **Election.** Each national officer, except National Trustees, shall be elected by a vote of the qualified delegates on the floor of the Conference.
- I. Voting shall be by computer tabulated printed ballots and the expense thereof shall be borne by the National Fraternal Order of Police. In the event that printed ballots are not available or practical the National Board of Trustees, by a two-thirds vote, may select another form of voting. Such other form must provide for multi-factor authentication of vote totals. Ballots shall not be taken from the Biennial Conference site. All information that could be used to identify how the voter voted will be anonymized in all distributions of voting results to all individuals. (Amended 8/21)
- 2. The order by which the delegates of the several states shall vote shall be determined by lottery conducted by the National Secretary. The vote order will be drawn at the Fall Board Meeting prior to the Biennial Conference to assist lodges with travel arrangements. (Amended 8/15)
- 3. The National President shall announce the results of the elections reported by the Election Committee and shall declare elected those candidates receiving a plurality of the votes cast for each respective national office.

ARTICLE 17 Delegates

Section 2. Entitlement. Every state and subordinate lodge shall be entitled to one or more delegates to the Biennial Conference as set forth herein.

- A. The Board of Trustees or the Executive Board of each state lodge shall be entitled to three (3) delegates to the National Biennial Conference, each of whom shall be chosen from among the membership of such Board of Trustees or State Executive Board, as shall be determined by the Constitution of the respective state.
- B. Each subordinate lodge of a state lodge and each subordinate lodge in states having no state lodge shall be entitled to one (I) delegate for each fifty (5O) active members or major portion thereof, provided, however, that every lodge shall be entitled to not less than one (I) delegate. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the number of delegates to the Biennial Conference to which each subordinate lodge shall be entitled shall be determined by reference to the number of active members on the first of April for whom all indebtedness then owing has been fully paid or postmarked to the National Fraternal Order of Police by the first day of July of the year in which the Biennial Conference is held. New Lodges forming after April 1st and before July 1st shall be entitled to delegates in number as stated above. Number of credentials issued to new lodge will be based on the total member count on date of charter. (Amended 8/15)
- C. Under extenuating circumstances local lodges that are denied National Conference credentials can appeal, in writing, to the National Secretary, who will forward the appeal and recommendation to the Executive Board for a decision. The local lodge can appeal the decision of the Executive Board to the Board of Trustees at the Pre-Conference Board Meeting. The local lodge can appeal the Board of Trustees' decision to the floor of the National Conference in question. The decision of the delegates will be final. (Added 8/II)

Section 3. Nomination and Election

- A. Nominations and elections of delegates to the Biennial Conference shall be held not later than June 30th. Qualified candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.
- B. Delegates to the Biennial Conference shall be elected in the manner and method and subject to the provisions of this Constitution, the By-Laws, and the Ritual.

- **Section 6.** No Delegate or Alternate representing any state or subordinate lodge which is delinquent in the payment of per capita taxes, delinquency fees, assessments, or any other indebtedness due and payable to the National Fraternal Order of Police or any state lodge, shall be permitted to, or seated in, the Biennial Conference or National Board meeting.

ARTICLE 25 Resolutions

Such proposed resolutions may be submitted at any time between or during the Biennial Conferences, provided, however, that each resolution shall be submitted not later than the recess of the next to last business session of the Biennial Conference. ARTICLE 6 National Officers

Section 3. Nomination, Election, and Installation

- D. **Election.** Each national officer, except National Trustees, shall be elected by a vote of the qualified delegates on the floor of the Conference in combination with all qualified delegates voting by electronic vote.
- I. Voting shall be by computer tabulated printed ballots for in-person delegates and by electronic vote for qualified delegates not in attendance. The expense thereof shall be borne by the National Fraternal Order of Police. In the event that printed in-person ballots are not available or practical the National Board of Trustees, by a two-thirds vote, may select another form of voting. Such other form must provide for multifactor authentication of vote totals. In-person ballots shall not be taken from the Biennial Conference site. All information that could be used to identify how the voter voted will be anonymized in all distributions of voting results to all individuals. (Amended 8/21)

- 2. A. The order by which the <u>in-person</u> delegates of the several states shall vote shall be determined by lottery conducted by the National Secretary. The vote order will be drawn at the Fall Board Meeting prior to the Biennial Conference to assist lodges with travel arrangements. (Amended 8/15)
- B. Electronic voting shall commence twenty-four (24) hours prior to the opening of the in-person voting and shall cease immediately at the conclusion of the in-person voting period.
- C. Tabulation of ballots (in-person and electronic) shall commence upon the closure of the in-person voting period.
- 3. The National President shall announce the results of the elections reported by the Election Committee and shall declare elected candidates receiving a plurality of the <u>in-person and electronic</u> votes cast for each respective national office.

Article 17 Delegates

Section 2. Entitlement. Every state and subordinate lodge shall be entitled to one or more delegates to the Biennial Conference as set forth herein.

- A. The Board of Trustees or the Executive Board of each state lodge shall be entitled to three (3) <u>in-person</u> delegates to the National Biennial Conference, each of whom shall be chosen from among the membership of such Board of Trustees or State Executive Board, as shall be determined by the Constitution of the respective state.
- B. Each subordinate lodge of a state lodge and each subordinate lodge in states having no state lodge shall be entitled to one (1) <u>in-person</u> delegate for each fifty (5O) active members or major portion thereof, provided, however, that every lodge shall be entitled to not less than one (1) <u>in-person</u> delegate. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the number of delegates to the Biennial Conference to which each subordinate lodge shall be entitled shall be determined by reference to the number of active members on the first of April for whom all indebtedness then owing has been fully paid or postmarked to the National Fraternal Order of Police by the first day of July of the year in which the Biennial Conference is held. New Lodges forming after April 1st and before July 1st shall be entitled to delegates in number as stated above. Number of credentials issued to new lodge will be based on the total member count on date of charter. (Amended 8/15)
- C. Under extenuating circumstances local lodges that are denied National Conference credentials can appeal, in writing, to the National Secretary, who will forward the appeal and recommendation to the Executive Board for a decision. The local lodge can appeal the decision of the Executive Board to the Board of Trustees at the Pre Conference Board Meeting. The local lodge can appeal the Board of Trustees' decision to the floor of the National Conference in question. The decision of the delegates will be final. /Added 8/11/
- D. All members of a subordinate lodge, not serving as an in-person delegate, may submit an electronic vote on all matters as provided within the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 3. Nomination and Election

- A. Nominations and elections of <u>in-person</u> delegates to the Biennial Conference shall be held not later than June 30th. Qualified candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.
- B. <u>In-person</u> delegates to the Biennial Conference shall be elected in the manner and method and subject to the provisions of this Constitution, the By-Laws, and the Ritual.
- C. A subordinate lodge may designate members of their elected Board as delegates to the Biennial Conference, by virtue of election to their respective office, however the number of delegates a subordinate lodge is entitled is defined in Article 17, section 2 of this Constitution. No <u>in-person</u> Delegate or Alternate representing any state or subordinate lodge which is delinquent in the payment of per capita taxes, delinquency fees, assessments, or any other indebtedness due and payable to the National Fraternal Order of Police or any State lodge, shall be permitted to, or seated in, the Biennial Conference or National Board meeting.

The following proposed amendments are submitted by the Chicago John Dineen Lodge #7, Chicago Illinois. They were unanimously approved by the Chicago John Dineen Lodge #7 Board of Directors at its regular Board Meeting on April 2nd, 2O25, and is being presented for consideration to the Delegates in attendance at the 67th Biennial Conference in Miami Beach, Florida.

This proposal crosses many paths within the Constitution so there are several redline edits. Its overall purpose is very simple. To give a voice to the ENTIRE membership when it comes to the National Executive Board members. Nothing would change regarding the in-person delegates at the conference. The separation of voting duties is intentional. The current language explains delegate duties at the conference and items they would vote on in person. They would still be the party who votes on conference locations, floor motions and Constitution δ Bylaw changes at the conference. This simply expands Executive Board Officer elections to the entire dues paying membership. This proposal can easily be facilitated. Once nominations are closed on the floor, all qualified delegates who are not at the conference whose email addresses have been supplied and verified by the State lodge of membership will be sent an email ballot to vote on the morning before the in-person vote. A 3rd party vendor would facilitate that portion of the election. It would be secure and meet privacy quidelines set prior to the conference by the National Board of Directors. Once in-person voting commences then the electronic email vote will end. The total electronic votes cast by the two groups would be added at the close of in-person voting by the election committee. Only the vendor would maintain the vote totals of electronic voting until all voting has been concluded. This will allow every dues paying member to decide leadership and not just those in attendance. With manpower shortages everywhere, the cost of travel along with other considerations, these conferences are becoming more costly to send large delegations to attend. This proposal, I believe, covers all relevant voting sections. Its purpose is clear and if there is a section missing that needs to be addressed to be uniform, I will expect the committee to send that concern to be addressed by myself (John Catanzara Jr.) and our counsel who drafted the changes.

The National Vice President shall be reimbursed for ordinary and necessary expenses incident to their office and shall not receive a per diem. (Amended 8/23)

ARTICLE 12 National Secretary

Section 3. The National Secretary shall receive an annual base salary of \$78,750. The National Board of trustees may vote to give a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) up to 5% once per year. Any COLA increase of more than 5% in a single year shall be voted on by the delegates at the National Conference. The National Secretary shall be reimbursed for ordinary and necessary expenses incident to their office and shall not receive a per diem. (Amended 8/23)

ARTICLE 13 National Treasurer

Section 2. The National Treasurer shall receive an annual base salary of \$78,750. The National Board of trustees may vote to give a cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) up to 5% once per year. The National Chairman of the Trustees shall be reimbursed for ordinary and necessary expenses incident to their office and shall not receive a per diem. (Amended 8/23)

At the request of Uvalde leadership, the U.S. Department of Justice established the Critical Incident Review (CIR) to conduct an independent, objective assessment of what happened that day and assess the systems in place in the weeks leading up to May 24. The goal of the CIR is to provide information to those most affected by the tragedy and to build knowledge regarding how to best respond to incidents of mass violence. This presentation will present an incident timeline, as well as discuss observations and recommendations from the CIR report in areas to include tactics, leadership, incident command, coordination, pre-incident processes, and trauma and support services.

Local Lodge Leadership: Tactical Tools of the Trade


