

Ohio Police and Fire Pension Bill Stalls

Our top Ohio legislative priority, House Bill 296, was not passed during the lame duck session of the General Assembly. Despite passing the House in an historic and bipartisan fashion, it was not taken up by the Senate. This means we will have to start all over again once the General Assembly begins after the first of the year.

Bill sponsor Rep. Cindy Abrams (R-Harrison) said she has no intention of letting the issue lie heading into next session. "I would like for the folks that are against the bill to come forward with the solution," Abrams said in an interview. "I'm all ears and have been for three years."

OP&F Executive Director Mary Beth Foley expressed disappointment regarding the legislature's lack of final action. "OP&F and our police and firefighters, their families and supporters have worked for three years now seeking equality of employer rates for police officers, and the severe underfunding of the plan since inception," Foley said. "We will take it up again in 2025 and hope the Senate will join with 66 House colleagues in righting this wrong."

Senator Mark Romanchuk told FOP members that he believes that we must give OP-F Board members (instead of the legislature) the ability to reduce the COLA for retirees. We will fight this approach in the legislature, and we will keep you updated.





PRE-65 Retiree Health Insurance

We have had several emails lately about Thin Blue Line Insurance and we have seen the online messages on Facebook.

The FOP has reached out to and have had several conversations with the CEO of the company about the allegations posted online. Here is what we have been told:

- The company is not in any financial danger
- They have had staffing issues due to growth and they are also considering civil action against a former employee who they believe fraudulently used TBL's name and using social media platforms amongst other online resources to pose as TBL members stating false negative remarks that TBL is insolvent.
- They have made changes to provider access and there have been some implementation challenges.

Here is what we have done in response:

- We have had several communications with the CEO of TBL
- We reached to National FOP Secretary Holderfield to see if other states were having similar complaints, they are not
- We have responded to each individual concern and have worked out several problems for our members but the online issues are making it harder for TBL to respond because so many people are calling about general concerns due to FB postings that those who have specific concerns are being caught up in the wash.
- We have encouraged more communication about what is going on between TBL and our members. We will help facilitate that communication to help our members get information.

Ohio FOP Leaders meet with Senator-elect Bernie Moreno

President McDonald and Secretary Parker met with Senator-elect Bernie Moreno and other members of Labor just before Christmas.

Mr. Moreno discussed immigration, consent decrees and grant funding with the FOP. He also introduced us to key staff members to assist us with legislative matters once he takes office.

"I am very confident that the FOP will have an outstanding relationship with Senator Moreno moving forward" said President McDonald.

After the meeting, Senator-elect Moreno invited President McDonald to Washington to attend his swearing in on January 3rd.

Mayor Malik and Chief Harding,

The safety and security of Akron's police officers, and by extension, the residents they serve, have been severely undermined by your actions. Releasing the names of the officers involved in the recent shooting has opened them up to threats, harassment, and danger. This decision erodes the fairness of their due process and does nothing to serve justice for the officers or community.

Due process and justice are owed to everyone, including police officers. Officers who face critical incidents deserve to be investigated fairly and without undue public pressure or threat. By releasing their names, you have denied them that opportunity and emboldened those who seek to intimidate or even harm them physically. That's not accountability; it is scapegoating.

Morale among Akron's officers is already fragile. Decisions like this make recruitment and retention nearly impossible. Officers now face the dangers of the job and a lack of confidence that their leaders will protect their basic safety and rights. Those who remain on the force are left to work under heightened hostility, which endangers the entire community.

We call on you to take immediate steps to reverse this toxic environment. Publicly affirm your commitment to due process for all involved, condemn the threats against Akron's officers, and take tangible action to ensure their safety. Let the process play out as it should. Leadership must be a source of strength and stability—not fear and uncertainty.

This is not just about the officers involved in this incident. It is about ensuring trust, improving morale, and ensuring that Akron's police officers can continue to serve and protect the people of this city without fear for their safety.

President Potter and all members of the Whitehall City Council,

The FOP of Ohio and our over 23,000 members join Capital City Lodge #9 in asking the Whitehall City Council to authorize an independent, third-party investigation into the complaints of your own employees. The time for action is now before irreparable harm is done to the Whitehall Police Department and the officers who swore an oath to protect the residents of your great city.

Morale is at rock bottom and the actions of the Whitehall police administration is making It worse. Who would want to join a department where the union representatives are fired, one after another? The officers you have are actively seeking other opportunities to escape. Those who want to stay and try to fix things are targeted and retaliated against.

This isn't an isolated incident; it is a well-documented pattern. City Council must authorize an independent investigation into allegations of the department's unlawful ticket and arrest quota, set up by Whitehall Police Department, and the subsequent intimidation and, even, termination of officers—especially union grievance representatives defending the city's officers.

We are asking you not to take our word for it. We are just asking that an independent investigation be carried out due to the reports of your own employees citing a toxic work environment exists in your police department. Please help us restore the strong leadership needed to oversee the department, reestablish trust between the department and officers, and improve morale. This will have a positive impact on the city government, the police department, and the people of Whitehall.

FOP of Ohio Legislative Report

The 135th General Assembly concluded with a busy lame-duck session, during which several bills were significantly amended, resembling "Christmas Trees" adorned with numerous additions. One such bill, Senate Bill 100, now makes it illegal to install a tracking device on another person's property without their consent.

The House Criminal Justice Committee contributed parts of House Bill 230 to Senate Bill 100, specifically allowing oral fluid testing for drugs in relation to Operating a Vehicle Under the Influence (OVI) cases. The State Highway Patrol initiated this oral fluid testing provision, so training for its implementation should be coming soon.

Notably, one amendment that would have benefited Greater Cleveland RTA police officers was not included in Senate Bill 100. The Buckeye State Sheriffs Association opposed this amendment and successfully prevented its passage.

House Bill 111, which establishes a presumption of prison time for individuals convicted of third-degree felony domestic violence and increases the sentencing range for such offenses, was recently signed into law. This law applies to offenders who have pleaded guilty to or been convicted of two or more domestic violence offenses or similar municipal ordinances.

Did you know that Reserve or Auxiliary Officers can obtain FOP legal defense insurance if they become FOPA members? Did you know that County agencies can use Furtherance of Justice (FOJ) funds to pay for legal defense plans for reserve or auxiliary members?

If your agency uses reserve or auxiliary officers to supplement full-time members, make sure that they know they can get this vital protection.

Also, command level law enforcement officers outside of their collective bargaining agreement should also purchase legal defense through foplegal.com to make sure that they have criminal and civil protection. They can get this coverage as FOP members.

FOP of Ohio Pushes out App


